### RALEIGH.

The Annual College Debate. The Cotton Mill Strike. Flagler-Kenan Announcement. Foot Ball.

RALEIGH, Nov. 27.—N. G. Wade of the Atlantic Coast Line, and also the owner of the road between Asheville and Boardman, in Robeson county, was here today to see the penitentiary authorities. He applied for 100 convicts, to do grading. The officials are unable to furnish them, but filed his application.

Thanksgiving Day there will occur here the annual debate between Trinity and Wake Forest colleges, at the Academy of Music, in the evening. In the afternoon there will be a new and pleasant feature, a reception to the students of Trinity and Wake Forest given by the Baptist Female University.

The Conference at Greensboro.

GREENSBORO, N. C., November 26.—After the appointments for the ensuing year had been read, the eleventh session of the Western North Carolina Conference adjourned tonight.

The subject that provoked the most discussion at today's session was a proposition submitted by a special committee that the Conference purchase a controlling interest in the official organ, The North Carolina Christian Advocate. The proposition was finally accepted, and Rev. Dr. L. W. Crawford resigned office.

The report of the statistical secretary showed that there are 65,000 church members and 48,000 Sunday-school scholars within the bounds of the Conference.

### SOUTHERN RAILWAY.

Talk of its Purchase by the Pennsylvania Railroad.

PHILADELPHIA, November 27.—Something of a flurry was created in financial circles here today by the circulation of an apparently well authenticated rumor to the effect that the Pennsylvania R. R. Co., had acquired the Southern Railway. It is stated the deal was consummated by Speyer & Co., a well known banking house of New York City, and that the details would be made public within 48 hours.

The fact that Speyer & Co., are known to conduct much of the Pennsylvania's financial business lent additional credence to the story, which was further strengthened by the buying soon after the opening of the stock market of Southern Railway stock.

At the office of the Pennsylvania R. R. however, the report was denied, but this is the policy of this well disciplined system to deny all deals in which they are interested until everything is complete and they see fit to make such known from an official standpoint.

Should the report prove true it would mean that the Pennsylvania would become a competitor of the A. C. L. and the S. A. L. and all the business which is now turned over to the Pennsylvania by these two lines would be diverted into other channels.

### THE CHINESE TERMS.

Foreign Ministers Come to Agreement. Severe Claims on China.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Like a thunderbolt have come the details of the terms which the foreign Ministers have agreed upon at Peking.

While the United States was seeking to induce moderation of the demands and when most of the other Governments had given encouragement, suddenly the Ministers came together, Mr. Canger and all, and adopt demands that practically do not differ from those suggested several weeks ago.

The terms agreed to at Peking, according to advices received here, include the following:

Execution by the Chinese Government of the 11 princes and officials already designated.

Indemnity, including satisfaction of claims for the murder of missionaries and damage to their property and the property of other foreigners; reimbursement of foreign governments for the expenses of military expeditions to China, and compensation for native Christians employed by foreigners.

Abolition of the Taung H Yamen, or Chinese Foreign Office, as it is present constituted, and the appointment of a foreign minister, who shall conduct business with the foreign representatives.

Access by the foreign Ministers to the Emperor's presence.

Razing of the Taku forts and some of the other forts in Pechili.

Prohibition of the importation of war munitions.

Establishment of permanent legation guards at Peking and permanent guards on the road from Peking to Taku.

Erection of a monument to Baron von Ketteler at the place where he was murdered and the dispatch of a prince to Berlin to apologize for the outrage.

Suppression of Boxers by imperial proclamation; removal and punishment in future of all officials failing to protect foreigners.

Lee Resolution Dropped.

HAVANA, Nov. 26.—At the opening of today's session of the Cuban Constitutional Convention Senator de Quesada moved the rejection of the resolution introduced Saturday by Senors Rivas, Cisneros and Villanadas, expressing the sorrow of the convention at the departure of Gen. Fitzhugh Lee from Cuba. The resolution was then rejected unanimously.

Senator Rivas said after the session that some of the delegates intended to attack General Lee on the ground that he had not always been a friend of the Cubans, and that in view of this General Lee's friends thought it would be better not to press the resolution.

### CORNER ON CORN.

The Cereal Higher Than It Has Been Since 1894

CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—Corn for November delivery sold today on the Board of Trade at 50 cents per bushel—the highest price since 1894, when, owing to a protracted drought, the market advanced close to the sixty cent mark. Since that time the coarse cereal has sold almost down to 20 cents per bushel.

That there are vast quantities of corn in the country is well known, but George H. Phillips today apparently showed that he has effected the most perfect "corner" in the recent history of the board. Practically no contract corn is coming to market.

Phillips did little to advance the market today. It advanced on the efforts of shorts to cover. When fifty cents was bid Phillips sold 100,000 bushels or so, and checked the advance. The market opened one cent higher than Saturday at 46, rose to 50 and closed at 49, a net gain of 4 cents.

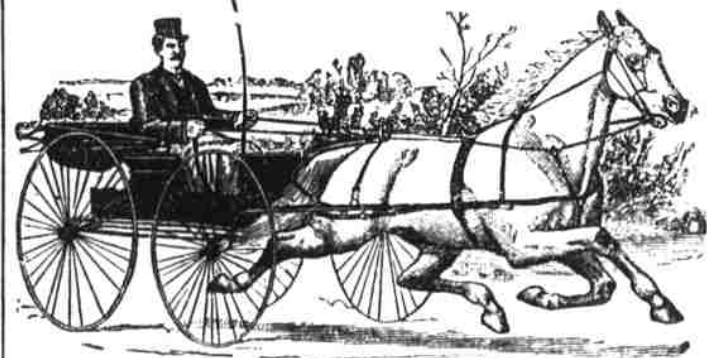
