**Raleigh.**  
Legislature to Increase Appropriations and Levy More Taxes.  
Funeral of Robert O. Burton. Gen. Hoke on Native Philippine Soldiers. Prizes Taken at the Paris Exposition.  
RALIGH, N. C., Dec. 28.—The funeral services of Robert O. Burton, Esq., were held here this afternoon from Edenton street M. E. church. The board of stewards of that church of which board he was a member, attended in a body, as did the Raleigh bar. His brothers arrived in time to be present, among them Mr. Andrew Burton of Reidsville and Messrs John and James Burton of Halifax county. The remains were taken to-day to the family burial grounds near Roanoke Rapids.  
State Treasurer Worth said to your correspondent today in reply to a question: "I expect the legislature will increase appropriations. The demand is very great. It will be in earnest though about getting more taxes. I do not believe property in North Carolina, real and personal—all property in fact—is assessed at over two-thirds of its true value. I never have believed it. There is most certainly not over two-thirds on the tax books."  
The Treasurer has an inquiry from the county superintendent of Guilford asking when he will be ready to pay out \$100,000 appropriated for 1901 for public schools by the legislature. He replied that if the sheriffs pay in taxes promptly he will promptly meet the obligation. The \$100,000 begins to be due January 1st. The Treasurer said: "The sheriffs are paying in only moderately well. Only 3 out of 97 have as yet receipts in full, those being of Lincoln, Johnston and Martin counties."  
State treasurer Worth says he sees from the report of the treasurer of Va., that that State gets \$225,000 for liquor licenses. He says he wants to know why this State can't get as much. Virginia gets \$21,000 for collateral inheritance taxes—this State nothing. Virginia gets \$11,000 out of the penitentiary and \$40,000 out of oysters; this State practically nothing.  
The rural mail delivery is very popular with the country people. A carrier he resided to me. "I handled in August, the first month of my route, 1373 pieces of mail. This month I have handled over 5,000."  
Gen. Robert F. Hoke, one of the few surviving major-generals of the Confederate army, tells me the plan of the United States to enlist natives as soldiers in the Philippines will prove an excellent one if they are carefully taught to be marksmen. The general says that he speaks from experience and observation and that if they are taught to be expert marksmen the "hunter's instinct" will make them good soldiers, for in battle their only thought will be of their shooting.  
Democratic State chairman Simmons says with great frankness, in a chat with your correspondent, that the attempts by the North Carolina Republicans to use the federal courts for the prosecution of State election officers will probably interfere with the liberal policy which the Democrats had in mind along certain lines. He said: "The Republicans are crying, peace! peace! they can't expect peace while they are employing all the engineers of the courts to keep up friction between the parties."  
The Democrats in the legislature will hold their caucus on the night of January 8. They will select the speaker of the house and the other officers. There are four or five aspirants for the speakership.  
At the session today of the North Carolina Association of Academies, held in the capital, there were special addresses by Prof. Few of Trinity, Miss Hilliard of Oxford, Prof. Anderson of Trinity Park High School, Prof. Ellis of Sanford, and others.  
Secretary Bruner of the agricultural department says North Carolina won 28 prizes at Paris, of which 14 were for apples, the others being for tobacco, cotton, greens, gold, silver and copper ores, forestry, commercial timber, medicinal plants, her a, books and berries, natural history specimens, principally aquatic game. There were also given Mr. Bruner and curator Brimley special medals for collaboration of the exhibit. There were over 2,000 specimens. The cost of all, including Mr. Bruner's expenses at Paris, was under \$2,000, a very remarkable showing.  
**Too Severe Measures.**  
WEHVA, Ky., Dec. 27.—Mrs. Urra Nation, president of the Barberian society W. O. U., entered the Carey Hotel her room today, and with a stone smashed a \$2000 painting and a mirror valued at \$100.  
Mrs. Nation broke mirrors in two saloons at Kiowa, Kan., some months ago and declared there is no law under which she can be prosecuted. She was lodged in the county jail this afternoon charged with malicious destruction of property.

**MAY BE EXTRA SESSION.**  
Important Legislation May be Blocked. Ship Subsidy Causes Trouble.  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Senators who are known to enjoy the full confidence of the administration have begun to talk of the probability of an extra session of the next Congress on account of the failure of important legislation to get acted upon at this session. Inasmuch as the President and these same Senators were during the early days of the session urging upon their party associates to strain every point to avoid an extra session, the present talk is believed to be somewhat in the nature of a threat made for the purpose of lessening the opposition of a number of Senators to measures which it is desired to put through at this session. Although it is not believed that the President or any of his party wish an extra session, one may be made if necessary if they insist upon passing some bills, principal among which is the Ship Subsidy measure, because opposition to those may result in hanging up some of the regular appropriation bills.  
Senator Pettigrew has publicly given notice that he and Senators Butler, of North Carolina, and Allen, of Nebraska, intend to oppose every bill brought up in the Senate as long as the Ship Subsidy bill is pushed. If these three Senators live up to that notice either the Ship Subsidy bill will have to be dropped or there will be an extra session, as under the Senate rules it is easily possible for three resolute men to block legislation indefinitely, and Senator Allen already holds the record for speaking against time in the Senate. Besides, they are not the only opponents of that bill in the Senate.

**THE CHINESE MIX-UP.**  
PEKIN, Dec. 27.—Li Hung Chang and Prince Ching, the Chinese Peace Commissioners, have heard from the Emperor, Kwang Su. Prince Ching called on the former for consultation, remaining for over an hour.  
The Court objects strenuously to reducing the forts, and also to allowing permanent legation guards, which, it seems to think, could be made sufficiently large at any time it was desired, to menace the Court itself.  
After the conference it was decided to hold further communication with the Court before seeing the ministers.  
The British have increased their garrison at Yang Tsun by one hundred men, with horses and three guns.  
A flying column of 1,800 cavalry will scour the country between Tien Tsin and Yang Tsun, in obedience to Marshal von Waldersee's orders to be on the alert, in view of the French report of an engagement with 3,000 Chinese troops.  
Colonel Tullock's regiment will return to destroy the towns he recently held. This action is owing to the fact that it has been discovered that a number of Boxers unquestionably made them their headquarters. The British authorities say they do not expect serious trouble from the Boxers, mainly because they lack arms. Fortunately the Chinese Government feared to trust them with arms lest a rebellion against the dynasty be undertaken. Otherwise the danger might have been serious.
