THE LEGISLATURE.

A Number of New Bills Introduced Yesterday.

Railroads Incorporated. To Aid Confederate Veterans. Elizabeth City Ferry. Craven County Hunting to be Regulated.

RALEIGH, Jan. 30.—The Senate today passed bills incorporating three railways the Piedmont and Alleghany to run from the Georgia line through three counties to Tennessee line, the Rutherfordton Railway, and the Hilton railway Company.

A bill was passed providing that only practical farmers be eligible to membership on the board of agriculture.

The Borden and Rookfish railway was amended so as to allow extensions and branches thirty miles long.

A bill to allow alimony in cases of absolute divorce failed to pass. The vote was yeas eighteen, nays twenty.

Bill was introduced in the House to place on the pension roll all Confederate veterans over 65 years old who are worth not over \$500. A bill was introduced to allow Spartanburg and Asheville Railway to become consolidated and one to reduce prices of school books.

The election contest of Cowell, Republican against Deas, Democrat, sitting member from Pamlico Co., decided in Deas favor.

Most of the House session today was devoted to the discussion of the Senate bill to give E. F. Lam's ferry rights at Elizabeth City. It passed 59 to 38 after declarations by several Democrats that it was a monopoly and undemocratic.

Bills passed in the Senate incorporating the Hertford Telephone Co., incorporating the Washington Chamber of Commerce, and prohibiting hunting in Craven county without the consent of land owner, also a bill increasing the number of Hertford county commissioners.

A bill was ratified incorporating the Bank of Fremont, also bills for establishing graded schools in Rocky Mount and a law the towns of Wilson to issue bonds.

Stock Exchange Will Close.

New York, Jan. 29.—The Governors of the New York Stock Exchange at a special meeting held today, decided to suspend business on Saturdays, February 24, the day of the funeral of Queen Victoria.

BODY HOME FROM CHINA.

Wyatt Hicks who Fell at Pekin Will Receive Military Funeral.

RALEIGH, January 30.—The body of Wyatt Hicks was brought here today. He belonged to the 14th United States Infantry and was killed in the storming of Pekin August sixth last. His body was met by the local military and taken to his home in Raleigh. He will be given a military funeral tomorrow.

BIG RECEIPTS.

Cotton Being Rushed Into New York to Fill the Short Sales.

Shippers Made From Mills and Nearby Cities. Deliveries Yesterday. What is to be Done With Large Stocks?

New York, January 30.—The interest in the cotton market today continued to center in the January "deal." It is estimated in a rather tame manner than expected for the last few days because the short interest outstanding has been much smaller than stated in many published newspaper accounts, and also as a result of the ability of dealers to obtain a large amount of cotton from adjacent towns and get it here in time for delivery.

Thus the gross receipts here yesterday were 7,800 bales while today they reached the enormous total of 21,417 bales in gross and 7,131 in net. This cotton has been brought here on special chartered vessels and some by express trains with a good deal of it secured from surplus stocks owned by mills at New England points and held by merchants at Philadelphia and Norfolk.

There is still considerable more cotton on the way which is expected to arrive in time for delivery to the clique, which will swell the total amount of "contract" cotton here to over 100,000 bales, against 60,000 last week, 33,000 on January 1, and 14,000 on December 15th.

January closed today at 11 cents. The feature of the January deal today was the issuance of "notices" for delivery equivalent to over 40,000 bales. These notices were issued by all the representatives of local cotton houses and brokerage firms. They circulated through the forenoon but finally found their way to the office of Fernal Wilson and Company, who have been representing and acting for the clique on the exchange in control of the January deal. It is expected that notices to the extent of 15,000 to 20,000 bales may be issued later this afternoon and tomorrow and that this firm will have to take all the cotton.

There is no question that they expected to receive as much cotton as this and just what they intend to do with it is the problem the trade are trying to solve as freight brokers say there is an evidence that any large amount of freight room has recently been engaged for cotton shipments.

In Memory of the Queen.

MANILA, Jan. 29.—General MacArthur has issued orders that all duty throughout this military division, except the necessary guard and field duty, be suspended on the day of Queen Victoria's funeral. At revivals a national salute will be fired and single guns will be fired half-hourly between sunrise and sundown, when a salute to the Union Jack of 45 guns will be given.

Alcohol and the Brain.

A lecture delivered by Dr. Victor Horsley in England on "The Action of Alcohol on the Brain" showed how fibers connect all parts of the brain so that it acts as a whole. It was desired to find out whether the brain as a whole works as well with alcohol as without. One way of testing this was by testing the reaction time, the length taken in receiving a given signal. He tried a complex experiment, showing a signal with a number on it which was not to be signalled back unless it was above ten. This took longer, involving association of ideas, and the time from the very first was prolonged by alcohol. Professor Horsley said that chloroform, ether, nitrous oxide and similar narcotics acted in the same way. Alcohol produced a dissipation of the nerve centers.

Krepelin had tried the action of alcohol on muscular power by means of the pressure dynamometer, which was suspended at regular intervals. After a full alcohol was taken, and at first there was a little increase, soon followed by a notable decrease. Under the influence of tea there was no decrease at all. He showed a diagram constructed by Dr. Archibald Ferguson representing the amount of type set up by certain compositors in a quarter of an hour before and after taking alcohol. The amount was made less by alcohol.

Confederate Veteran Bills. Railroads Pay in Their Taxes as Agreed. No dog tax or Compulsory Education.

RALEIGH, January 30.—It is reasonably certain that there will be no "shoe string" districts. These of course were made to go up the negro vote, as to the 2nd district. Under the new system the districts will be compact and homogeneous. They will be so arranged as to throw mountain people together and sea shore people together.

The odds are ninety-nine to one that the legislature will make no dog tax law.

The talk about proposals or plans to sell the State's interest in the North Carolina and Atlantic and North Carolina railroads has been pretty thoroughly considered and your correspondent can find no real basis for it.

It appears now practically certain that there will be State adoption of school books, and that this will be by the State board of education.

Compulsory education bills met with no favor at the hands of the legislature. One has been tabled. Others will share that fate.

About 100 bills to pension individual soldiers, whose applications have failed before the county boards have been introduced in the legislature. All are being held up, in order to get the views of the Confederate Veterans' State Association which met in the Senate Chamber this evening, with delegates representing the 62 camps.

The Daughters of the Confederacy committee to memorialize the legislature met here this afternoon. There are 25 chapters in the State. It is the plan to have one in each county.

Judge Thomas C. Fuller is reported to be quite sick at Charlotte. He has some affection of the heart.

The Atlantic Coast Line to-day paid to the State treasurer \$14,989. This is in accord with the agreement made yesterday by which this railway the Southern and the Seaboard Air Line agree to an increase of their tax valuation \$17,894,000, yesterday afternoon on the Seaboard paid in \$11,341, and the Southern \$18,333.

Gov. Aycock today notified the Sheriff of Alamance county that he declined to interfere further with the execution of John Ruffin, the young negro in jail at Graham and to be hanged next Saturday for outraging a young girl. Ruffin has been twice respited; once by Gov. Russell and once by Gov. Aycock.

There is a good deal of amusement because of Dr. Speight's bill, introduced in the Senate, providing for the examination and license of barbers and also of prevention of the spread of "barbers' itch." Senator Speight is very serious.

Thus far about 115 bills have been ratified. Five sixths of these are local and trivial.

The chairman of the corporation commission said in an interview some time ago that there would be a marked development in the way of railway construction in the State this year and that a number of new charters would be applied for. Thus far charters have been granted by the legislature for 8 railroads. The amount of railway construction in the State in 1900 was 63 miles.


