GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Urges Immediate Consideration For
University.

One Hundred and Fifty Petitions
For Fair Election Law. To
Investigate Blind As-
ylum. Long Dis-
cussion on Divorce
Law.

RALPH, Feb. 5.—Governor Aycock
in a message to the Legislature making
report on the State University, and ur-
ging its consideration, saying that the
University had reached its limit, unless
further provision is made.

Bill were introduced in the Senate for
reapportionment of Congressional dis-
tricts.

There was a rather sharp discussion
of the resolution to investigate the
charges against the school for the Blind
here, and that matter was placed in
charge of a special committee. The
charges are made by employees and are
of undue violence.

Bills were introduced in the House to
charter the Duplin and Onslow Railway
to protect timber owners: to increase
the power of county pension boards.

There was a heated political debate re-
garding the petitions for a fair election
law, one hundred and fifty of which
have been presented by the Republican
members. Zachary attacked these saying
they were prepared by and circulated
under the direction of Richmond Pear-
son whom he termed "as base a trickster
in the mountains of North Carolina as
this State has ever produced. I advise
my Republican friends when they intro-
duce petitions on this subject to cut off
the ear marks of Richmond Pearson."

The Republicans replied that they had
introduced the petitions in good faith.

There was a long discussion over the
bill to repeal old divorce laws enacted
since 1897. The committee affirmed the
amendment that willful, deliberate, per-
manent abandonment and separation
for three years shall be ground for ab-
solute divorce; but the judge can refuse to
grant it if in his opinion there is col-
lusion, and no just ground. The bill
was made a special order for Thurs-
day.

Mrs. Nation's Home Defenders.

TOPEKA, Kas. Feb. 4.—Mrs. Carry
Nation has organized here a company of
"Home Defenders," 800 strong. All are
women, except about thirty old men
and boys. Mrs. Nation spoke in three
different churches today. Her talk is to
the effect that if the law officers refuse
to enforce the law prohibiting the sale
of liquor it becomes the duty of the peo-
ple to take the law in their own hands.

Mrs. Nation has visited the leading
joints in town and notified the proprie-
tors that unless they close her "Home
Defenders" will smash them. Her pro-
gramme is to march with the defenders
into the joints tomorrow afternoon and
make a final demand that they be closed.
She says nothing as to whether she will
begin smashing if the demand be not
complied with.

City Marshal Stahl has detailed an
officer to watch Mrs. Nation. All the
joints have guards at the front and back
doors and some of them are armed.

STATE MATTERS.

Comment on the Judiciary Affair. The
Willard bill, which will fight, Crop
Report. Workmen Recover.

RALPH, February 5.—The legisla-
tive committee on judiciary had a long
session last night on the impeachment
matter. It met again this afternoon and
took up the same matter in continu-
ation. There are about 45 members of
the committee. Members talked some
this morning about what might be done.
One said there would be either a repri-
mand of the court in the presence of the
general assembly or else impeachment,
and that as for himself he opposed im-
peachment. He spoke of several of the
members of the sub-committee, saying
Cannon was conservative, but that
Graham was not for impeachment, and that
Craig was against for it.

THE IMPEACHMENT.

Three Hours Discussion Leads to
no Vote.

Opponents Say Precedent Would
Prove Dangerous. Republicans
Demand Action to Advan-
tage. Postponement of
Further Action to
Thursday.

RALPH, February 5.—This afternoon
the House Judiciary committee, which
is considering the matter of impeach-
ing Judges Pritchard and Douglas of the
Supreme court, had a three hours ses-
sion.

Many speeches were made, some in
favor of impeachment, others for a repri-
mand. No vote was taken. It is said
that one been taken it would have been in
favor of impeachment, but the op-
ponents were active and earnest. One of
these declared to the committee that it
was a dangerous precedent, and that if
the idea was carried into effect it would
strike one of the best judges on the
bench who had issued a mandamus for
the payment of some claims expressly
forbidden by the legislature of 1897.

The telegram sent to the Judges by
Senator Pritchard and Congressman
Linney and Pearson created a stir in the
committee, and was strongly de-
nounced.

It was the first time polls had been
mentioned in the discussion of this mat-
ter. Members begged others not to let
it goad them into unwise or precipitate
action, declaring it was written for that
very purpose. In other words the Repub-
lican leaders want impeachment, intend-
ing to use it as a party lever.

Opponents of the impeachment regard
the postponement until Thursday as a de-
cided action. One member says it means
defeat of the impeachment.
