## BIG FIGURES.

### Republican Claims Seem To Be Verified By Late News.

### Nebraska and Kansas Lost to Bryan and Kentucky in Doubt. McKinley 296, Bryan 138, Doubtful 18. Congress All One Way.

New York, Nov. 7.—The latest on yesterday's Presidential contest is that McKinley has 296 electoral votes, Bryan 138 votes, with the 18 votes of Kentucky still undecided.

The next House and Senate will be Republican by a good easy majority. There will be at least 307 Republicans in the next House of Representatives.

Of the pluralities, Pennsylvania breaks all records with a Republican plurality of over 300,000 and a majority over all of 140,000. Maryland gives 141,400 for McKinley with the entire delegation of six Congressmen, Republican.

The Democratic National Committee gives up Indiana and the Republicans claim the State by 30,000 and the election of 11 Congressmen. Ohio gives McKinley 60,000 plurality, Wisconsin 110,000 and Iowa 80,000.

The Republican plurality in New Jersey will reach 50,000. In West Virginia the Republicans control the Legislature and elect four Congressmen. The Republicans have swept Colorado and Kansas.

In South Dakota McKinley's plurality will reach ten thousand against 183 Democratic in 1896. Senator Pettigrew is defeated for re-election as the Republicans made a clean sweep of the State. Bryan has lost the State of Nebraska but the fusionists still hope to carry the Legislature and elect Bryan to the Senate. Kentucky continues very close and is still in the doubtful column.

## RALEIGH.

### Good Order in the State. Senatorial Results. Supreme Court. Reception Held.

RALEIGH, Nov. 7.—The news shows that yesterday's election was a model of good order in this State. The exceeding slowness of returns of the vote for Congressmen and electors was due to the utterly absorbing character of the Senatorial fight.

In this Senatorial fight great interest was felt in the vote in Wake, the Metropolitan county. Both Simmons and Carr were naturally more desirous to carry it than any other county in the State.

Chairman Simmons was at his office early this morning and congratulations were resumed. A gentleman from Goldsboro brought him the largest per centage ever seen here.

Early returns today showed that Simmons got 1400 majority in Bertie, 140 in Pamlico, 800 in Pender, 1,632 in Stanly, 700 in Davie. In Stanly, Klutz, for Congress got 602 majority, Bryan only 438. The smallness of the Democratic vote in Gaston was a surprise.

The feeling of the negroes against the white Republicans is growing more and more bitter day by day. Of course yesterday's vote was the last, something like two-thirds of the negroes will cast. They appeared to care but little about voting. They made not the slightest demonstration at the election of Mr. Klutz.

There is great good humor here as to the election. It was the case yesterday and is so today.

The Supreme Court today called the docket of appeals from the 7th district. Among the attorneys here are George M. Rose and N. A. Sinclair of Fayetteville, N. A. McLean of Lumberton and E. K. Bryan of Wilmington.

This evening ex-Justice Sheppard gave a reception at his home here to his son Mr. Brown Sheppard and bride (who was Miss Vase). All the members of the law are invited.

### Insurance Against Strikes.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—A number of

Austrian manufacturers have formed an association for insurance against strikes, according to United States Consul Hoxfeld, at Trieste. It is the object of the association to indemnify its several members for all losses sustained by them from unjust strikes which may break out in their respective establishments.

Each member is to pay a weekly premium equal to from 3 to 4 per cent of the amount of his pay roll. When a strike occurs, a committee will be appointed to investigate all the circumstances, and if the cause of the strikers be found just no indemnity shall be paid.

### Russia's Railway Plans.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 5.—Prince

Khrushchov, Russian Minister of Railways, denies categorically the assertion of a leading German newspaper that Russia is planning to construct a railway from Hamar and Hankow, via the Kashgar and Hoang Ho Valleys, or any other route. He asserts that the intervening mountains are all but impassable, and that such a line would cost millions of dollars, though it possibly may be built 1000 years from now.

There is not much chance of American ships supplying Russia with railway materials in the future. The Russian ships have a capacity of 1,000 locomotives annually, which exceeds the demand of the country. They could build 15,000 cars a year, whereas Russia ordered only 15,000 for 1900.

W. H. Holloway, United States Consul in St. Petersburg, has recently received many inquiries regarding an alleged railroad for which America is to supply the capital. Prince Khrushchov says that no such road is contemplated. He thinks it probable that unauthorized agents are operating in the United States.

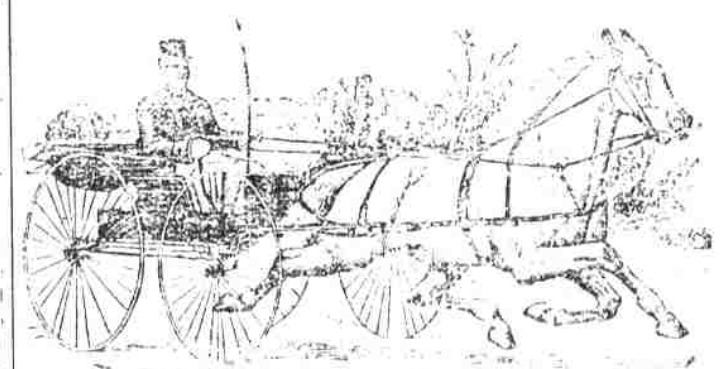

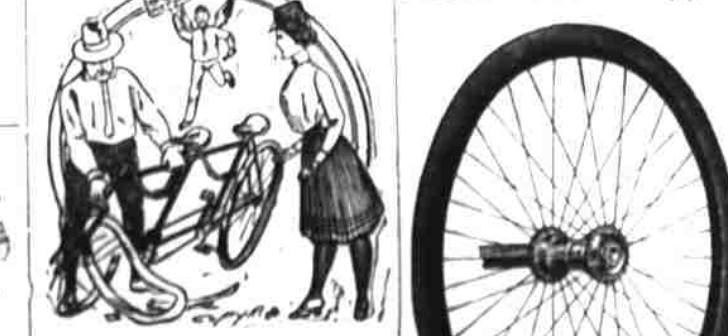
