RALEIGH.

The State Treasury Report For Eleven Months.

Election State Guard Officers Refusal to Allow New Freight Classification. N. C. Presbyterian Synod. Fight Against Simmons.

RALEIGH, Nov. 15.—The State treasury today gave out the following statement for the 11 months, ending October 31, 1892-93, disbursements \$1,469,291.61. At the beginning of the year there was a balance on hand of \$131,985.43. This balance is really due to the sale of \$148,498 of 4 per cent bonds. These bonds had been for 15 years held as an investment and the interest on them saved. Years ago a surplus on the interest account was invested in these bonds, with the understanding that they could be sold whenever needed. This year they were needed to pay interest on the 4 per cent debt.

Adjutant general Royster says that on Thanksgiving day the company officers in all the companies of the State Guard will be elected.

There is much pleasure here at the news that P. M. Pearall of New Bern is to be the private secretary to Gov. Aycock. Mr. Pearall was in 1898 and again this year the indefatigable secretary of the Democratic executive committee.

The action of the corporation commission in refusing to allow the new freight classification made or proposed to be made by the railways to be effective in North Carolina was expected. The classification now in force holds good. There was a long list of complaints against the new classification.

Today was educational day at the North Carolina Presbyterian Synod in session here. Rev. Dr. Jethro Rumble presented the annual report of the reports of the Synod's orphanage at Beaufort Springs. At noon the greater number of the delegates to the Synod participated in a reunion of the students of Davidson college, at a dinner at the Varbuor house, where covers were laid for 150.

The news that Senator Pritchard is preparing to fight the seating of F. M. Simmons in the Senate was a surprise to some persons, as it had been thought Senator Butler was to be the prime mover in that matter. Ex-Congressman Thomas Settle, Republican, in an open letter, warns Senator Pritchard to let Mr. Simmons alone. Senator Pritchard is just now in Oregon.

Some election bids will not be settled until the State board of Commissioners meets here on the 19th, instant.

SETTLE TO PRITCHARD.

Tells Him That Any Contest Against Simmons Would Be Useless and Harmful.

Asheville, N. C., Nov. 14 1900.
Hon. J. C. Pritchard, Marshall, N. C.:
My Dear Senator—Having like yourself, the interest of the Republican party at heart, National and State, I trust that you will not misconstrue the motives prompting me to address you this letter.

The results of the November election speak for themselves, to the intelligent mind I understand from various sources, official and unofficial, that it is the policy of a number of gentlemen composing the Republican organization of this State, through you as Senator, to protest against seating Mr. Simmons when he presents his credentials, as Mr. Butler's successor. I am opposed to that policy and hope that you will not give ear to it. I see no good in it to the Republican party or to the State. On what grounds will you object to his being sworn in and ask the reference of his credentials to the Committee on Privileges and Elections? The case of Roberts from Utah is not applicable. You cannot establish anything against Mr. Simmons, personally, that would justify the Senate in refusing him admission. You would therefore have to base your case on political and legal or politico-legal issues, to-wit: North Carolina had not at the time of the election of the members of the legislature which elected Mr. Simmons United States Senator a republican form of government guaranteed by the Constitution and therefore said legislature, so elected had no power to elect a Senator. Suppose you succeed in convincing a majority of the Senate that the constitution is sustained by the law and the facts what then? Mr. Aycock would immediately appoint Mr. Simmons to fill the vacancy, and your fight would just have begun. You would be the language of my lamented friend, Gen. J. M. Leach only have "entered the vestibule of attack." Could you continue that fight upon the ground that Aycock, the Governor, himself elected under the same law, had no power to appoint a Senator to fill a vacancy? Again, should you succeed, if the United States or State Supreme Court should, upon a contest growing out of any act of the present legislature, sustain such a decision of the Senate, "where, oh, where?" The returns of the November election, as compared with those of the August election, show great gains by the Republican party. The August election and the November election were held under the same law. If we had no republican form of government in August we had none in November. Our laws were the same in each election. If the legislature can be investigated and set aside by the United States Senate upon the allegation that there existed no republican form of government at the time they were elected to the legislature, and therefore declines to admit the man his legislature has elected to represent the State, have you not gotten the State and the Republican party in a very awkward position? How can you assault the credentials of every Congressman from the State, including those of Moody and Blackburn, Republican members from the Eighth and Ninth districts? If the election of either is under the condition of the non-existence of a republican form of government, the same is true with reference to all our National Representatives. You cannot maintain that Moody and Blackburn were elected under a republican form of government and that Himes, Kuitert, Kitchin, Small et al. were elected under a non-republican form of government. I am not Mr. Simmons' champion. I suppose I had as much to do with the opposition to his confirmation as collector of internal revenue as any living man in the State. My opposition was political and as I was then in a contest for a seat in Congress with Mr. William, and Senator Hanson was taking sides with William, I made the fight in behalf of the Republican party and to give Senator Hanson something to attend to at home.

If this issue is made, how will it be done? Clearly on the ground of the present improperly called Simmons election law, the constitutional amendment and the conditions and circumstances attending the election is the answer. You cannot invoke the Williams riot that occurred under a Republican and Populist election law.

The business interests of the State as represented by the merchants, manufacturers, bankers, railroad men and all laborers will come to us if we only give them an available opportunity to do so. Why, then, not let the dead bury their dead? Act in the living present, heart within and God overhead. Sincerely your friend,
