LONDON, August 9.-The following report dated Pretoria, August 9, has been received from Lord Roberts:

"Kitchener was informed vesterday by an escaped British prisoner that Dewett's wagons had crossed the Vaal. "Hunter reports that he made 4,140 varied stock of Guns prisoners in the Bethlehem-Harrismith district, a majority of whom are now en route for Cape Town. Three guns and four thousand horses were captured, and ten wagon loads of ammunition and 195,000 rounds of ammunition were destroyed.
