FOR HIGHER EDUCATION.

Baptist State Convention Decides to Raise \$100,000.

Contributions Already Given. Sensational Criminal Case in Beaufort County. Hardware Company Chartered. Two Gentlemen With Singular Similarity of Names.

RALEIGH, N. C., December 8.—The State charter the Heath Hardware Co., of Monroe, which will manufacture hardware, machinery, electrical and telephone supplies, etc.; capital \$50,000, W. C. Heath and others stockholders.

F. H. Busbee, Esq., returned today from Beaufort county and brought news of a very strange and sensational trial. In the 70th, N. C. Supreme Court reports there is the case of a man named Brooks tried for rape, it being in evidence that he perjured the woman's husband. The court held that it was not rape; that fraud was not rape. The legislature in 1881 accordingly enacted a law to meet such a case. Up to that time such a case had never been tried in the State and some thought there would never be another. The legislative act made the offense rape and fixed the minimum penalty at ten years in the penitentiary. Charles Williams was this week tried for the same offense and convicted. He attempted to prove knowledge on the woman's part, but the latter's evidence promptly convicted him.

The Baptist State convention here has almost completed its work. It is the largest ever held. It holds three sessions a day.

It decides to raise \$35,000 this year and \$75,000 next year for higher education among the Baptists, and has already raised \$15,000 of the \$25,000. Chief Justice W. T. Faircloth gave \$1000, Dennis Simmons of Washington \$300, W. G. Daniel 500, the First Baptist Church here \$3500, the Baptist Tabernacle here \$1500, the Church at Wake Forest \$1000 etc. Today one of the features of discussion was the management of the church paper, the Biblical Recorder, that is whether the owners, Edwards and Broughton, or the counties shall dictate its policy.

Two gentlemen of the same name are here, Mr. John C. Drewry, alderman of Raleigh, and Mr. John C. Drewry, government official and alderman of British Columbia. They met first this year, in Canada, and the British Columbian is visiting the Raleigh man. Each is named after his maternal grandfather, each has a brother named William and each has a brother named James. They are of about the same size and look alike. It is certainly a very remarkable coincidence.

BIG SALE OF LAND.

55,000 Acres Sold by the State to a Goldsboro Man.

The State Board of Education met yesterday to close the contract for the sale of 55,000 acres of State lands.

In September last Mr. S. W. Isler of Goldsboro, representing Charles Vedder, contracted to purchase what is known as the Vedder swamp lands, embracing all the lands owned by the State in Onslow and Jones counties in the neighborhood of White Oak swamp. There are some fifty-five thousand acres of these lands, which was bargained to be sold at fifty cents an acre.

Mr. Isler was represented by Mr. Frank Tompaso. The contract called for the payment of \$1,500 in cash and \$25,000 to be paid on or before July 1, 1901. Mr. Tompaso is here to close the contract. The board will have another meeting today.—Raleigh Post

City License Tax.

CITY CHARTER—Sec. 46 That any person who shall carry on or exercise trade, profession or use any franchise taxed according to law by the Board of Aldermen without first obtaining a license for the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction fined not more than fifty dollars or imprisoned thirty days.

If you are doing any business as presented above you are liable to the penalty.



Boers Want the War.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—A Blue Book of the South Africa dispatches from Jan. 3 to Oct. 14 was issued yesterday.

Sir Alfred Milner, the British High Commissioner, writing to Mr. Chamberlain, quotes from a letter dated Kromstad, Sept. 30, 1900, and written by Mr. Bignault, brother of P. J. Bignault, State Secretary of the Orange Free State as follows:

"The only thing we are afraid of is that Chamberlain, with his admitted selfishness of temper, will cheat us out of a war and consequently out of an opportunity to annex Natal and Cape Colony and to form a Republican United States of South Africa."

Last Galveston Storm Loss.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Dec. 7.—The Queen of the Provincetown Grand Banks fishing fleet, the Cors S. McKay, has been given up for lost, with all her crew of thirty souls, by the people of this fishing town. Every circumstance points to her destruction at Virgin Rocks, on the Grand Banks, in the storm of Sept. 19 to 14, known on land as the Galveston hurricane.
