AUDITORIUM.

New and Large Hall That Will Accommodate Large Gatherings.

Meekins Says He Will Stick State Ammunition Received. Old Furniture Rate Restored. Primary Machinery Arranged

RALPHAM, N. C., Sept. 6.—The auditorium matter is at last arranged. The Board of Trade building is bought for \$12,500. It is 92x250 feet and the land covers an area of 92x210 feet. One of the stores in the building will be used as an entrance to the auditorium, which will be built in the rear, of brick, with a seating capacity of 2400. The cost of the auditorium will be about \$15,000. The company, which is chartered as the auditorium company, will issue bonds on its project. It has subscription aggregating about \$11,000. The size of the auditorium will be 92,140 feet.

Isaac M. Meekins, Republican nominee for Congress from the first district, here. He says: "I fail to see how the Republican State committee can take me down or put me up, when our district has a committee of its own, and until I do see such a right I shall continue to be a candidate. The majority of our district committee will refuse to authorize D. H. Abbott or any one else to call a new convention as ordered by the State committee. John T. Johnson is here and says there will be a new convention and that he is an aspirant for the nomination. The Republicans certainly are in a pretty mess in the 1st district. Johnson says they will make heroic efforts to poll the full negro vote.

The Agricultural and Mechanical College opens with 30 students. About 50 failed to pass the entrance examinations.

Democrats were numerous here today, to attend the 4th, Congressional district convention.

The State has received its supply of ammunition from the war department and today issued it to the three regiments of the State Guard and the 7 divisions of naval militia.

The State charters the Holmes Grocery Company of Wilmington, Capital \$40,000.

The furniture manufacturers in the State complained against the increase of freight rates on furniture. The railways have quoted this by returning to the old rate. October 3 there will be a hearing by the corporation commission as to general freight rates and classifications.

Senator Butler says in his paper that he and the Republican State Chairman are receiving a great many requests to hold an "indignation meeting" here at Raleigh, as a protest against the recent State election.

A "street carnival" is in progress at Youngville, a town near here, under the auspices of the Seaboard Air Line.

The Democratic State Committee last night arranged all the machinery for holding the Senatorial primary. It also took steps to have a law enacted legalizing primaries, to be participated in by the white voters.

Lost in the Catacombs.

ROME, September 5.—Harry Hengel and George Laughacy, two young Americans, students at the University at Riechstadt, who were here attending a congress of university men, visited the Catacombs of Domitilla yesterday with friends and strayed away and disappeared.

The absence of the young men was not observed until the party had returned to the hotel. They were found early this morning by some German students, who, carrying torches and guided by Signor Marzetti, an archaeologist, searched for them all night.

The Weather Conditions.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6.—Friday rain. Northeast winds becoming high by Friday night.

Weather Conditions.—The tropical storm was central last night near Key West and had greatly increased in intensity with strong winds on the Florida coast. Jupiter reported a maximum of 40 miles, and Key West 40 miles per hour.

No reports have been received this morning from southern Florida, telegraph wires being down. The storm is apparently continuing its northerly movement.

Showers have fallen from southern Georgia southwest and local rains on the Gulf coast.

High temperatures prevailed yesterday over the central and southern sections. A high barometer area with cool or weather is central over the north-west.

The conditions indicate rain in this section by Friday with winds increasing to high.

PEKIN IS QUIET.

Trouble Reported at Canton. American Troops Well Provided. Punishing the Boxers.

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, September 6.—All is reported quiet at Peking. The extreme heat has ended. All necessary supplies for the American troops have been received by General Chaffers and they can be comfortably housed for the winter.

Prince Tuan is reported hiding within two days march of Peking awaiting the result of Russell's proposal to withdraw his troops.

Riots are reported as becoming frequent at Canton, the natives getting favorable to the Boxers. They threaten the lives of the foreign officials.

The allies will make an expedition from Peking to burn a Boxer village and inflict punishment for the murder of missionaries.

In case the allies leave Peking, it will be reported through a China that they were compelled to do so because of inability to hold it and the existing disaffection may, in passing news, be fanned into revolutionary outbreaks.

An official quarters the strong belief is expressed that China will re-establish a Government and name peace commissioners. Intimidations have reached Washington that steps are now being taken toward the appointment of such a peace commission, including Li Hung Chang, the Viceroy of Nankin and Wu Chang, an Prince Ching.
