Only Practical Farmers Wanted on Agricultural Board.

Label Law Bill Passes Second Reading. Allimony Divorce Bill. Permanent Registration Under Grand Father Clause. Election Contest Ended.

RALEIGH, January 25.—The Legislative sessions today were uninteresting. The Label law passed its second reading in the Senate.

Considerable discussion passed on the bill providing that only practical farmers be on the Board of Agriculture. It was shown that there are now on the Board, persons who have no knowledge of farming. This was sharply criticized. The bill was referred to the Agricultural committee.

There was a House debate on the bill to give alimony in cases of absolute divorce. This bill was set as special order for next Tuesday.

A bill was introduced in the House to provide permanent registration for all persons entitled to vote under section four of the Constitution, as amended last August by the "Grand Father Clause."

One election contest has ended, McNeill, Republican, against Green, Democrat, from Wilkes county. The committee reported unanimously for Green, the sitting member. McNeill had withdrawn all depositions. Green retains his seat. The vote was 86 to 12, four Populists and Populists voting with the Democrats.

**FUNERAL OF THE QUEEN.**

Will be Held From Windsor Castle February 2nd.

COWEN, Isle of Wight, January 24.—It has been decided that the funeral of the Queen will take place at Windsor Castle, February 2d. The body of the late Queen will be removed from Osborne House February 1st. It was the expressed desire of the Queen that the funeral should be military in character. Several officials arrived from Windsor this morning, bringing the State regalia. It was carried in a balm bag. A naval salute of twenty-one guns was fired here at noon today in honor of King Edward VII.

**RALEIGH.**

Long Discussion on Text Books. Anti-Trust Bills. Prominent People Sick.

RALEIGH, Jan. 25.—John Ruffin, a young negro charged with having outraged a young negro girl in Alamance county, was to have been hanged at Graham today but Gov Aycock grants a respite until Feb. 1, so he can look for some evidence which it is claimed is favorable. Three weeks ago Gov. Russell resented Ruffin.

A commission was today issued to P. M. Pearsall, Gov. Aycock's private secretary, as military secretary, with the rank of colonel, in accordance with law.

The joint legislative committee on education was in session in the Senate chamber until one after midnight last night, in fact until 1 o'clock hearing argument on the school book question, that is whether there shall or shall not be "State adoption" of text books. J. H. Poy spoke as attorney of the University Publishing Company; F. H. Busbee and T. B. Womack for the American Book Company; Cyrus B. Watson and Armistead Jones for the B. F. Johnson Publishing Company; Charles M. Busbee and Maj. Patten, of New York for the University Publishing Company. The discussion was warm. It was decided to refer the Aycock bill which is the one under discussion, to a sub committee composed of Aycock and Brown, Waters, Whitaker, Shannonhouse and Carr representatives.

This evening, at the Itaney library, the alumni of the State University resident in Raleigh gave an informal reception. At this Gov. Aycock and other State officers, President Venable and members of the University faculty and a number of members of the legislature were present.

There is a great deal of discussion of anti-trust bills. Rountree of New Hanover says he sees but one way of reaching the trusts, which crush out local or union enterprise by putting down prices at the point they desire to reach. His bill will require that no matter what price may be asked for a product it shall be the same all over the country, this under penalty of forfeiture of rights to do business in this State. He says this will put a stop to the greatest power the trusts have.

William C. Stropach, who has been chairman of the executive board of the Soldiers' Home ever since it was opened is very sick at his home here. He has cancer.

William S. Asha, State forester, the talented son of S. A. Asha, is very sick at his home here. He has lung trouble. His work for the State, particularly along the line of forest conservation and propagation has been of great value.
