THE MOSQUITO A FEVER GERM CONVEYER.

The article published in these columns in a recent issue, in regard to experiments made at Quemados, Cuba, where yellow fever was epidemic, and where by careful examination it was found that the mosquito served as "intermediate host" for the parasite of yellow fever is an article full of interest.

From the observations obtained at Quemados, the question of the mosquito being a fever germ conveyer, would seem to be settled, and it is in this connection, that a recent article on the mosquito as a conveyer of malaria germs which appeared in the local columns of the JOURNAL, is of interest on the same subject.

From reading the report of the experiments made in Cuba, there can be little doubt that the mosquito in the yellow fever cases there was the "intermediate host."

In the case reported in the JOURNAL, which was from information furnished by Dr. Charles Duffy, of this city, while no direct experiments were made, yet from Dr. Duffy's observations, he being a careful student, it was fairly well established that malarial fever germs had been conveyed to a person in this vicinity, who had a prolonged case of the fever, and where in the room of the patient were found a number of the special kind of malarial mosquitoes.

It is not necessary through these cases to condemn the entire mosquito world, but that this insect in certain classes, is a conveyer of germs, there is little question.

The next thing for scientists to discover, is a method by which these health destroying mosquitoes, the "intermediate host" class may be eliminated.
