RALEIGH.

There Are Now Four Senatorial Candidates In The Field.

Jarvis Come to Light Cotton Sales For August. Students At St. Mary's Water Works. Primary Talked Of.

Raleigh, September 21.—The State charters the Southern Consumers Brewing and Ice Company of Charlotte, capital \$300,000; Wilhelm Grueser, J. T. Anthony, R. L. Lucas and J. W. Cook stockholders.

A charter is also granted the Asheville Auditorium Company, with 2,576 shares value \$25,760. A. B. Andrews of Raleigh being the largest shareholder (300 shares). The cotton sales here since August 31, by wagon, are 2,800 bales, about 800 more than last season to this date.

The number of students at St. Mary's college here is said to be the largest on record. The rector said today in reply to an inquiry, that he could not give the number as he did not know it.

The tax list for this county shows an increase of \$2,000 over last year and an increase of 77 polls.

The yield of cotton on the county farm near here will be 1 1/2 bales to the acre.

There are no unformed Odd Fellows in this State and very few unformed Masons. The reason is said to be the expense.

The Republicans have held all their congressional conventions save in the 1st, 3d and 6th districts.

There are now four candidates for the U. S. Senatorship in the field, ex-Senator Jarvis having announced himself today. Inquiry is made as to whether H. G. Connor will enter the list.

A lady who one night some months ago claimed to have caught her foot in a gas pipe exposed above a sidewalk and who sued the city for \$4000, today took \$250 and seemed glad to get it.

There is a movement for a primary here at the November election to get the view of the voters as to whether the legislature should be asked to give the aldermen the power to purchase the water works and issue bonds.

Kruger's Trip to Europe.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Ex-President Kruger comes to Europe to appeal to the Tribunal of International Arbitration for a peace conference.

The Dutch cruiser Gelderland is going to Delagoa bay, to take on board President Kruger and convey him to Holland. The offer of this warship to convey Mr. Kruger was made when it was learned that Mr. Kruger desired to visit Europe. Simultaneously with making the offer the Government informed Great Britain of the action taken and the latter in thanking the Netherlands for the information, declared the British Government had no intention to interfere with Mr. Kruger's projected journey.

Fire at Concord, N. C.

CONCORD, N. C., September 21.—Flames threatened to wipe out the whole business section of this place early this morning, but by heroic efforts the flames are now under control.

The fire originated in a small house on Depot street and the high wind and lack of water made matters critical.

The loss will run up in the thousands, as six dwellings and two stores are in ashes.

Weather conditions.—The low barometer area has moved eastward out of the Lake Superior region followed by clearing weather over the northwest and upper lakes.

FRESH CHINESE TROUBLE.

Boxers Burn Villages Li Almost Unnoticed Russian Massacre.

WASHINGTON, September 21.—Fresh disorder of the Boxers has broken out near Canton, China. Several villages were destroyed. Several besieged missionaries escaped. The Chinese troops could do nothing against them. The allies have sent a force to the scene of the disturbance.

Li Huang Chang is at Taku. He has attracted little attention. Only the Russian and Japanese officers called upon him.

Several of the powers concur in Germany's note to China. Germany believes that all will concur in the plan proposed.

Detailed reports show that the Russian troops massacred twelve thousand Chinese at Biagonespel. Not one Chinese man escaped.

War is again threatened in China. Just when everybody thought that progress was being made toward the opening of negotiations between the powers and China for a peaceable settlement, the Emperor of Germany throws a bomb into the council by demanding that the Chinese officials responsible for the attacks upon foreigners be punished before negotiations are opened. If that demand is backed by the power it means war, as China cannot possibly comply with it. The nature of the answer sent by this government to Germany's request for endorsement of the demand is not known, but it is known that this government will not participate in a war on China.

The Chinese Minister to the United States is so worked up over Germany's demand that he has dropped his usual diplomatic reticence and talks with much freedom of it. Among other things, he said: "I am indeed surprised at this action of the German government. The emperor imposes impossible conditions, and is nothing more nor less than notification of the proposed dismemberment of the Empire. According to the terms laid down, I myself may be liable to be beheaded because some government selects me as a probable leader attached to the Chinese government. The note is evidently directed at the Dowager Empress and Prince Tuan, and as both are members of the government, to punish them as suggested would be to leave the Empire without government."

THE COAL STRIKE.

Matters Assume a Worse Aspect. Statement of Wages.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., September 21.—There appears to be no protection furnished for the Pennsylvania coal miners who have not struck. The sheriffs of the counties in which the strikers are located are afraid to interfere with the strikers.

The railways are being crippled in their work, and the factories are getting short of coal. There is a plan being formed to tie up all the coal carrying railways in order to aid the strikers.

Much violence has begun to transform the mining region into a scene of wild disorder. Hundreds of foreigners who are attempting to go to work have been attacked.

The operators maintain that they will not recognize the miners' organization, though in many instances they would be willing to arbitrate with their own men.

The Pennsylvania Coal Company has issued its statement showing by a resume of its controller's reports that average wage of miners and laborers in all of their twenty-seven collieries, for the month of August, was respectively \$2.50 and \$1.67 per day and that twenty days were worked.

Director Merriam declined to make an official forecast of the total, but said his personal opinion was that it would be about 75,000,000.
