RALEIGH.
Supreme Court Opinions Handed Down, Court Adjourns For Term.
Collecting For St. Mary's School. The Oldest Convict Soon Be Out. Why Pritchard Declined a Good Office.

RALEIGH, December 24.—The Supreme Court today filed the following opinions: Barney vs. Allen, from Bladen, affirmed; Ferrell vs. Broadway, from Lenoir, petition to rehear allowed and payment below affirmed; Tiddy vs. Graves, from Guilford, petition allowed and judgment below affirmed; Arthur vs. Broadway, from Lenoir, affirmed; Roseman vs. Roseman, from Rowan, affirmed; Bailey vs. Bailey, from Buncombe, no error.
Forty convicts will on Wednesday be transferred from the penitentiary to Moore county, where they will build a lumber railway for W. H. Britton and will then cut timber for saw mills. The contract is for a year.
Rev. A. A. Pruden, agent for St. Mary's school here which is owned by the Episcopal diocese in this State and that of South Carolina, was here yesterday after having spent six weeks in South Carolina, where he collected \$1,000 towards paying the debt. He will return there after the holidays and collect \$6,000 more.
The Supreme Court really adjourned for the term at 9 o'clock Saturday night. The justices went home yesterday afternoon.
The oldest convict in the penitentiary, Andy Winecoff, colored, will depart in March. He was an office boy for Gov. Vance when the latter practiced law at Charlotte. Andy committed crime, ran away and turned up in Robeson county with the Henry Berry Lowry outlaws, was tried and was sentenced and was on the gallows with the rope about his neck, when Gov. Vance commuted his sentence to life imprisonment. Andy has always been a good prisoner. Two years ago he was offered a pardon but declined to accept it as long as Capt. Bill Day was superintendent, but would take it when Capt. Day's term ended, which is in March.
The convicts will have a merry Christmas, with abundance of good cheer, not forgetting candy, of which they are very fond.
Business Manager Womble of The Time-Visitor, was on Saturday sworn in as magistrate. He is so delighted with the honor that the paper this afternoon announces that he will perform the marriage ceremony for any and all people free of charge, during the holidays. The paper announces that it will give a dinner to the first couple accepting this offer.
It is now learned why Senator Pritchard did not take the district judgeship when James E. Boyd was given it. It was because he was waiting for a circuit judgeship. Congress will provide for another circuit judge in this district and then two years hence, Pritchard will get the place. Prominent Republicans tell me this.

North Carolina Rivers.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 24.—The River and Harbor Appropriation Bill contains the following appropriations for improvement of rivers in North Carolina:
Northeast (Cape Fear) river, \$2,000; Cape Fear river above Wilmington \$10,000; Cape Fear river at or below Wilmington, \$140,000; Contentnea Creek, \$2,500; Neuse river, 10,000; Pamlico and Tar rivers, \$25,000; Trent river, \$5,000; Black river, \$2,000; Fishing Creek, \$2,000; inland water route from Norfolk, Va., to Albemarle Sound, N. C., through Currituck Sound \$13,400; Town Creek, Brunswick county, \$1,000; Scuppernon river, \$1,000. For the improvement of Edenton Bay harbor, \$5,000 is appropriated.

Too Many German Physicians.
BERLIN, Dec. 23.—Emperor William's decree lengthening medical study as a remedy for the overproduction of physicians meets with the approval of the profession. In connection therewith official statistics published this week exhibit the overcrowding of the medical profession in the large cities. Berlin has one physician to every 775 of population, Breslau one to every 775, Halle one to every 735, and Koenigsberg one to every 681.

Police Find 27,752.
CHARLOTTE, Dec. 24.—The police census gives Charlotte a population of 19,002. The Federal census gave for the city a population of 18,091. But in addition to this number the police have found 1,811 persons residing within the corporate limits.
The total population outside of the city but inside the police jurisdiction—which extends one mile from the city limits—is 7,850. Therefore, according to the police census, there are 27,752 persons who live within less than two miles of the public square.

HOW THEY VACCINATE.
Colony of Negroes in Brooklyn Treated With Police Help
New York, Dec. 23.—The negro colony in Gwinnett Street, Williamsburg, from Marcy Avenue to Harrison Avenue was thrown into a panic late Friday night by the appearance of fifteen doctors attached to the Board of Health, who had gone to the colony to vaccinate the occupants. The doctors were protected by forty-five policemen. The intentions of the Board of Health was to keep quiet that not a single one of the 800 blacks who lived in the colony knew of it until the doctors and police appeared. When they sought to escape they found policemen everywhere.
In the back of the Gwinnett Street row is a rope factory. On the roof of this building half a dozen policemen were stationed, while other policemen went to the roofs of houses. When the doctors and officers arrived most of the inhabitants were asleep. When the news spread of the raid much excitement prevailed. Some went to the roofs, others, to the cellars, and some tried to escape from their homes only to be driven back by the police. Force had to be used in some cases before the work could be accomplished. A family, consisting of a man, his wife, and three children were found hiding in a cellar, and others locked themselves in their rooms. Doors had to be forced open in order to get in.
