### RALEIGH.

Baptist State Convention in Session. Many Delegates Present. Federal Court Meets. Lacy and Thompson Back.

Raleigh, N. C., December 4.—The federal court opened here this morning, Judge Purnell, presiding. The docket is somewhat larger than was expected and is really a full one. Most of the cases are against moonshiners.

Baptists are arriving in great numbers to attend the State Convention of their church, which begins its session tomorrow. There will be 700 delegates and at least 500 other visitors. All have been provided with homes.

The Supreme Court today took up the appeal docket from the 11th, district. Many attorneys are here, among them F. I. Osborne, Platt D. Walker, Lee S. Overman, G. F. Bason.

The electors met here today in the Senate chamber, to officially cast the vote for Bryan.

The annual State convention of the Baptist Young Peoples Union was held this evening in the First Baptist church.

The address of welcome was by Baxter Dunham, the reply by D. A. Tedder of Charlotte. Rev. W. M. Vines of Charlotte delivered an address on "What this Young Peoples Union means," and there was also an address by Rev. Dr. Chivers, International Secretary of the Union.

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—General Fitzhugh Lee left here tonight for Omaha, where he will at once assume command of the Department of the Missouri. Before leaving he said:

"In case the United States is forced to occupy Cuba permanently, I do not think more than 3,000 or 5,000 United States troops would be needed. Troops from the United States, could be poured in very easily in case of necessity.

"Whether the Cuban convention will succeed in establishing a government which can protect life and property and give security to capital I can only answer, who knows?"

### TAX ASSESSMENT CASE.

State's Side Heard on 18th. Presidential Electors Meet. Report on Cotton Mills.

RALEIGH, Dec. 4.—The hearing of the State's side in the Tax Assessment case, begins here December 18th, and will continue until the 27th.

The Presidential Electors met here today, and elected Dan Hugh McLean, chairman, C. L. Abernathy, secretary. Electors then adjourned until tomorrow, and will then adjourn until the first Tuesday in January, when they will meet and cast the vote for President.

The report on cotton mills chartered by the State to date this year, shows 26, and 10 knitting mills. To-day the capital invested in these is \$3,567,000.

### MANY FILIPINOS YIELD.

Twenty-Two Hundred Take the Oath of Allegiance.

MANILA, December 3.—Sunday in Vigan was a great day for the American cause.

Twenty-two hundred natives of the region nearly all fighting men, crowded the church and took the oath of allegiance to the United States. The oath was administered by the priest. All but 500 of those sworn were bolomen. The number included 1,200 bolomen who had previously surrendered.

The proceedings in the church occupied the entire day. They included an address by General Young and an exhortation by the priest. Scarcely any hostile Filipinos remain in the vicinity of Santa Maria. General Young attributes this fact to three causes—the re-election of President McKinley, the arrival of a stronger body of troops, the especially rigid enforcement of war measures and the deportation of prisoners to Manila.

Washington, December 3.—The War Department today received a dispatch from General MacArthur telling of the surrender of Filipinos to General Young.

General MacArthur says: "Although no rifles were surrendered this is important as indicating a reaction among the people."

Rockefeller Wedding Put Off.				
CHICAGO, O., Dec. 3.—Miss A. Rockefeller, daughter of John D. Rockefeller, has called her mother from Vienna that her marriage to E. P. Armstrong, a Chicago lawyer, has been postponed indefinitely. Mr. Armstrong is with his fiancée in Vienna.				
Mr. Armstrong and Miss Rockefeller were to have been wedded on December 15. Miss Rockefeller is being treated for deafness, and the doctors at Vienna desire that she remain abroad and continue her treatment. The wedding probably will take place early next spring.				

### JIM CROW LAW HOLDS.

A Decision to That Effect by the United States Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The Kentucky State law requiring railroad companies in that State to provide separate coaches for colored passengers was made the subject of an opinion in the United States Supreme Court today, the case being that of the Chesapeake & Ohio vs. the State of Kentucky. It came to this court from the Kentucky Court of Appeals. The opinion was handed down by Justice Brown and the Kentucky court's judgment in favor of the State was affirmed.

Justice Brown stated that in this case the railroad had attacked the statute on the ground that it was unconstitutional in that it is an interference with Interstate Commerce. With out replying specifically to the objection, the justice said there is a sufficient compliance with the law if a separate coach for local colored passengers is attached to a train while passing through the State. The Court of Appeals of Kentucky, it is said relieved this court of the necessity of passing upon the question as to whether the law required a separate coach for interstate State passengers of color.

Justice Harlan dissented stating his opinion to be that the law is an interference with Interstate commerce and also taking the position that the Kentucky Legislature has no right to classify citizens by color in railway coaches.
