**SUPREME COURT REPORTER.**

An Employment Not an Office. Legislative Halls Refitted. Evangelist Stuart. Special to Journal.

RALPH, November 16—Tomorrow the Methodist Orphanage building here will be completed and on the afternoon of the 29th, Assistant Bishop Morrison will dedicate it.

The reporting of the Supreme Court cases is now being done by attorney general Walser, with whom the Court has made a contract for four years. He could really do the work and remain attorney general until his term of office as attorney general expires, but will resign that office. The position of reporter is not an office, but an employment under a contract authorized by the legislature. The brother-in-law of Judge Baxter, the late reporter, several days ago gave notice verbally that Judge Baxter's widow stood on her rights, that is would insist that there was title to the office until the term for which Baxter was appointed expires. But it is not an office, only an employment. The Supreme Court has held that an office is property yet not a member of the Court personally believes in that doctrine, which is law in no other State but this one which is sure ere long to be over-ruled in North Carolina.

The Presbyterian Synod will adjourn tomorrow. Several of its ministers will occupy pulpits here Sunday.

The legislative halls are being refitted in order to be ready for the legislative session.

Congressional Representation.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—One of the important matters to be determined by Congress at the coming session is that of Congressional reapportionment under the new census. From the start, when there was one Representative to each 30,000 inhabitants, the ratio has been increased every ten years, and since the census of 1890 has been one Representative for each 172,901 persons. The present census shows an increase of population of more than 12,000,000, and there must, of course, be a proportionate increase in the ratio of Representatives to population. How to provide for that increase in an equitable manner is no easy problem. The House, with its 505 members, is already at times a very unwieldy body, and yet if the new ratio is to reduce the representation of no State there will have to be a very large increase in membership. The ratio thus seems most favored, except by those from the four States—Arkansas, Kansas, Maine and Virginia—which would under it have one less Representative than at present, is that of one Representative to each 100,000 persons. That would add 10 to the present membership of the House.

**PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD.**

Home Mission Fund. New College Building. Division of Fund Decided On. Special to Journal.

RALPH, Nov. 16.—The Presbyterian Synod at today's session decided to raise ten thousand dollars for home missions. By a rising vote Rev. William Black was re-elected synodical evangelist.

The report shows that Davidson College has a larger attendance than last year. A new building to cost \$50,000 is to be built at the Presbyterian College for women at Charlotte. The Synod rejected an overture from the Norfolk, Va. Synod asking the transfer to it of six North Carolina counts.

The division of the three hundred thousand dollars which this Synod will raise at the Twentieth Century Educational Fund was agreed on as follows: Davidson College 125 thousand, 50,000; Theological Seminary at Richmond 50,000; Presbyterian Female College and schools 100,000. General Assembly Fund 25,000.

Tonight a popular meeting in the interest of Sunday School was held.

**More Teachers Wanted.**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—M. G. Brumbaugh, Commissioner of Education for Porto Rico, says the school system now in operation there includes 800 teachers and 38,000 pupils. This is only a beginning, as there are 3,000 children of school age without school facilities, most of whom would enroll if they could. Mr. Brumbaugh says the hope of the island is in the public schools. The schools are not to be compared with American systems, but their transformation must be gradual.

There are over 100 American teachers engaged in the schools and the demand is for more. Thousands of children in this island, says the reporter, are half clothed, half fed, and half housed. At least 80 per cent of all the people are illiterate. There are no public school buildings and no public colleges or universities.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 1.—On account of a protracted drought, there is great suffering in the mountainous miles. Prayers are offered at every Sunday service, and special prayer meetings are being held because of the want of rain.  
Water is being hauled for many miles by country people, and many of the tributaries of the Kentucky River have become dry. Springs have failed a distance are empty, and those families that have no facilities for hauling are dependent on their neighbors' generosity.

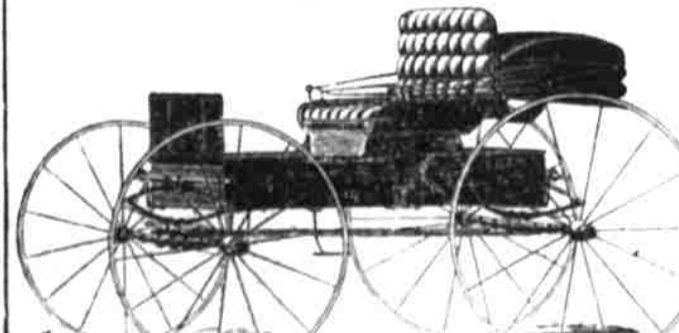
