COMMITTEE AT IT.

Investigating Proposed Impeachment of Furches and Douglas.

Witnesses Called for Examination. No Instance of Impeachment. Talking Behind Closed Doors. Bills Introduced and Passed Yesterday.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 1. Bills were passed in House by Smith for relief of the clerk of Gates county for relief of school directors of Hertford; amending the law regarding fishing in Nouse river; giving the appointment of the trustees of the negro normal school at Goldsboro to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction; to amend the law of 1889 regarding shooting wild fowl in Dare county; to amend wreckage law.

Bills were introduced in the Senate to incorporate the Farmers Bank of La Grange.

Bills passed incorporating Winterville high school, Pitt county; to establish graded schools in Greenville; to pay J. S. Mann balance due as shell fish commissioner; to regulate the working of convicts in Pasquotank county.

The investigation by the Sub Judiciary committee of the lower house of the facts bearing upon the matter of the proposed impeachment of Judges Furches and Douglas of the Supreme Court is very active.

Judge Montgomery of the Supreme Court and Thomas S. Kenan, its clerk were examined this afternoon, and tonight Judge Walter Clark was examined. The proceedings of the Committee are behind closed doors in the Supreme Court building.

There has never been an impeachment of a Justice in North Carolina. In two cases it was prevented by resignations, Judge Newbold being one instance.

The sub-committee consists of Mr. Allen of Wake chairman, Mr. Craig of Buncombe, Mr. Graham of Granville, Mr. Conner of Wilson and Mr. Spaulding of Burke. A report will be made to the full Judiciary Committee early next week.

THE QUEEN'S FUNERAL.

Through Streets of London Today. Great Naval Spectacle.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The Earl Marshal, the Duke of Norfolk, gave out the programme this evening, subject to a change of weather which may necessitate some of the visiting dignitaries using carriages instead of riding.

On Saturday, February 24, a guard of honor will be mounted at the London stations, Victoria and Paddington, and at Buckingham Palace. At 9 o'clock precisely the Royal coffin will be removed from Portsmouth to London, arriving at Victoria at 11 o'clock. There an officer and twelve men of the Grenadier Guards will place the coffin on a gun carriage and the crown and cushion will be laid thereon.

A gun-carriage, surrounded by bearer party of non-commissioned officers of the Guards, outside of these on either side will be two lines, the Lord Chamberlain, aides-de-camp, the Queen's Physician, Sir James Reid, Egerton and Lord-in-waiting on the left, and the Lord-in-waiting on the right. Immediately behind the gun-carriage comes the King, riding. On his left the Duke of Connaught; on his right, Emperor William, both riding.

The Royal family, Royal representatives and Master-of-the-horse, all riding. Four four-horse carriages, conveying the Queen and Princess.

The King, of Belgium, Portugal and the Netherlands, probably riding, closing the escort.

Cowes, Jan. 31.—A glittering crescent of light stretches this evening from Cowes to Portsmouth. It consists of ten miles of warships, the pick of the British, French, and German navies. These lie at anchor, ready to take their part in to-morrow's ceremonies, when the navy will pay a last magnificent tribute to the Sovereign whose reign was marked by the greatest naval progress in the history of the nation.

It will probably be nearly 4 o'clock to-morrow afternoon before the Alberta, with the Royal coffin, leaves Cowes. She will steam inside the single line and then enter the passage formed by the vessels.

The elaborate preparations will make tomorrow's spectacle rival in magnificence the naval and military display which marked Queen Victoria's Jubilee.

IN THE LEGISLATURE.

Bills Passed. A Lobbyist Bill. State Librarian Chosen. Message For Governor Read.

RALEIGH, Feb. 1.—A resolution was introduced in the House today and adopted authorizing the Judiciary Committee to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of papers in the matter of the proposed impeachment of the two Supreme Court Justices, Furches and Douglas. The committee this afternoon began the examination of witnesses.

The House passed a bill to regulate lobbyists, requiring them to register. The bill is an exact copy of the Wisconsin law. The section was stricken out which required lobbyists to wear white ties they received. The vote was on the bill was yeas 49 nays 34.

M. O. bill was cleared. State Librarian for two years.

A message for Gov. Aycock was read transmitting the report of the corporation commission, with details of the compromise and settlement of the tax assessment cases against the railways. The Governor warmly recommends the ratification of the settlement and says that the lawyers fees in the cases are over eighteen thousand dollars and will be twenty thousand annually if the suits continue. He says the compromise effected is both just and wise, and recommends that the assessment of railways stand until 1903.

A resolution was introduced in the Senate to investigate the Soldiers' Home.

The bill allowing alimony in cases of absolute divorce passed its third reading without debate.

The general effect is to deteriorate the most sensitive part of the body the eye; is cheap spectacles the spheric curves being irregular, whose result is cylindrical lens causing the eye wearing it to become astigmatic, the most troublesome defect in optician and patient, the frames of some lens being made imperfectly causes them to be decentered, resulting in muscle trouble, in fact any frame at all price not adjusted right will cause astigmatism (astigmatism).

OPINIONS DIFFER.

Upon the Proposed Impeachment of the Supreme Court Judges.

Some Democrats are Opposed. They Assign Reasons For the Opposition. Senators Inclined to Keep Silent.

RALEIGH, FEBRUARY 1.—Most of the talk today was about the resolutions looking to impeachment of two of the three Republican Supreme Court Justices, on the ground that they disobeyed the mandate of the legislature. There was a good deal of talk among the Democratic Senators, one said, "So far as I know the State is keeping very quiet and the resolution was a surprise to them. They are not talking even to one another about it, and I think this shows their purpose to be very conservative." Another Senator said, "I will oppose the thing, I think it impolitic. I don't believe it will go through." Of course the hour press articles of impeachment and the Senate sits as a high court of impeachment. It has been 30 years since an impeachment trial. The last one was that of Judge Holden.

A member of the house said he fully believed it would adopt the resolutions. In fact he pretty plainly intimated that this course was agreed on.

There are Democrats who say the justices named are to be ousted because the Supreme Court will during the present year be called on to pass upon the constitutionality of the "grand father clause" etc., of the constitutional amendment ratified at the polls last August, and that the court as now constituted will decide adversely, while if two judges are ousted the Governor will have the right to fill the vacancies.

There is a curious story current to the effect that some Democrats feared that associate Justice Furches if made Chief Justice cannot be reached by impeachment proceedings and hence were desirous that Gov. Russell should take the Chief Justiceship, so as to make it sure that Furches and Douglas, by remaining in their positions could be reached by impeachment proceedings. It is further said that some of the Republicans aware of this move used the greatest possible influence to induce Gov. Russell to make Furches, whom he personally hates, Chief Justice. Now then the question arises, can Furches be reached?

It is said that Judge Furches expected the Legislature to impeach him when it met in special session last year.

The Republicans denounce heartily the idea of impeachment, and say they know who is really pressing the matter and has pressed it for a year.

It is said at the office of the state Auditor that the falling off in what is known as privilege taxes for 1900 as compared with 1899 will be at least \$25,000. The revenue act of 1899 which abolished what was known as the merchants' purchase tax is only now being felt, as the taxes now being paid in are those collected for 1900.

At Graham today John Haffin, colored having refused to testify further, Haffin's victim was a little negro girl.

The Porto Rico Cases.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—It is now certain that the Supreme Court will not head down the decision in the Porto Rico case before February 21, as the court announced a recess from today until February 11, when a session will be held for the announcement of decisions and reading of opinions, after which an adjournment will follow in February 23.
