nding Regotiations Troops Stay at Pe kin Empress Dowager Very Bostih to Foreigners.

CHAFFEE TO REMAIN.

Washington, Sept. 5.—Orders were sent General Chaffee to-day advising him that negotiations are pending for a joint occupation of Pekin by the Powers or a joint withdrawal therefrom. Chaffee is instructed to remain at Pe

kin until further notice. The message from General Chaffee esterday indicates that he expects a arge part of the force of 5,000 men will be quartered in China during the coming winter, and it is assumed he has been informed that until peace is restored and an agreement reached for payment of indemnity American soldiers will not be withdrawn from China, though the present troops at Pekin might be sent to

Tientsin or Taku for the winter. The Empress Dowager of China defies the allies and says she will have no peace but is for war and vengeance. She signed an edict at Tel Tunh Fu August 20th, which urges the Chinese viceroys to unite, to raise taxes and enroll troops. She declares an undying hatred for foreigners and tells the viceroys that the court fled from Pekin be cause it feared the Christians would kill the Emperor.

### Confederate Flag Returned.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, SeptembSr 4.-The olors of the Thirtieth Louisiana Regiment, captured by the Forty-sixth Ohio Volunteer Infantry during the Civil War, were returned to a committee of the survivors of the Louislana Regiment at the reunion of the Forty-sixth Ohio Volunteer Infantry at Washington, suburb of Columbus, today.

The flag was captured at Ezra Court house, just outside of Atlanta, Ga., and has been in the relic-room of the State Capitol here for many years.

### Troops Arrive at Manila.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.-General Mac-Arthur cables from Manila under today's date that the transports Meade and California have arrived. The latter was detained at Goam by a broken propeller. The Meade carried a squadron of the Third Cavalry, battalion of the Fif teenth Infantry and a company of en gineers. 
