THE FAIR. FOR WHOSE BENE-FIT.

The consideration of the matter whether the New Bern Fair shall be con tinued, or whether it shall be given up, is left to the decision of the business men and merchants of this city.

The Journal's position on the Fair, is that its continuance must have a sound and practical basis, and in the future the work of carrying on the Fair, shall be more equitably distributed, so that a few persons shall not have to bear all the burden, financial and otherwise, while others receive benefits without assisting in maintaining the Fair.

The fact that the Fair loses one hundred or five hundred dollars each year, is not a matter of serious importance. As an advertising medium, its value to New Bern and its people, is well worth the expenditure and loss of these hundreds of dollars.

But the matter to be justly considered in the loss of even one dollar, by hold ing these annual exhibitions, is, whose is the loss, and is the loss equitably distributed ?

The benefit of the Fair, from its advertising point of view, cannot be measured. It has been very great in the past, it can be made even greater in results in the future.

This benefit does not go direct to one, two or twenty individual residents of New Bern. While intangible, yet it is a valuable asset, the joint property of every citizen of the place.

The cost of securing this joint asset, by which every citizen is benefitted, involves money and labor.

And this money and labor expenditure cannot be justly imposed upon a few

The ability for successfully conducting a Fair does not belong to every one, but there are men possessing the requisites to successfully conduct a Fair, who can and will lend their efforts to the conduct of a Fair.

But while they may contribute their time and labor, it is certainly unjust that they shall also be made to bear the financial burden.

There are business interests in New Bern which receive direct and substan tial pecuniary benefits from each Annual Fair that is held, and these same interests do not contribute in work or money to the Fair's success.

In the future, these interests should bear their proportion of any loss incurred by holding these annual exhibi-

The Fair is the joint property of every citizen, so far as its success goes, and proportionately any labor or money, or both, demanded in the conduct of the Fair, must be equitably divided among the citizens of New Bern.

If the people bear their part, individ ually and collectively, there need be no fear but that there will be a Fair management which shall attend to the holding of Fairs, that shall do credit to this
