STATE COTTON.

All On State Farms Will be Picked
By November 15.

Dockery Accepts Nomination. Drink Causes Trouble. State Fair. Fruit Growers Organize. State Literary Association.

BALDWIN, Oct. 15.—The cotton on the penitentiary farms will all be picked by November 15. The yield is now estimated at 1600. The acreage is hardly half as large as last year, when 3000 bales were produced. The cause of the decrease in acreage is that nearly four times as many peanuts were planted.

Oliver H. Dockery is the Republican nominee for congress in the 9th district and accepts. Of course he has not a ghost of a chance against Bellamy.

The State Fair will be open two nights next week. This is a new feature. It is principally for the benefit of the people who cannot leave their work in the day time.

The State charters the Cole Manufacturing Company, of Charlotte, to make iron and cotton planters and general agricultural machinery. The capital is \$13,000, and E. A. Cole and others are the stockholders.

The Supreme Court is devoting this week to appeals from the 4th district.

The State Literary Association, newly formed and of which Justice Walter Clark is president, will meet next week. 25th instant in the new Raney memorial library here. It will be the first use an informal sort of dedication of this building, one of the most beautiful in the State.

A call by Gerald McCarthy for the formation of a State fruit shippers' association has proved so popular that the new organization of fruit growers for mutual protection will be effected in the auditorium of the agricultural department here, October 23rd at 6 p. m. Prominent fruit growers from all parts of the State will deliver addresses.

The weather report for September for the State, issued today, says the monthly mean temperature was 74.9, which is 4.5 degrees above the normal, highest 78.8 at Southport, lowest 63.1 at Linville. The mean temperature was the highest on record. The rainfall was 2.45 inches, or 1.90 below the normal.

BRYAN'S NEW YORK VISIT.
Speaks in Madison Square Garden Tonight. Greatest Meeting of The Campaign.
New York, Oct. 15.—Hon. William J. Bryan will arrive here over the New York Central railroad at 1.45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Bryan will be joined by Adlai E. Stevenson and Webster Davis. The reception committee includes Mayor Van Wyck, Richard Croker O. H. P. Belmont and others.

Mr. Bryan and his party will be taken to the Hoffman House. He will receive a few callers during the afternoon and will be the guest of the local Democracy at 6 o'clock at a dinner which will be served in the Moorish room of the hotel.

The Democratic nominee and the other speakers will leave the hotel at five minutes before 7 o'clock, escorted by two platoons of mounted police, each speaker being accompanied in a carriage by members of the reception committee. Messrs. Bryan and Stevenson will go directly to Madison Square Garden, where the meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 o'clock. The doors will be open at half past 5 o'clock. All the boxes have been reserved, but the other seats will be free. Superintendent Reynolds, of the Garden, says the building will seat 14,000.

Edward M. Shepard is to preside and he will make a short speech. It is expected that Mr. Bryan will begin about half past 7 o'clock and speak for an hour. He will be followed by Mr. Stevenson, Webster Davis, John B. Stanchfield and William F. Mackey. W. Bourke Cockran was to have spoken, but he is in the West trying to recover his voice.

From the garden a committee will escort Mr. Bryan to a stand at Twenty-fourth street and Madison avenue, where he will make another address at 8.30 o'clock. Tammany Hall, on Fourteenth street, will be Mr. Bryan's third stopping place. Then he will go to Cooper Union about 10 o'clock for still another speech.

The escorting committee will remain with Mr. Bryan and his party until the meetings are over, and then taking the party back to the Hoffman House, will turn the guests over to the State Committee, which will be in charge of the up-State trip that Mr. Bryan will begin on Wednesday morning.
