Report of Attorney General Waiser For Two Years.

Remarkably Interesting Statistics. Insurance Companies Applying to do Business. Foot Ball Cranks. State Charter. Rev. Spillman Called Away.

RALEIGH, N. C., November 17.—The report of attorney general Waiser on crime in North Carolina for the two years ending July 31, 1900, was made public today. It gives the number of trials, for each crime for each of the two years. To save space, your correspondent gives the figures for the two years, as well as to show those for 1899, and those for 1900 thus: Assault and battery 578 and 452; abandonment 31 and 41; abduction 4 and 0; affray 900 and 849; arson 11 and 10; assault 377 and 313; assault with intent to rape 27 and 37; assault with deadly weapon 1,026 and 1,061; attempt to poison 1 and 26; abduction 1 and 4; bastardy 22 and 16; bigamy 19 and 19; burglary, first degree, 32 and 19; burglary, second degree, 7 and 18; burglaries other than arson 17 and 22; burglary 8 and 4; carrying concealed weapons 191 and 193; compounding a felony 3 and 2; conspiracy 11 and 10; cruelty to animals 68 and 53; counterfeiting 5 and 0; concealing birth 6 and 15; disorderly houses 56 and 46; disturbing meetings 122 and 117; escape 16 and 48; embezzlement 34 and 44; falsification and adultery 341 and 16; false pretense 116 and 102; false trespass 194 and 206; forgery 48 and 41; fraud 8 and 19; gambling 216 and 181; house breaking 26 and 28; house burning 19 and 11; incest 10 and 10; injury to property 56 and 56; injury to stock 21 and 29; illegal registration 1 and 0; larceny 1,362 and 1,329; libel 0 and 6; manslaughter 11 and 14; murder, 1st degree, 71 and 89; murder, 2nd degree, 5 and 21; miscellaneous 381 and 496; malicious mischief 1 and 9; malfeasance in office 5 and 5; nuisance 41 and 40; obstructing highway 9 and 15; obstructing river 2 and 2; perjury 39 and 43; practicing medicine without license 23 and 21; rape 14 and 21; robbery 8 and 16; retailing liquor with license 503 and 537; selling liquor to minors 31 and 43; selling liquor on Sunday 34 and 14; murder 46 and 24; seduction 23 and 18; selling adulterated merchandise 2 and 0; trespass 107 and 94; resisting officer 53 and 74; riot 24 and 34; total for 1899, 8,857 and for 1900, 7,208.

Of those tried in 1899 there were 7,634 males and 663 females, 4,396 white, 3,913 colored, 17 Indians; convictions 5,402, acquittals 1,125, not pros. 1,738, otherwise disposed of 72.

Of those tried in 1900 there were 7,651 males, and 617 females, 4,239 white, 2,918 colored, 26 Indians, convictions 5,448, acquittals 1,199, not pros. 1,543, otherwise disposed of 83.

Attorney General Waiser said: "The man who does not think that crime goes on in this work in North Carolina is mistaken. Take the total of crime for the two years above given. In the first year here were of criminal males 7,694 and in the second 7,651; of females the first year 663, and the second 617. But, more remarkable still, there were of whites the first year 4,396 and the second 4,239; colored for the first year 3,917 and for the second 2,918; convictions for the first year 5,402, second year 5,448.

"For 1899-1900 there were 12,066 trials; for 1899-1900 there were 13,255; for 1898-9 there were 13,594; for 1897-8 there were 18,741 and for 1896-1900 there were 16,927. The decrease during the past two years, of almost 2,000 cases as compared with the two years previous is remarkable."

Of the four capital crimes arson was about the same in 1899 and 1900, while burglary fell from 32 to 19; murder in the 1st degree rose from 71 to 89 and rape rose from 14 to 21. No less than 19 persons were therefore tried for their lives in the twelve months ended June 30th, 1900, while 178 were tried the year before.

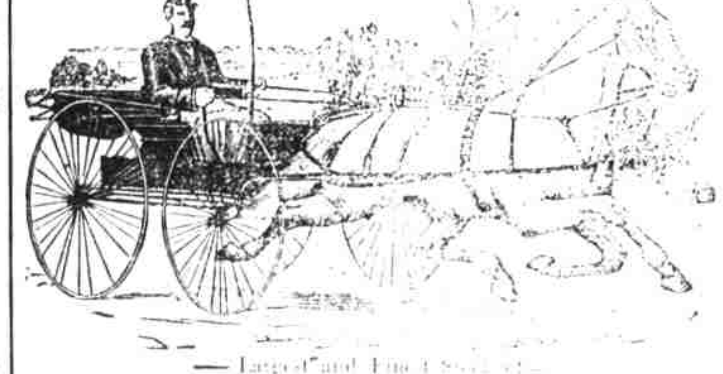

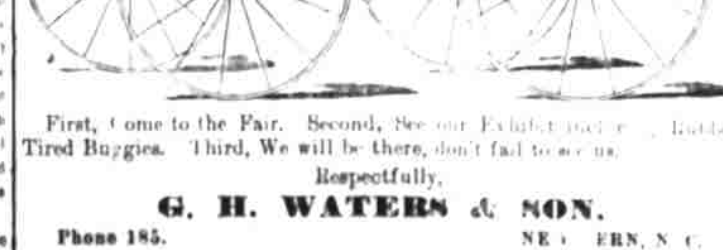
