MACHINERY AND TRANSPORTATION BUILDING, PAN-AMERICAN EXPOSITION.



Copyright, 1900, by the Pan-American Exposition Co. This big structure is 500 by 350 feet, with a central court 100 by 175 feet. Its type of architecture is the Spanish renaissance, modified to suit the conditions of the Exposition. The roofs are laid with red tile and the cemented walls are brilliant with color. The colors are to be reds and yellows in light tints. The facade will present an arched effect, with broad, overhanging eaves, in imitation of the old mission buildings in California and Mexico. The Central Court will be a veritable tropical garden, with a long, narrow pool, containing interesting specimens of aquatic life, and will have seats, where the weary visitor may rest a moment. The Exposition is to be held in Buffalo in 1901 from May 1 to Nov. 1.

WAS A SURPRISE.

The Government Cotton Crop Report of Condition to the Trade.

Those interested in the cotton market here, were greatly surprised at the rapid advance in price of futures in New York market, yesterday.

Of the New York market, Mr. J. E. Latham, had the following: The government report on the Cotton Condition, 76, received today, created a sensation in the speculative market, where the trade had figured on a condition of 82 to 85. The report caused the rapid advance in the price of future months.

The following are the cotton crop conditions on dates noted, which are of interest at this time:

The present report of condition received, yesterday, 76, is the lowest August since 1890.

Protest Against Negro in Politics.

The New York Sun, of the 8th inst. has the following under date of dispatch from Raleigh:

"An effort is being made to inject the negro question into the National campaign in this State by reason of the fact that President McKinley has appointed several negro post masters in Eastern North Carolina. This effort comes from the pronounced Bryan organs. To-day J. William Bailey, the editor of the Biblical Recorder, the organ of the Baptist denomination in North Carolina, and the most influential paper in the State, wrote letters to Democratic State Chairman Simmons and to Charles Aycock, Democratic Governor-elect, notifying them that if such a campaign is waged he would cast his vote for McKinley as a protest.

Queer of the World.

Doubtless the most unique spot in Europe is the little village of Altsberg, where on its border four countries meet. It is ruled by no monarch, has no soldiers, no police and no taxes. Its inhabitants speak a curious jargon of French and German combined and spend their days in farming the land or working in the valuable calamine mine of which it boasts.

The little town of Stanly, in the Falkland Islands, possesses the most unique school service ever known. Two traveling schoolmasters are provided by the Government, who visit the different families where there are children and give instruction. The length of their visit depends on the astuteness of the children, and they may spend days and weeks, as the case may be, at one house alone.

There is a place in the middle of the Pacific ocean well known to mariners where there is never any Christmas day. This is owing to its being in the one hundred and eightieth degree of longitude and directly opposite to Greenwich, and, therefore, 19 hours ahead of Greenwich time. In a journey around the globe the other 19 hours would have to be marked out of the navigator's calendar, and if this point crossing the antipodes is touched Christmas eve, then there can be no Christmas day.

In one of the West Indies group there is a colony of some 800 whites and blacks where there are neither towns nor villages, nor fresh water supplies. In fact there is such a scarcity of everything that the Government has to send food and employment to the inhabitants to keep them from starving. Salt fish and sweet potatoes are the staple foods of the Anguilla, and the only water obtainable is brackish and tainted by the sea.—Ex.

KITCHENER CROSSING VAAL.

Pursuing Dewet With Cavalry and Mounted Infantry—Methuen Engaged Part of The Force.

LONDON, August 9.—The following report dated Pretoria, August 9, has been received from Lord Roberts:

"Kitchener was informed yesterday by an escaped British prisoner that Dewet's wagons had crossed the Vaal. Afterwards I heard the sound of guns, which I think, must have been Methuen's, as I directed him to take up a position between Potchefstroom and Lingkop, where he could intercept the enemy who crossed the river at Dewet's Drift. Kitchener is crossing the Vaal with cavalry and mounted infantry.

"Hunter reports that he made 4,140 prisoners in the Bethlehem-Hartmann district, a majority of whom are now en route for Cape Town. Three guns and four thousand horses were captured, and ten wagon loads of ammunition and 195,000 rounds of ammunition were destroyed.

"The garrison of Elands River, which I fear, has been captured, consisted of about 300 Bushmen and Rhodesians. I had hoped that Carrington had been in time to withdraw the garrison, but it seems that Delarey, learning of Ian Hamilton's approach to Rustenburg, hurried westward and surrounded the garrison before Carrington arrived.

"Methuen telegraphs that he engaged a part of Dewet's force yesterday near Beterskroon. He drove the enemy off of a succession of hills, which they held obstinately. Our casualties were seven men killed or wounded, including four officers."

No Extra Session Likely.

BOSTON, August 9.—Secretary Long has left Hingham for his vacation at Buckport, Maine. Before leaving he said:

"We are not looking for territorial aggrandizement in China and will be content with proper indemnity. I think China will see the necessity of submitting to our demands, thus obviating war. Other powers may fight despite the safe deliverance of foreigners. I can only speak for the part America will play."

"I do not believe that the statement of a Minister that he cannot leave the capital of a country without danger to his life is equivalent to a declaration of war from the country which threatens him. I think the affair will work itself out amicably. In view of the facts as I believe them to be, an extra session of Congress is unnecessary."
