## ITS EFFECT.

Discussion of the Nomination of E. W. POU For Congress.

Boston of Winston Nominated. Effect of Short Crops. One Encampment. Students Arriving. New Masonic Lodges.

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—The Democratic Congressional Convention of this district literally made a night of it last night, and at 1:30 this morning, on the 11th ballot, nominated Edward W. POU. It is singular but true that much of the talk regarding the nomination today was as to its bearing upon the Senatorial contest between F. M. Simmons and J. S. Carr. So many things hinge upon the latter contest that this is not surprising. Some persons declared that the best political move was to select Alexander, that this would have a happy effect upon Populists in this district and in several others. On the other hand there was a hard fight against Alexander and a demand for a man who had always been a democrat.

The nomination of J. C. Buxton of Winston for Congress by the 8th district Democrats is by no means unexpected.

There were eight candidates for the nomination, which was given in the 39th ballot.

Merchants say the shortness of the crops will considerably reduce trade. Very little cotton is as yet coming in but the picking is progressing as rapidly as possible.

The Republican Congressional Convention will be held here next week. It fact there will be two conventions unless some sort of an agreement is arrived at, as there is a negro faction in the party, with its Chairman, E. A. Johnson, who says he is the only chairman. J. A. Giles of Chatham says he is the true chairman. Each has called a convention. There will certainly be only one military encampment this year, that of the First Regiment. This will be held later than ever before. For a long time a practice march was contemplated. The regiment has shelter tents and complete field outfit and can make a march at any time.

Students for the various colleges and schools are arriving here in greater numbers than ever before. Never were the openings of the schools so gratifyingly large. This is the fact not only here but elsewhere in the State.

Two new Masonic lodges have been organized this month.

High Point is to have a military company. Its organization is now in progress.

## PASSED OFF.

Predicted Tropical Storm Went into the Gulf. No Change Now Likely.

WASHINGTON, September 7.—For North Carolina. Saturday, partly cloudy, probably showers in south and west portions. Fresh northeast winds.

Weather Conditions.—The tropical storm in the vicinity of Key West during the past two or three days has moved northwest into the Gulf of Mexico and is apparently central this morning off the mouth of the Mississippi. Rain and a northeast gale is prevailing at Port Eads with a maximum velocity of 56 miles during the night. Heavy rains have fallen in Florida and showers along the Atlantic coast northward to Charleston.

High temperatures prevailed yesterday on the Atlantic coast from Virginia to Massachusetts, over the interior valleys, and southward to the Gulf. No immediate prospect of high winds on South Atlantic coast.

## Germany and Russia.

Berlin, September 6.—The German vice-admiral at Tokyo telegraphs that Captain Pohl, in his report from Pekin, says the impression he formed on marching through the Imperial Palace August 28 was "dirt and neglect." No treasures, he says, were observed.

The German press continues a lively discussion of the Russian proposal, the more plain-spoken papers stating that Russia's motives are selfish. The Central organ, the Cologne Volkszeitung, says: "Russia's purpose is to get all foreign troops as quickly as possible out of China and then to lay aside the mask and seize the Empire for herself. Her proposal is an unfriendly act toward Germany, since Count von Waldersee announced that he would never give an order to retreat."

The Volkszeitung says: "Russia is trying to establish a protectorate over the Celestial Empire, in doing which it makes no difference to her if she vexes Emperor William and thwarts the policy of Germany."

## NOT HUNG.

Strange Circumstances That Brought a Reprieve to Kinsauls

RALEIGH, September 7.—Archie Kinsauls, who was to have been hanged at Clinton today, but his throat this morning. The Sheriff telegraphed this fact to Governor Russell, saying, "Kinsauls has out his throat seriously. Doctors think fatally. Wire instructions." The Governor replied, "Execution Kinsauls postponed until next Friday. Reprieve by mail."

Never was greater pressure brought upon Governor Russell in a capital case than in that of Archie Kinsauls, the murderer who was under sentence to be hanged at Clinton. The Governor had considered the case for many weeks.

## Farthest North.

CHRISTIANIA, September 6.—A telegram from Tromsø, Norway, in reporting the return of the Stella Polaris, with the Duke of Abruzzi's Arctic expedition on board, says the Stella Polaris reached a point in latitude 86° 33' north, thus penetrating farther north than Dr. Nansen's record.

The Stella Polaris remained fast to the ice for 11 months. The pressure stove to her sides, making a hole 15 inches in breadth. Her machinery was also damaged. The members of the expedition suffered many hardships and were compelled to eat their sled dogs. A Norwegian engineer and two Italians, members of the expedition, perished.

Dr. Nansen, who returned from his expedition to the Arctic regions in August, 1896, reported that he left his vessel, the Fram, March 14, 1895, in 84° north latitude and traversed the Polar Sea to a point 86° 14' north of the new Siberian Islands. This was a point 4° farther north than any previous explorer had reached.

The Duke of Abruzzi, with his expedition, sailed from Christiania June 15 of last year and expected to be gone 18 months.
