### RALEIGH.

#### Fakirs Money Making Scheme. Ice and Snow. Populists are Dead. Bernard's Probable Successor.

RALEIGH, November 9.—The sale of fertilizer tax tags for the fall season has practically ended. Secretary Bruner of the agricultural department says it is about 10 per cent greater than it was last autumn.

The agricultural department is advised that certain persons are operating in the section of the State west of Charlotte, selling to farmers formula for making fertilizer at \$3 per each formula. An investigation of the methods of these fakirs will be made. The department gives formula free of any cost.

It is learned from D. H. Abbott of the 1st district that Isaac Meekins who claimed to be the real Republican nominee for Congress, carried two counties, Pasquotank and Perquimans, and got about 25 per cent of the Republican and Populist vote, Dr. Alexander getting the other three fourths.

The meeting of the Democratic State Executive Committee which is to be held here on the evening of the 29th, instant will be specially interesting.

Next Sunday Rev. George Stuart, the Tennessee evangelist will begin a revival here at Edenton Street M. E. church. He is now in the western part of the State.

There was a blizzard here for a while last night, and for a minute or two snow fell. This morning there was ice, the first of the season. The drop in the temperature was remarkable.

It is said that attorney general Walse, whose term expires in January, is to be succeeded by Court reporter, to succeed the late Ralph P. Buxton of Fayetteville.

A Republican intimates that Charles A. Cook of Warren county may succeed Charles Bernard as United States district attorney. It was Cook's purpose, early in the year, to leave this State and go to the far northwest.

The Populist leaders are saying that their party in this State will have to hold an early conference to decide whether they shall get together on a party or disband. The party is virtually dead now. Senator Butler, who was its life and soul, is saying that he will retire from politics and practice law at Raleigh.

A negro convict from Tyrrell was placed in the penitentiary last night, to serve 5 years for killing his wife. His defence was that she tried to run away, he caught her, she fell, his foot slipped and he fell upon her, breaking her back. The sheriff who brought him says there is thought to be truth in his version of the affair.

The negroes do not appear to care at all about the loss of their right to vote.

#### Want to Oust Croker.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Encouraged by the small plurality Tammany was able to roll up for the Democratic ticket on Tuesday the anti-Tammany element in the party has begun discussing means for driving Richard Croker out of power at the municipal election next year.

There was much speculation as to what the Democratic politicians would do. The statement was made by a man of long standing in Tammany Hall that a new County Democracy would be formed here within sixty days. He said that the men interested in the movement had been in doubt whether to try to overthrow Mr. Croker through a new organization or through the present Tammany organization. It had been found, he said, that many of the present Tammany leaders are anxious to send Croker to the rear, but find themselves unable to enter upon the project. This situation has convinced the anti-Crocker Democrats that their surest plan is to organize a new County Democracy.

#### Dewey's Gifts.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Admiral Dewey has removed his collection of gifts, which have occupied the most prominent place in the hall of American history in the National Museum, to his home, in Rhode Island avenue. The collection has assumed very large proportions, representing thousands of dollars in money value, and is almost daily added to by some admirer of the great sailor.

The people gathered from all sides, caught the priest, unroofed and then lynched him.

#### Ways and Means Committee.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The Congressional Ways and Means Committee will meet in ten days and will prepare a bill repealing some of the war taxes. The matter of increasing the army to one hundred thousand will be given special consideration as well as a naval increase and measures for the interoceanic canal. The War Department has prepared a plan for an army of 81,000 men.

#### South African Fight.

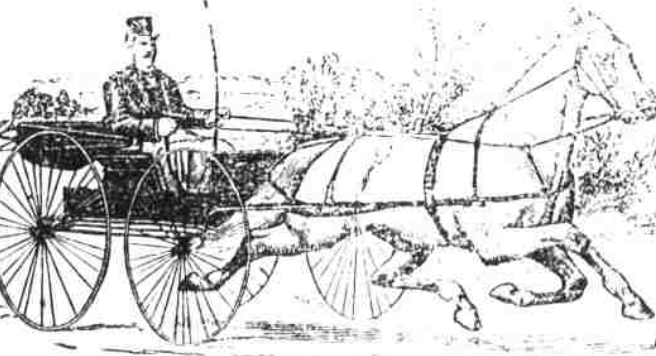

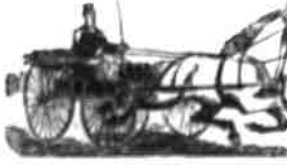
