It is often remarked, why does not Mister Blank, with all his money do s mething with it for the u building of this city?

And yet the person asking the question, although no benker or capitalist, might have the same query put to him

And what his raply would be is no hard matter to guess, for it would be that it was the duty of those who had so much money to put it where it should benefit the community, and not for the moderately well-to-do citizen to put his money into enterprises, while the rich men held their money back.

But this matter is really a personal

The importance of this strong word of approval, at home and abroad, is too lightly appreciated. It is a power for the promotion and success of local enterprises, and without it the best local en erprises can go by default.

Both the citizen who builds, and the citizen who contributes of his optimism, are builders of communities;

The success of one is made securely so, by the other. It is the combination of the goods of one citizen, endorsed and advertised by another, which makes an immediate market for them, and it is this combination, backed up by the citizen who glories in seeing the building, and proclaims publicly. electrely and heartily, his endorsement of the work, which assures the develo ment and permanence of a community.
