RALEIGH.

Republican Makes a Claim. A Family Quarrel. In 1st, District, President Ray Remains. New Books For Rancey Library.

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 2.—J. A. Giles, the Republican nominee for Congress in this district, is here and makes the bold assertion that he will make a great run and that he will carry his county (Chatham). He says he will get a nice percentage of the Populist vote.

J. C. L. Harris, Gov. Russell's right hand man, is out in a severe criticism of Senator Pritchard's management of the Republican party. This moves postmaster Bailey of Raleigh to say that Harris does not like Pritchard because Governor Russell will not let him like him.

Dr. D. H. Abbott of the 1st, district, who assumes to be the head of the Republican party there, says the prospects are bright for the election of Dr. Alexander to Congress, and that Isaac Meekins, the other Republican candidate, is to take the breast works and that the voters are deserting him. Meekins' friends tell a very different story, as they say Alexander does not have a ghost of a chance. The fact is that the Republican party is all to pieces in that district.

Secretary Bruner of the agricultural department is advised that the South Mountain gold mining company, of which Robert P. Poe of Newport News is president, is having great success with its mine in Burke county. It is now exploiting the vein and finding rich ore in quartz, many specimens showing fine gold.

Grand Secretary Woodell of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows left today for King's Mountain. He will do the work of the district deputy in that section, the latter having recently died. Odd Fellowship, he says is on a great boom in North Carolina.

One hundred firms here have already joined the merchants protective association.

Next week the work of extending the Cape Fear and Northern railway southward toward Harnett county will begin. This road is owned by the wealthy Dukes of Durham.

The idea of erecting a monument here to the memory of Calvin H. Wiley, the father of the present public school system is a popular chord.

The movement of negroes north from this section has ceased for the present, but will be renewed in the Spring. Many will leave here next year.

John E. Kay, principal of the Institution for the blind here, positively declines to accept the presidency of a Kentucky college. He prefers to remain here. The institution here ranks among the best in the country.

At the next meeting of the executive committee of the State Fair a proposition will be made for the holding of a State Exposition during October and November, 1902.

The Negro State Fair here closed today. It was Educational Day and 3000 were present.

Dr. Henry McKee Tucker has been appointed by Superintendent W. H. Day physician to the penitentiary.

Sun Brothers circus, which returned here will again go into Winter quarters at the State Fair grounds.

Two thousand volumes have arrived for the new Rancey Memorial Library. Five thousand more are to follow. The library will be formally opened January 1. An expert is here to classify and arrange the books.

Dr. William B. Phillips, formerly of the University of North Carolina, goes to the University of Texas. He is a son of the late Rev. D. Charles Phillips of the University of North Carolina.

LIPTON CLOSES PORK CORNER.

Price Rushed up to \$20. Believed to Have Made \$350,000.

CHICAGO, October 31.—The culmination of the October pork corner, controlled by Sir Thomas Lipton, came today when pork for delivery this season advanced \$3, rising on less than a dozen trades from \$17, yesterday's closing price, to \$20 at the close today.

Shorts who held off until the last moment boosted the price to \$20. It was asserted that Sir Thomas could have made the price much higher, but he declared he had no intention of "squaring" anybody.

As a result of his deal here, Lipton is believed to have made \$350,000. There were only 35,000 barrels of pork that could be delivered, and the Englishman owned them all, as well as twice that number bought from people who did not have a barrel they could deliver.

When the price reached \$16 some time ago the majority of shorts thought it time to buy some of the pork they had contracted to deliver at approximately \$11 per barrel during October. Numerous private settlements are said to have been made, so that while bearish speculators in pork have received some painful financial injuries, the wounds have not been mortal.

A private settlement of 1,000 barrels was made near the end of the session. Lipton's representative allowing a barrel short to take that amount at \$11 per barrel, assuring the buyer that at the close the price would be \$20. That he knew whereof he spoke was made plain to everybody later, for as the closing bell sounded shorts were shouting bids of \$20.

Punishing the Guilty.

WASHINGTON, November 2.—The International Commission convicts the Grand Treasurer of China, the Tartar governor of Paoing Fu and a Chinese colonel as guilty of being accessory to the murder of the missionaries. They are sentenced to death and the executions will soon take place.

New York, November 2.—Arthur Harris the negro whose murder of policeman Thomas caused the race riot in this city has been sentenced to life imprisonment.

State of the Army.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The annual report of the Adjutant General of the Army, for the fiscal year ending June 30, last, shows that the desertions from the army were equal to almost 50 per cent of the enlistments—there were 19,549 enlistments and 9,993 desertions. The report also shows that the number of promotions made by recruiting officers during the year, for legal, mental, moral, or physical reasons were 22,054, about 78 per cent of those offering to enlist.

The "army contest," officially known as the "post exchange" also gets a boost from the Adjutant General, who says that reports from the Philippines, Cuba and Porto Rico "indicate that the post exchange has become an absolute necessity." The report shows that the post exchange did a business amounting to \$1,215,000, with a net profit of \$164,504.

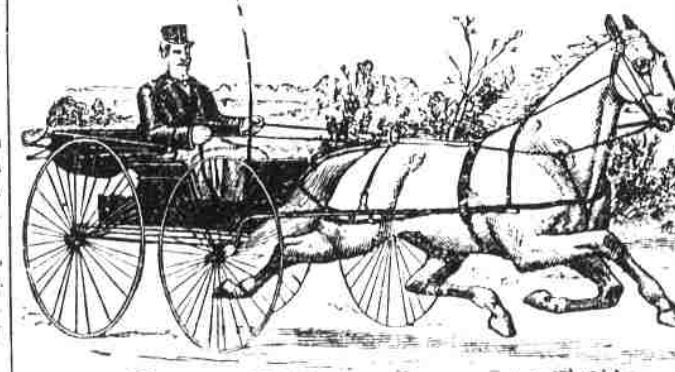
