MANY BILLS.

Legislature Busy Making New and Amending Old Laws.

Elizabeth City Ferry. Bill For Insurance Companies. Railroad Bills. To Ventilate Capital. Steamer Lilly. Claims in Carteret.

 RALEIGH, Feb. 4.—Bills were introduced in Senate today to give Wilmington & Southern Railway further time for beginning its construction. A bill passed allowing the Norfolk and Western Railway to further extend its lines into North Carolina and to build branches.

A resolution for ventilating the Legislature Halls was adopted, there being now an utter absence of ventilation. A resolution was adopted to investigate the charges of extravagance and padding of the expense account at the institution for the blind. A bill was ratified incorporating the Allegheny and Piedmont Railway.

Bills were introduced in the House to establish a dispensary at Winston; to prohibit the Supreme Court from licensing the negroes as lawyers; to prohibit the raising of peanuts on State Penitentiary farms, after this year, claim being that this depreciates the price of peanuts.

A bill was introduced in the House providing that any insurance company doing business in North Carolina removing a case from this State for the Federal Court will have its license revoked by the insurance commissioner no matter what is the amount involved.

A bill then taxes insurance companies outside of the Craig act passed two years ago which required them to domesticate themselves and forbid the removal of cases to the Federal courts. The committee this evening amended this bill and unanimously agreed to report it favorably.

Members of the House from the 9th Judicial District had an informal meeting today to consider charges against Solicitor Marshal L. Mott, looking to his impeachment. A full meeting of Democratic and Republican members is called for tomorrow to take final action. It is a non-partisan movement, Republicans only taking part in it.

A bill was introduced in the Senate by Ward to incorporate the town of Washington, by Senator Miller of Pamlico, to amend the law regarding a short form Agricultural lien.

The Senate concurred in the House amendment for the bill giving E. F. Lamb all the ferry privileges at Elizabeth City and the bill was enrolled for ratification.

RALEIGH.

State Bank as Depositories For State Funds.

Legislators Pleased With Settlement of Railroad Cases. Applications For Licenses as Attorneys. Must use School Books Adopted.

RALEIGH, Feb. 4.—The Supreme Court devoted today to the examination of applicants for license as attorneys. Of these there were 38. It will be about a week before the result is made known, as the examination is in writing and all the papers have to be looked over.

A bill is before the Legislature authorizing the issue of the third \$100,000 for Raleigh street improvements. An effort will be made to so amend the bill that \$10,000 of the amount may be need for an auditorium.

The railroads have, as stated, settled their tax assessment cases. The legislators are well pleased at the settlement. The Western Union telegraph's case is yet in the courts. It is assessed at \$1,000,000, but under order of court only pays taxes on \$800,000. It also pays 2 per cent tax on gross receipts.

Raleigh will have three special theatrical attractions next week, May Irwin, Eric Hope (the Earl of Yarmouth) and the Bostonians.

State Treasurer Lacy tells me he has sent letters to 60 banks, designating them as State depositories, and telling them that as such they must deposit collateral in amounts ranging from \$2,000 to \$25,000, and that his drafts on the banks must be remitted without cost to the State. Replies are rapidly coming in, saying this arrangement is satisfactory.

The State Treasurer wished to ascertain, for the legislative finance committee, what the governments inheritance tax amounts to in North Carolina. He wrote the commissioner of internal revenue. Today he received the following reply: "Your inquiry whether the collector of internal revenue could be authorized to furnish the State legislative finance committee information concerning inheritance taxes has been received. I send you the regulations forbidding the giving out by collectors of revenue of records in their office or copies thereof for information for purposes not contemplated by the revenue law. These regulations have been sustained by the Supreme Court."

The State treasurer now has in the office the three old clerks who are teaching the new ones the work. The latter get no pay. March 1st, the old ones will be dropped. The bookkeeping in the treasury is by far the most intricate in the State.

Bill Passed Over Protest.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—When the House met today some minor business was transacted by unanimous consent.

Mr. Mahon, chairman of the Committee on War Claims, called up the unfinished business of the House, relating to that committee, being a bill for the relief of St. Johns Lodge A. F. & M. No. 8, of New Bern, N. C. This bill was pending in the House May 18, 1900, having been favorably reported from the committee of the whole, and the question being on the engrossment and third reading the bill is a claim for \$13,000 damages alleged to have been done the property and for its use as a Federal hospital during the Civil war. The passage of the measure was opposed by Mr. Payne. He contended that the property had been improved by the Federal troops. He also claimed that the Masonic building at New Bern was at one time used as a blanket and cartridge factory by the Confederate States.

Mr. Thomas made a vigorous speech in support of the bill. It bristled with facts. He showed skill in grouping his data, displayed tact in handling his subject, and by his earnestness convinced the House of the honesty of the claim. He was rewarded by success. The bill passed over the protest of the House leaders by the handsome vote of 148 to 49.—Raleigh Post.
