CHAFFEE TO REMAIN.
Pending Negotiations Troops Stay at Peking
Empress Dowager Very Hostile to Foreigners.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.—Orders were sent General Chaffee to-day advising him that negotiations are pending for a joint occupation of Peking by the Powers or a joint withdrawal therefrom. Chaffee is instructed to remain at Peking until further notice.

The message from General Chaffee yesterday indicates that he expects a large part of the force of 5,000 men will be quartered in China during the coming winter, and it is assumed he has been informed that until peace is restored and an agreement reached for payment of indemnity American soldiers will not be withdrawn from Peking, though the present troops at Peking might be sent to Tientsin or Taku for the winter.

The Empress Dowager of China defies the allies and says she will have no peace but is for war and vengeance.

She signed an edict at Tai Tsin Fu August 20th, which urges the Chinese viceroys to unite, to raise taxes and enroll troops. She declares an undying hatred for foreigners and tells the viceroys that the court fled from Peking because it feared the Christians would kill the Emperor.

Confederate Flag Returned.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 5.—The colors of the Thirtieth Louisiana Regiment, captured by the Forty-sixth Ohio Volunteer Infantry during the Civil War, were returned to a committee of the survivors of the Louisiana Regiment at the reunion of the Forty-sixth Ohio Volunteer Infantry at Washington, a suburb of Columbus, today.

The flag was captured at Ezra Courthouse, just outside of Atlanta, Ga., and has been in the relic-room of the State Capitol here for many years.

Troops Arrive at Manila.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—General MacArthur cables from Manila under today's date that the transports Meade and California have arrived. The latter was detained at Guam by a broken propeller.

The Meade carried a squadron of the Third Cavalry, battalion of the Fifteenth Infantry and a company of engineers. This force originally was intended for China but was diverted at Nagasaki for Manila. The transport probably will be sent to Hongkong to be docked.

General Lee Comes Home.

WASHINGTON, September 4.—Quartermaster-General Ludington is informed that the transport Rawlins left Havana last evening for New York with 57 cabin passengers, including Brig. Gen. Hugh Lee, commanding the Eastern Department of Cuba, who has been granted leave of absence for the purpose of visiting his Virginia home to attend to private business.

The Arbitrators.

WASHINGTON, September 4.—President McKinley has received a reply to the invitation he addressed to former President Grover Cleveland to accept an appointment as a member of The Hague International Arbitration Commission.

Mr. Cleveland's reply will not be made public, but it is understood he has attached certain conditions to his acceptance. The acceptance of former President Harrison has been announced.

Two additional commissioners will be appointed by the President. Former Secretary of State Day is mentioned in connection with the remaining appointments.

RALEIGH.

Question Of Atwater's Renomination Is Attracting Much Interest.

Soldiers' Home Hospital, Senatorial Primary, Students At Wake Forest, Testimony in Railroad Cases, Crop Pest Commission.

RALEIGH, September 5.—The Corporation Commission met today and took up as its special work the matter of classification of freight rates on furniture.

J. J. Rogers of the Corporation Commission, who has been at Asheville ten days, attending the hearing of the tax assessment cases, says that there are now 6,000 summer visitors in the town. In fact it is crowded with them.

The local interest in tomorrow's Democratic Congressional convention here is unusually great. The question is will Atwater be renominated or will he not? The odds are in his favor. Today organized opposition to him began. It is said that if he is defeated E. W. Pou will be nominated.

The Republicans in this district will nominate J. A. Cilles of Chatham for Congress. He was a member of the last legislature.

George Vogler of Salisbury, an inmate of the Soldiers' home here, died last night.

The hospital at the Soldiers home, which will accommodate 100 persons, will be finished next week. It will quickly be furnished by J. S. Carr and other Confederate Veterans.

State veterinarian Cooper Curlee has returned from Edgecombe county. At Tarboro he found there was an outbreak in Mr. McNair's herd of 35 cattle. It was of Texas or tick fever. Fourteen died. Fourteen others were two months ago brought to the herd from a distance and these gave the fever, as ticks were on them.
