LEGISLATURES ALL AGAINST THE STATE PRESS.

A claim comes from Raleigh that the Legislature will not grant the Press of the State a just and protective libel law.

This attempt of the Press to secure a libel law, seems to be the old story repeated, its request is treated with contempt, its bill for the libel law wanted being pigeon holed or reported unfavorably, although those having the putting to death of these oft repeated bills to secure a just libel law, sneak away without having the manhood to present a reason for turning down the bill offered.

Fusionist, Populist, Republican and Democrat, alike, in all Legislatures are equally hostile towards the Press of North Carolina in its attempt to secure a just libel law.

The excuse that the Press is Democratic, therefore a Fusion Legislature would not grant its request, is now exploded, and the Press has to face the fact, that neither party work nor person character are worth a row of pins, if it seeks to secure legislation for itself in any General Assembly of this State.

To secure any legislation it must do its work before the members of an Assembly are elected, and see to it that no member is elected who will not favor a just libel law being enacted in North Carolina.

The Press has had enough of the fawning and promising anti-election politician, who once elected never remembers those who boosted him into office. In the next campaign, having now cleared the State of its most objectionable political features, the Press can go into the campaign with a little axe of its own to have ground, instead of being used as an instrument to forward every State interest, and being denied a voice in any legislation it may ask for itself.

And meanwhile let the names of those who report against the libel bill in the present legislature be known, and let the Press give these names the publicity they well deserve.

The Skin and the Lungs.

"Everybody knows the story about the little boy that was covered with gold leaf as a cherub for some Roman pomp and low he died in agony a few hours afterward. The poisons manufactured by his own organisms slow him, to say nothing of his suffocation. Burns involving more than one third of the general surface are fatal because the excretory powers of the skin are lessened beyond the abilities of the other depuratory organs to make up for it. "Varnish an animal and it will die in from six to twelve hours, say some authorities. This incontrovertible fact is matched by another equally incontrovertible—that nobody ever heard of any case of tearing and feathering that killed the victim. He might have had all kinds of trouble in getting the stuff off, and he might have felt a shock to his pride, but he didn't die that anybody ever heard of. I never assisted at a ceremony of this kind at either end of the joke, and so I can't speak as to the completeness with which the body is covered with the tar, but from my general knowledge of the character of the people of the west and southwest, where such sports are freely indulged in, I should say that it would most likely be a thorough and comprehensive pigmentation. It may be that the man breathes through the quills of the feathers stuck on, but I doubt it. I should think tar would seal up the pores of the skin quite as effectually as varnish, and it is a paint warranted to wear in all weathers and not to crack or scale off."
