RALEIGH.

State Auditor's Reports, Receipts and Disbursements.

Tenth District Appeals Before Supreme Court. Methodist Orphanage. Confederate Veterans to Collect War Bells. Electric Railways do Not Pay.

RALEIGH, N. C., November 26.—The Supreme Court will devote this week to 10th district appeals. The new attorney general, Robert Dick Douglas, was sworn in this morning and will argue the State cases tomorrow.

The State charters the East, Goldsboro Land and Improvement Company, capital, \$100,000, F. A. Norwood and others stockholders.

The State auditor reports the receipts for the 11 months of the fiscal year up to November 1, \$1,483,894, disbursements \$1,469,811; excess of disbursements over receipts \$14,083. There was a sale during the period, of \$198,000 of 4 per cent bonds, which brought in \$144,000. The estimated expenses during the year will exceed the receipts by about \$300,000. Of this amount \$300,000 went to the penitentiary. The officials of the latter are claiming that next year the State will not be called on to give any money to the penitentiary.

It is considered now rather doubtful whether the Methodist Orphanage can be dedicated Thanksgiving day. One building is completed, an 8-room brick cottage, but the grounds are not at all in shape.

Democratic State Chairman Simmons is confined to his home by an attack of lumbago.

The Confederate Veterans propose to take active measures to collect articles relative to the Civil War period for the "Hall of History" in the State Museum. Yesterday they secured the battle flag of the 26th N. C. Regiment, which was commanded in succession by Vance, Burgwyn and Lane, and which under Burgwyn at Gettysburg suffered a greater loss than any other regiment on either side during the entire war.

The report of the electric street railways to the Corporation Commission are now being tabulated. There are such roads at five places, Wilmington, Raleigh, Winston, Charlotte and Asheville. Only the two last named systems pay. The others make money out of their light plants. The deficit of the railway alone here since 1894 is almost \$5,000. It would really pay to shut down from Nov. 1st to May 1st, as there is no money in winter business.

Rev. Livingston Johnson of Greensboro is being much talked of as the successor to Rev. J. A. White as Baptist Home Mission Board Secretary for North Carolina.

The football team of the Agricultural and Mechanical College will play the University of South Carolina team here Thanksgiving Day.

The Corn Corner.

CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—If all the corn driers in the Middle West run continuously from now to November 20, the last day for delivery, it will not avail, George H. Phillips says, to break his corn corner. The young plunger is still confident of his firm grasp on the market.

"If all of them work to their fullest capacity," he said, "and are operated night and day, they will not be able to furnish me with more than 400,000 bushels of No. 3 contract corn."

This according to the accepted estimate will leave more than 1,000,000 bushels, less Phillips' sales between now and the day when the option expires, on which the shorts must walk up to the office of the young plunger and make what terms of settlement they can.

The weather has been the greatest helper to the young speculator. No. 3 contract corn, according to the rules of the Grain Commission, must be "mixed corn, dry, reasonably clean." Most of the corn has not got out of its wearing process and is as sensitive to the dampness of the weather as a sponge. Out of 800 cars arriving yesterday only 10 cars were of sufficient dryness to come under the contract requirements.

Weather Conditions.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 26.—For North Carolina, fair and mild.

The storm over northern Georgia yesterday has moved northeast to the Middle Atlantic coast with a decided increase in intensity and is sending high winds and gusts to the eastern sections. Rain has been general from Florida north and northward to the lower lakes and New England.

Colder weather has followed in the rear of the storm and low temperatures prevail all the way to the northward.

Probable Legislation.

WASHINGTON, November 26.—Representative Russell, of Conn., a member of the House and Means Committee, expressed this opinion of the work of the session: "I think the revenue bill will be the first important measure taken up. It will probably come ahead of the appropriation bills and the army bill, as it will be ready for presentation the first day of the session. The army bill may be the next important measure taken up. Neither will require much time and both should be disposed of without delay. I cannot say that any legislation will be necessary at this session, for the Philippines or Porto Rico. A re-appointment bill should be passed before the end of the session, and I believe the ship subsidy bill should also be passed. Little can be done for Cuba until the results of the Constitutional Convention is known."

THE GATTIS KILGO SUIT.

Motion to Dismiss Denied. Argument on The Case Begun.

RALEIGH, Nov. 26.—In the hundred thousand dollar libel suit of Rev. T. J. Gattis against President Kilgo of Trinity College at Oxford today, Dr. Kilgo moved to dismiss the case for failure to show notice. The motion was denied. The defense then moved for an appeal. This was also denied. The defendant offered no testimony. Argument began this evening.

Friends of Dr. Kilgo claim that the plaintiffs testimony sufficiently proved Kilgo's innocence of the Gattis charge.

SOUTH NEEDS SHIPS.

Governor Candler Expects Maritime Congress to be a Success.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 25.—Governor Candler, in a response to an inquiry on the result of a call recently issued for a maritime congress to meet in Brunswick in January, today said:

"I have received favorable responses from all parts of the country on the plan to assemble the congress. I called it to inaugurate a movement to restore the Southern maritime trade which was lost during the Civil War. Since the war no movement of the kind has been instituted, though the merchant marine has not been what the South's resources justify."

"I believe the movement will result in much good by building up Georgia and Southern ports and enlarging the circulation of the South's resources. From replies I have received I am assured the congress will be well attended."

"The South's cotton product is not receiving the attention from the maritime service that might be given it. Our ports are open to ships from all parts of the world, but cotton is frequently shipped abroad from Northern ports. I believe the congress can be of great benefit in better regulating the shipping of cotton."

The Filipino Junta.

WASHINGTON, November 25.—While Great Britain may deny the request of the United States that the Filipino Junta at Hongkong be suppressed, it is said the United States authorities will insist that measures be taken to prevent violation of neutrality.

Hongkong is the centre of the filibustering activity of the Filipino insurgents and the authorities propose to bring about an end to the shipment of supplies to them. A high authority said today that this Government entertained little expectation that Great Britain would be able to suppress the Junta, but it does expect it to maintain such a strict supervision over the Filipinos' operations as to prevent shipments of arms and supplies to the insurgents.

The Czar's Condition.

LONDON, November 25.—While the latest bulletin regarding the Czar's condition is much less favorable than his predecessors', there is nothing as yet to confirm alarming rumors.

Queen Victoria daily receives a telegram from the Czarina, and it is understood that no exceptional anxiety is yet displayed. According to the Moscow correspondent of the Daily Express, an examination of water from the well used for drinking purposes at Livadia proved the presence of typhoid germs. An Odessa dispatch to the daily News says: "Reports for the last two days indicate serious decline in the strength of the Czar."

CHINESE SOLUTION.

Conference at the Hague Proposed by This Country.

WASHINGTON, November 26.—This government has once more taken the diplomatic lead in Chinese affairs. Tiring of the seemingly endless deadlock of the foreign ministers at Pekin, and believing that their personal experiences had aroused their prejudices to such an extent that it would be well nigh impossible for them to agree upon the demands to be made upon the government of China; for the punishment of the inciters of the boxer troubles and the amount of the money indemnity which should be paid the powers, this government has boldly taken a stand in favor of ending the deadlock by stopping the present negotiations and making a fresh start by the appointment of representatives of each of the powers concerned, to an international commission or congress, to meet at the Hague, or some other place outside of China, and formulate the demands which the powers shall make upon China. The idea has been endorsed by several of the powers and it is expected to get the approval of them all. It seems to offer a compromise way out of the mix-up in Pekin, which has steadily been growing worse instead of better.


