#### CHAPPEE AT TIEN TSIN.

Special to Journal WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 .- General Chaf ee arrived at Tien Tsin to-day and conferred with his staff officers of the various departments regarding the estab-lishing of a winter base near the city, and then made a general inspection of

General Chaffee visited Li Hung Chang and informally discussed the out-look of affairs in China and for a settle ment of the Chinese troubles.

He offered an American escort to Li Bung Chang to Pekin. No other power except Russia has yet officially recog-

The British Foreign Office denies that a reply has been sent to Germany refusing the Kalser's plans as to the policy to e pursued in China.

It is feared in official circles that Gernany is rushing into a war with China. On account of this the authorities here ere much gratified that the President ordered the withdrawal of General Chafee's command before the arrival of Count von Waldersee. In case war should occur between Germany and China General Chaffee and his legation guard will remain in Pekin to protec he American Legation.

Definite and official information has een received that Prince Tuan has been appointed President of the Privy Council of China, instead of Grand Secretary, as was first reported. A number of other Chinese officials prominent in the recent aprising have been similarly honored. The Chinese Minister has not been advised of Prince Tuan's appointment, but he expressed the belief, after calling at the State Department, that the report probably was true.

#### LOOKS LIKE COLLAPSE.

Miners in the Markie Cotlleries Return

HARRITON, Pa, September 27—The miners of the Markie colliery near Wilkesbarre returned to their work in re returned to their work in the mines. The differences between the coal miners and the op rators will be settled by arbitration.

The Markle mines were closed awaiting the determination of the men whetl. er they would join in the strike or agree to arbitrate under the terms of the contract they signed with the proprietors Their principal grievance was the wage scale. They wanted only about half of what the United Mine Workers are demanding. They have decided to accept the firms proposition in regard to the holsting of men 'rom the slope, acquiesco in the refusal to pay the engineers by the hour and to arbitrate all the other grievances excepting those relating to semi-monthly pay and the location of powder houses, which have been adjusted by the auswer of Markie & Co.

The return of the miners to work in the Markle collieries is considered a bad blow to the organization of the United Mine Workers.

Seven out of twelve colliers near Hazelton are working but none of them full-handed. The Hazelton operator would be glad to settle the strike by reducing the price of powder from \$2.75 to 1.50 and by increasing the price for labor if necessary, if they did not have to make any deal with Mr. Mitchell or other representatives of the miners' or ganization, but they are unwilling to enter into any negotiations with Mitch


