POPULATION OF TOWNS.

Increase of North Carolina Towns in Last Ten Years.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Wilmington, Charlotte, Asheville, Raleigh—in this order—are the leading cities in North Carolina, according to the official census returns announced today. There is much food for thought and reflection in the figures, but others can supply that. As announced, the bulletin gives only the figures of the cities and towns named for 1900, but for purposes of comparison the official figures of 1890 are supplied from the census of the last decade.

The population of certain incorporated places in North Carolina having a population of more than 2,000, but less than 25,000 in 1900, is as follows:

AT CHAPEL HILL.

Improvements Continue. Presbyterian Church. Lectures. Durham Growing.

CHAPEL HILL, N. C., Dec. 12.—Chapel Hill is soon to be connected with Durham and other points by telephone, the work having already begun. Also a trolley line from here to Durham is being seriously considered.

Improvements are continually being made in the University plant. In addition to the Carr building, the gift of General Julian S. Carr and now being occupied for the first time, the Alumni building is in course of erection—both handsome buildings—and another large building will soon be erected by Zachary & Zachary, architects, Raleigh, N. C. Also the University water works will soon be in active operation.

Extensive and helpful improvements have lately been made in the Presbyterian church, costing some \$2,000. Besides other changes, electric lights have been put in, new oak pews, full carpet, furnace and stained glass windows. Thanksgiving and celebration services to mark the completion of these improvements were held Saturday night and Sunday morning. Saturday night Rev. A. R. Shaw, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Henderson, N. C., delivered a most interesting and instructive address on "The Historical Relation Which the Presbyterian Church Sustains to the Work of the University." And on Saturday morning Rev. J. B. Shearer, D. D., L. L. D., who was the first pastor of the church here, and is now president of Davidson College, delivered a powerful address on "The Divine Right of Presbyterianism in its Historical Aspect." At night Dr. Shearer preached excellent sermon before the University in Gerard Hall. The Presbyterians, with their improved place of worship, are now very much encouraged having a very neat and attractive church—the newest in the village.

The present pastor, Rev. Daniel J. Currie, has served the church since May, 1894, this being his first and only charge.

Durham's growth is certainly remarkable. A traveling man says it does more business than any place of its size in the United States. The American Tobacco Company has within the past few days completed its thirteenth warehouse there and now its warehouses cover more than eight acres of ground. Two very large new cotton mills are under construction at the suburb known as Edgemont, while extensive additions to the Erwin and East Durham cotton mills are being built. The prediction is made that in ten years Durham will exceed Raleigh or Charlotte in population.

Affairs in the Philippines.

MANILA, Dec. 11.—A detachment of the Fifth Cavalry had a fight with 100 Filipinos of south Santa Cruz Sunday. The natives were chased four miles. Fourteen of them were found dead. There were no American casualties.

In addition to this engagement, there had been several minor encounters between the troops and the Filipinos.

The United States hospital ship Solace has arrived at Zamboanga from San Francisco. Her officers say the condition of affairs at the island of Guam has considerably improved since a week ago.

Dwellings are being restored and the people are resuming their occupations, but the crops are practically all destroyed, though there is no immediate want of food. The soldiers left supplies to Guam from Cavite.

The United States Philippine Commission announced today the preliminary portions of the tariff bill in committee of the whole. Merchants made a few suggestions. The importers are watching for the decision of the Supreme Court on the Porto Rican tariff. They say that if it is decided to be unconstitutional they will claim a return of all duties paid on goods from the United States since the date of the Paris treaty and will also claim the return of port charges on vessels from the United States. Up to the present and pending an agreement with Spanish duties have been levied, which impose import taxes on goods from the United States.

Upward of \$3,000,000 have accumulated in the Philippines from customs and other taxes.

RALEIGH, Dec. 12.—The Grand Jury in the Federal Court here this evening returned a true bill against the Warden of the Penitentiary for the misuse of the Federal convicts last summer.

AUDITOR'S STATEMENT.

Value of Property in the State. Poor Statement of School Attendance. Special to Journal.

RALEIGH, N. C., Dec. 12.—The Auditor's statement issued to night says that the returns of real and personal property received from 88 counties show a net increase over last year of \$7,910,461. Estimated that other 8 counties bring this to eight and one-half millions.

Durham leads in an increase of seven hundred thousand. Beaufort in a decrease of \$153,815. Seventy counties show an increase, and eighteen counties a decrease.

Returns of public schools also given out. Number of children of school ages, white, 439,331, color 229,198. Number attending school, white 142,413, colored 64,505. School hours 6018. Receipts one million and eight hundred thousand, disbursements nine hundred and fifty thousand.

Steel Ties For Railways.

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—A test is being made by the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern Road with a steel tie. The company, like all others, is continually replacing old steel rails with new. No other practical use has been found for the old rails, and it has now been decided to try them for ties in place of wood.

Under the process the old rails are re-rolled to flatten the heads. Several months ago a number of these steel rails were placed under the track of the Sandusky Division, and a careful examination made last week with a gauge showed that the steel ties had not allowed the gauge of the track to change a particle since they were laid. The first three oak ties on each side were also exact, while the fourth, fifth, and sixth wooden ties had widened to a considerable extent.

The Lake Shore people are pleased with the result of the test. It is said that these ties can be much better stamped than wooden ones and that with steel ties the track may be maintained more evenly. The average life of a wooden tie is six years. The Chief Engineer of the Lake Shore says he sees no reason why ties of steel should not last twenty-five years before deteriorating to an extent to necessitate renewal.


