## LI FOR PEACE.

Wants It Immediately. Conger Distrusts The Viceroys, Allies May Split.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—Minister Wu is asked by Prince Chang to request the Secretary of State to instruct Minister Conger to negotiate for peace immediately. Li Hung Chang has arrived at Tian Tsin.

It is believed that a refusal of England and Germany to withdraw their troops caused Russia to change its mind and that it was because of a knowledge of that change that this government made a promise of protecting Li Hung Chang, which makes it practically certain that our troops will be kept in Pekin as long as the negotiations which Li is to conduct on behalf of the Chinese government, go on there. Minister Conger has sent an important communication concerning those negotiations, but the department of State declines to give it out. It is known that Mr. Conger does not feel as much confidence in Li Hung Chang, as this government has exhibited, and he has probably sent a word of warning as to the danger of trusting him too far.

Shrewd observers are predicting that soon after the opening of negotiations with the Chinese the allies will split and that each nation will endeavor to get the best settlement it can regardless of what the others get. That is believed to be the end that Li Hung Chang is aiming at. The number of those who believe that Germany and Russia will in the end be found acting together and that both will demand territory is increasing.

## The Strike Fully On.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., September 17.—Hardly a miner reported for work today at the colliers in Wyoming Valley One hundred and forty thousand men have struck work. The Superintendents are dazed by the completeness of the strike. Not a single miner went to work in the Lackawanna Valley.

Three-fourths of the miners in the Lehigh Valley are working. The strike is effective only in the two first named sections, where the tie up is complete.

## When Kruger Arrives.

LONDON, September 17.—When former President Kruger comes to Europe the authorities are instructed to treat him merely as a private citizen and to take no notice of his movements.

THE HAGUE, September 16.—The Government of the Netherlands has telegraphed to Lorenzo Marquez offering a Dutch warship to bring President Kruger to Holland.

LONDON, September 16.—Mrs. Kruger, according to a dispatch so the Daily Express, has arrived at Lorenzo Marquez and joined her husband. It is said that the object of his visit to Europe is to negotiate with Great Britain and that he has full power to that end.

## RALEIGH.

The New Roney Memorial Library is Now Complete.

E. W. POU TAKES CHARGE OF HIS CANVASS. Heavy Rains New Chief Marshall. Chosen Friends. Another Negro Murderer.

RALEIGH, Sept. 17.—The Roney memorial free library here is now complete, save the furniture. There is a library room and a hall for concerts, lectures and amateur theatricals. The interior of the building is the most beautiful in this State. In fact the building will be one of the "sights" of Raleigh.

E. W. POU, Democratic nominee for congress in this district, arrived here today. For ten days he has been very sick at his home, Smithfield; with carbuncles, erysipelas and malarial fever. He left today for Pittsboro, to begin his canvass. He has received letters from W. B. Shaw, Frank Spruill and W. C. Hammer, who are among his opponents for the nomination, saying they will do their utmost to secure his election.

The rains have fallen here, and appear to be quite general. Two inches fell here Saturday night.

Sydney Cooper, of Henderson, who was appointed Chief Marshal of the State fair here in October, has declined, by reason of the fact of his approaching marriage to a daughter of Mr. Harrell, Atlanta, and W. T. Old of Elizabeth City is appointed the Chief Marshal.

There is now a railway 11 miles in length from Lenoir, Caldwell county, to Charlottesville. Saturday a survey of a 10 miles extension of it, to Piedmont, was completed. The extension will be built at once. It penetrates a 50,000 acre body of white pine timber.

The "Chosen Friends," a fraternal insurance company, is unlawfully doing business in this State, the commissioner of insurance says. It has no license.

The State charters the Edgemoor Land Company, of Durham, capital \$50,000, Julian S. Carr, J. S. Carr, Jr., and T. M. Gorman, stockholders.

Last night in one of the negro wards here a cold-blooded murder was committed. A negro man, married, aged 25, "Boots" Brown, by name, went to the house of a negro woman, the wife of John Davis, called her to the gate, and without saying a word shot her in the mouth. As she turned to run into her house he shot her again, this time in the back. She ran through the house and fell in a rear room. In a minute she was dead. She lived with her mother. She had been married a little over a year. She and her husband had for some months lived apart. His home is at Norfolk, that great refuge of North Carolina negroes. He came here last week and urged her to go to Norfolk with him. She agreed and was to have gone on the 24th instant. After killing her Brown ran along the street and at the corner fired two more shots, then fled westward, throwing off his coat. Many negroes pursued. They said today if they had caught him a lynching would certainly have resulted. A negro preacher was in a few yards of the house when the fatal shots were fired and saw the murderer.

## FROST IN NORTHWEST.

Cool Weather Indicated For Eastern North Carolina.

WASHINGTON, September 17.—For North Carolina, Tuesday, fair, cooler in eastern portion. Fresh west to north winds.  
Weather Conditions.—The high barometer and cool weather area over the Canadian northwest on Saturday has moved slowly southward and is central over the northwestern States this morning with low temperatures in that section. Light frost is reported from St. Paul. Heavy frost from Blauvelt, and killing frost from Haron, S. D., with a minimum temperature of 30°.

Cooler weather has overspread the lake region, the interior, and outward to the New England and Middle Atlantic coasts.

Fair and cooler weather is indicated for this section during the next 24 hours.

## EIGHT THOUSAND.

Likely to be the number of victims. Re-Opening the Streets.

GALVESTON, September 17.—There is still danger of a water famine in the city. Some of the streets are being neglected and many of them are now cleared of wreckage.

The railway people expect to re-establish communication by Thursday. The track of one road is completed in Virginia Point. Last night the State Health officer made a report to Governor Sawyer. He says that the loss of life is eight thousand.

DALLAS, TEXAS, September 17.—Refugees from Galveston and the coast country are beginning to reach Dallas in such numbers as to demand special attention from the municipal authorities. They come in a deplorable condition. They have no money, their clothing is dilapidated and soiled, and many of them are broken in health. Mayor Cabell this evening issued a call for the relief committee and members of the city government to meet him at his office at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning to take measures to provide for the comfort of the unfortunates. It is likely a camp will have to be established in the suburbs of the city, as the refugees are likely to have to be supported in Dallas throughout the winter.
