### ELECT SENATOR TODAY.

Bill Introduced By Republican To Amend Constitution.

Rich Confirmed For Commissioner of Insurance. Bill to Amend Insurance Law. To Tax Dealers in Pistols.

Raleigh, Jan. 21.—The Senate in executive session today confirmed Gov. Aycock's nomination of James Rich for Commissioner of Insurance.

Bills were ratified incorporating the Hartford Banking Company, and extending the powers of the Whitney Produce Company, one of the largest corporations in North Carolina.

Bills introduced to tax dealers in pistols; to incorporate the Asheville and Weaverville Railway; to prevent trust pools and monopolies, this being virtually a law as now in force in Texas. To amend the insurance law by providing that when property is entirely destroyed by fire, without negligence of owner, the value of the property as given in the insurance policy, shall be taken as the true value.

A joint resolution was adopted for the election of United States Senator at noon, tomorrow, when F. M. Simmons will receive the Democratic vote, and Richard Pearson, the Republican vote.

In the House today, Carson, Republican, introduced a bill to amend the Constitution so as to eliminate Negroes and Indians in making appointments for Congressional and Judicial districts.

Democrats charge that this bill is inspired by Congressman Lindsey, from whose county Carson comes and that it is a hit at the eastern part of the State.

### Cuba Suffers With Cold.

Santiago, Cuba, Jan. 20.—This section of the island is now suffering from the severest cold known here for years.

Much distress has been caused among the natives, who are without protection from the rigors of the climate. The temperature of 60° is unprecedented. Many children are suffering for suitable clothing. A telephone message from the Guama Mine, 40 miles west of Santiago reports snow on the summit of Mount Torquino, at an altitude of 8,000 feet.

### MAY HAVE TO CLOSE BARS.

Anti-Canteen Provision Thought To Affect Old P.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—It is reported from Old Point that the Canteen and Hygiene Hotel people are concerned over the question of how the anti-canteen clause in the new Army bill will apply to their establishments.

On inquiry among members of both houses who voted for the clause in question, it is ascertained no doubt exists that these two hotels will have to abolish their bars and give up selling wine at the table. They are both built on a Government reservation and subject to exactly the same rules and regulations as apply to the army.

This will also apply to the private hotel on the Government reservation at West Point. It was said by some Congressmen that possibly under the rulings of the Interstate Commerce Commission guests at these hotels could bring in liquors from the outside in the original packages when payment was made on the outside. But this would most likely be subject to official construction.

Royal Family gathers at Osborne awaiting the End.

Dispatches yesterday morning said Queen Victoria had improved, but last night dispatches said the Queen was living, but thought to be dying.

The members of the royal family are gathered at Osborne, Isle of Wight, awaiting the end.

London, Jan. 21.—All is ready to administer the oath to the new King, who will become Edward VII. It is understood that the Prince of Wales has received authority to act in the Queen's stead, and thus has been created a practical though not constitutional, regency.

### Sheep's "Owns" Their Engines.

The railroad engineer who "owns" his engine is not in favor with his superiors. Complaints about trivial matters are likely to be made against him, and soon he finds himself without a berth. ### RALEIGH.

### Governor Signs Commission For Congress Manufacturers Not to Fight Anti-Cigarette Bill.

Raleigh, Jan. 21.—Gov. Aycock today signed the commission of Congressman E. W. Poirer. The other commissions had nearly all been signed by Gov. Russell.

Representative Carleton of Duplin county this morning received news that his father was last night paralyzed. The "battle of the braves," before the legislature, is now beginning. Agents and attorneys are numerous and increasing.

It is learned from a prominent attorney here that the cigarette manufacturers have decided not to pay any attention to the anti-cigarette bill, as under the decision of the United States Supreme court it will be ineffective even if it becomes law.

Some years ago "Dr. J. W. Johnson" served a term in the penitentiary here. Now he is in for another term as "Bechtler." He contends that he is not Bechtler but Johnson and has instituted habeas corpus proceedings. The case comes up here tomorrow before associate justice Montgomery at Chambers. It is a case of identification.

A letter comes from Michigan to the warden of the penitentiary here saying "Robert" alias Lyman R. Blair of New York is wanted there for forgery. Roberts is the man Gov. Russell pardoned at request of Gov. Odell of New York, and then tried to rearrest.
