THE STATE CAPITAL.
Chief Justiceship Still Matter of Discussion.
Chief Justice Faircloth's Great Gift. Charters to New Corporations. Decrease in Bar Rooms. Dinner to Aged Poor. Farmers Holding Cotton.

RALEIGH, Jan. 2.—Development regarding the Chief Justiceship were awaited with interest to-day. Friends of Governor Russell continued to say that if he was given the endorsement of the bar he would resign and take the place, but that if he was not endorsed Charles A. Cook could be placed as the winner.
The late Chief Justice Faircloth left \$20,000 by the terms of his will to the Baptist Female University here. This comes at an opportune time, as the Baptists of the State are at work raising an endowment fund for the University.
The Grand Secretary of the Odd Fellows to-day received an application for a lodge at Chadbourn.
During the past three months no fewer than 67 charters have been granted to corporations in this State.
But a few years ago there were fifty-two bar-rooms in this county. Now there are only twenty-one, and all in Raleigh and none at any other point in the county. Five barkeepers went out of that business day before yesterday. It is said that three of them told Rev. George H. Stewart, the evangelist, that they would abandon the business at the end of the year.
William W. Fuller, chief counsel of the American Tobacco Company, at New York, is here on a visit to his father Judge Thomas O. Fuller of the U. S. Court of Land Claims.
The annual dinner to the aged poor was given here yesterday afternoon and 150 partook of it. Dinner was served in the Third Baptist church, which had been cleared and converted into a dining hall for the occasion.
Rev. J. B. Hurley to-day arrived here and began his new duties as agent for the Methodist Orphanage.
During December there were only seventeen deaths in Raleigh. This is a particularly good record.
Farmers continue to hold their cotton. The sales are very light. They are in easy circumstances and as they say "don't have to sell and are holding for higher prices."
The orator of the day at the Emancipation Day celebration here said frankly he believed the amendment limiting the negro franchise might prove a blessing to his race.

CUDAHY OFFER GOOD.
Will Pay For Arrest of Kidnappers. Pat Crowe Reported Caught.
OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 1.—Gen. John C. Crowe, Mr. Cudahy's lawyer, said to-day in reference to the offer by the Omaha Council of a \$25,000 reward for the arrest of the men who kidnaped Eddie Cudahy:
"Mr. Cudahy does not withdraw his offer of \$25,000 reward for the arrest and conviction of the kidnapers. He meant what he said when he made the offer, and he means it now. He will pay the amount in addition to whatever the city or any other individual will give for the apprehension and conviction of the criminals. He will give the city the control of the payment of it, to be used with what they desire to pay as a reward. I regard as a bluff the last letter of the kidnapers threatening the murder of the boy if the reward was not withdrawn by Mr. Cudahy. To submit would be to invite all kinds of impositions."
STOUT, Iowa, Jan. 1.—A special to the Journal from Chadron, Neb., says:
"Pat Crowe, the supposed abductor of young Edward Cudahy, has been captured near the State line between Nebraska and South Dakota. Three detectives following Crowe's trail came upon him on the Pine Ridge reservation near Oelrichs, South Dakota, and captured him after a wild chase. Crowe was driving a team and a buckboard. He whipped the horses and tried to outrun the horsemen, who soon brought him to a halt with their six-shooters.
"John Delfelder, a cattleman, has just reached town with the news, and says the posse had stopped at a ranch about thirty miles out for lunch and to feed their horses."

New York, Jan. 1.—The little knot of men who traded in securities under a tree in Wall street 100 years ago would have been amazed could they have witnessed the closing scenes of the century on the Stock Exchange. Stock values this year increased over a billion.
The speculative fever, which had its beginning the day after election counting was unabated. Stocks have advanced from \$4 to 30 points throughout the list, and still the great bull movement keeps on. The professional operators are struggling helplessly in the great maelstrom of public buying.
The value of American securities during the year 1900 increased \$1,071,812,288. Standard Oil Company stock increased in value 330 per cent, while the stock of the Pennsylvania Coal Company increased 410 per cent, in value.
