RALEIGH.

Freight Rates Discussed. Auditorium Site Decided. Harris May Get a Short Job. The Flower Show.

RALEIGH, November 14.—The corporation commission met today and took up the matter of freight rates. There were present as representatives of the great systems of railway, J. M. Cull of the Southern, H. M. Emerson of the Atlantic Coast Line and H. W. B. Glover of the Seaboard Air Line. James Kyle of Wilmington appeared a complainant.

Governor Russell will make an appointment to fill the vacancy in the attorney generalship due to the appointment of Z. V. Waiser to be reporter to the Supreme Court. Republicans here express the belief that the Governor will appoint his good friend J. C. L. Harris. The appointee will of course only hold office for two months.

A State official was heard to say that he did not think Waiser would be reporter long, as the legislature would change the law so as to make the attorney general the reporter. To this the reply was made that the Supreme Court has repeatedly decided that office is property and cannot be taken away during the term of appointment.

Revenue officers made a raid in Franklin county last night and captured two illicit distilleries.

The site of the auditorium here has at last been selected. It is on South Wilmington street, within 100 yards of capitol square and is 130x188 feet. The price to be paid is \$6000. Bonds are to be issued and an auditorium constructed beneath it there will be stores. It is to seat at least 3500 people.

At the home of Mr. M. T. Norris here this morning his daughter, Miss Ethel Norris, was united in marriage to Mr. Joe K. Marshall, a son of Rev. M. M. Marshall rector of Christ Church who performed the ceremony. Miss Mamie Norris was maid of honor, Dr. Herbert Royser best man.

The session of the Presbyterian Synod here is the 87th. The attendance breaks the record. Rev. Dr. Morton of Wilson is the new moderator. Last night Rev. William Black, the retiring moderator, preached the annual sermon.

Attorney general Waiser says he warmly favors the creation of a department of justice, with the attorney general as its head, and says it will save the State much money.

The annual chrysanthemum show was a great success. By special effort it was brought up to the average.

The State charters the Jackson Springs Hotel Company, capital \$23,000. It owns the springs and will build a large hotel there.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—President McKinley today announced clearly and forcefully to the members of his Cabinet his desire that they should all remain with him during the four years of his coming administration. His wishes were made known in an extended speech at the Cabinet meeting in the White House today.

Responses were made by all of the members present, and while there were no definite pledges from any of them that they would accept the postoffice was tendered afresh, there was on the other hand no definite declination.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Laden with more than 5000 Christmas boxes and carrying 600 recruits for the army in the Philippines, the transport Kilpatrick, which was formerly the Atlantic Transport Company's steamer Michigan, began a two months' trip to Manila this afternoon.

As the Kilpatrick was the last ship of the fleet likely to get to Manila by Christmas the rush to send presents was enormous. Three thousand were sent.

To Educate Filipinos.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 13.—Yale will educate five Filipinos, provided they are young men of exceptional fitness and high character, to be selected by Judge Taft, of the Philippines Commission.

Free tuition will be given to the five Filipinos who present themselves at the opening of the next academic year just before the bi-centennial celebration. The corporation hopes by this pioneer work to induce the Civil Service Commission in Washington to make an effort to secure the co-operation of leading American colleges in a general plan to do for the Filipinos just what was done a number of years ago for the young Japanese who were educated at Yale.
