SENATORIAL.

Question Overshadows the National Election in the State.

Top Cotton Crop Promises to be Very Large. Educational Returns. Tax Assessment Cases.

RALEIGH, Oct. 2.—Labor Commissioner Lacy is again at his office, after a very severe attack of Asthma. He is now compiling the returns from mill owners and operatives, and from farmers.

Go where one will the only talk heard is about the senatorial contest. Today it is said that not a few persons desire the senatorial primary fixed for a later date than election day, on the ground that it interferes too much with the election. On the other hand there are assertions that it will do more than anything else to bring out a big vote at the election. Some declare the whole primary idea is wrong and this year's experience will prove to be final.

The State charter the Gilmer Dry Goods Company of Winston, capital \$150,000. R. J. Reynolds, a widely known plug tobacco manufacturer, is a large stockholder.

Among the arrivals are W. D. McIver, of New Bern; Francis D. Winston, and St. Leon Scull of Wilson; Charles Price, of Salisbury.

Farmers say they have never seen before such a growth of cotton at the top. A cotton-grower yesterday said that if there were no frost until middle of November he really believed the new growth would produce a third of a crop, so full of blooms and squares is it.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is now making up the returns for this year. Last year all the reports from county superintendents and treasurers were in hand, while this year ten of each are short.

Standing Master Shepherd is this week taking testimony in the tax assessment case at Weldon. The main idea of the Corporation Commission appears to be to endeavor to prove that there is no systematic undervaluation of property other than railway property. In making assessments. A State official says that the undervaluation is something like 33 per cent. He does not say that it is systematic or by an understanding of fixed rule.

Weather Conditions.

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 2.—For North Carolina: Rain Wednesday. Fresh northeast winds.

Weather Conditions.—The conditions along the Atlantic coast are similar to yesterday, the barometer being high over the northeast sections and low to the south and southeast of Florida causing fresh northeasterly winds from New England to Key West. The weather is generally cloudy along the coast with showers in the Middle and South Atlantic States.

Local snow is falling at Huron, South Dakota.

The temperatures have been generally moderate except in the southern half of the Gulf States.

The conditions will continue unsettled in this section with rain and fresh northeast winds.

DEMOCRATIC CLUBS.

Fifty Thousand Visitors Expected in Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., October 1.—Arrangements for the convention for the National Association of Democratic Clubs here Wednesday and Thursday have been practically completed. Officers of the association expected there will be 50,000 visitors here by Wednesday.

Adlai Stevenson, candidate for Vice-President, will arrive tomorrow evening. Senator Jones, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, W. J. Bryan and Bourke Cockran are expected to arrive at noon Wednesday.

On the Vaal.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—The Boers asked for an armistice of five days and made use of the time to drive cattle north from Oliphants river.

General Baden-Powell has arrived at Pretoria to take command of the police in the Transvaal and Orange River colony, where it is proposed to maintain a force of 12,000 men, all under Baden-Powell.

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TIED UP TIGHT.

Miners Confident and Insist on Their Terms. Operators Against Coal Roads.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., October 2.—President Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers, says that the strike is now complete and that there will be no resumption of work unless there is first a convention representing every colliery.

The miners declare that their Union must be recognized.

The independent coal operators are defiant. Their committee waited upon the president of the coal roads and protested against their being coerced into granting higher wages and other concessions. They will not join in the offer of a 10 per cent increase unless the coal-carrying companies agree to a low then 65 per cent. Instead of 60 per cent. of the tide-water selling prices for their product. They are not making 10 per cent. on their investments, they declare, and if they have a 10 per cent. increase wages 10 per cent. it will practically wipe out their margin of profit, and they might as well close up their mines.

President Mitchell does not believe that the operators can hold out much longer. He believes that if the strike should be unduly prolonged it may make history by changing the drift of popular opinion and making one of the candidates at the coming election President.

No Arms For China.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Li Hung Chang abandons the idea of going to Peking. He is now at Tien Tsin and will negotiate with the Russian Minister when the latter has arrived.

General Claxton says that it will require a month to get the American troops out of China.

The powers agree to a plan in for bidding in the future any importation of arms into that country.

Great Britain, France, Germany and Russia officially announce that they are in accord on the question of the Chinese settlement proposed by Delcasse which plan favors an immediate opening of negotiations.

BRYAN'S GREAT CAMPAIGN.

Sweeps Through Minnesota and Speaks Six Hours.

ST. PAUL, Minn., October 1.—Mr. Bryan today traversed what are known as the Pine Barrens and the Scrub Oak portions of Minnesota, reaching the agricultural part of the State north of this city during the afternoon. He made the first speech of the day at West Superior, Wis., beginning before 8 o'clock in the morning. He immediately crossed the St. Louis river to Duluth and starting with an hour's speech there. He made speeches at eight other places on the way, which, together with the speech at Duluth and Superior and those made tonight in this city, made an even dozen speeches for the day.

Four of the speeches averaged an hour in duration and the remaining eight, fifteen minutes each, making about six hours of speech-making all told for the day.

The train was decorated with the national colors and the special car bore the inscription "The Republic, No Empire," and "Equal right to all."

New York, October 1.—Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt today took up the burden under which his grandfather and father fell. He became in fact as well as name head of his house—manager of its great railroad fortunes.

Young Mr. Vanderbilt resolution to go to work was as unexpected as it was surprising. Not even his most intimate friends dreamed that he contemplated such a thing. He has given the impression that he preferred the existence of a society man, but his fiancée, Miss Elsie French, urged him, it is said, to look after his own estates.

The announcement was made last night at Newport at a dinner given by Mrs. T. O. France, mother of his fiancée. A few of their young friends were present, but had not the slightest inkling of young Vanderbilt's intention, until suddenly he arose and said simply that what he would be on his way to New York within an hour to begin a new life.

"I am going to my father's desk," he added, "to try to take up the work where he left off. I want you to wish me good luck."

This morning he arrived in New York and spent the day in conferring with officials of the New York Central. Young Vanderbilt is the eldest young man in the world. He is worth \$50,000,000 and his income is \$3,000,000 a year. It is said to be his intention to exceed the wealth of his uncle, W. K. Vanderbilt, estimated at \$100,000,000.
