### EXCITING SCENES.

#### The Impeachment Resolution Introduced in the House.

#### Connor Introduces His Substitute. Allen Supports Impeachment. Stubbs Opposes and is Loudly Applauded. Interest is Very Great.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 14.—All the interest at the Capitol today centered in the proceedings of the House. A resolution was introduced directing the Attorney General to proceed against W. H. Worth, Ex-State Treasurer, for \$800, which he paid Shell Fish Commissioner White upon a mandamus by the Supreme Court after an act had been passed designed expressly to head off the Supreme Court in this matter.

It is this case which brought about the movement for the impeachment of Judges Furches and Douglas.

Connor, Democrat, one of the members of the Judiciary Committee, sent forward the minority report.

He said that there was nothing in the evidence or in the law relating thereto which justified any resolution either of impeachment or censure and recommending that no action be taken in the whole matter.

Connor, Democrat, one of the sub-committee of five of the Judiciary Committee, offered a substitute for the resolution of the committee. The substitute simply said that the Supreme court assumed authority or power not conferred by the constitution and laws of North Carolina but which were in derogation thereof.

Allen of Wayne, Chairman of the Judiciary committee, offered the following for the majority:

"That said Judges David M. Furches, formerly Assistant Justice, and Robert M. Douglas, Associate Justice, of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, be impeached for high crimes and misdemeanors of office."

Several hours of speaking followed the introduction of the resolution. Allen led in the support of his resolution. Stubbs of Martin, Democrat, spoke for an hour against impeaching and was loudly applauded by the people who crowded the lobby and the galleries.

Douglas of Granville, Democrat spoke in favor of impeachment.

### A RALEIGH FIRE.

#### Destruction Of Hoistery Mill Deficient Water Supply.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 14.—At 12:30 o'clock this morning the Willardville hoistery mill here was burned, together with a lot of lumber and a car belonging to the Seaboard Air-Line. The value of the mill plant and stock therein was about \$20,000, on which there is about \$18,000 insurance. In ten days the plant would have been installed in a new building.

Over 100 persons are thrown out of employment. The fire alarm failed to work and the water supply was unsatisfactory. The latter was the case almost a year ago, at the tobacco warehouse fire and another inquiry may result.

#### DULL IN THE SENATE.

#### But Some Fire Resulted Over the Bill to Employ Counsel.

RALEIGH, Feb. 14.—The proceedings in the Senate were uninteresting today, save for a heated and purely political discussion of the House bill allowing the Governor to employ counsel to aid the Attorney General in defending the Democratic election officers of last year indicted in the Federal Courts.

The bill passed the Senate, the Republicans and Populists voting no.

#### Volunteers Given Preference.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 14.—Senator Kyle has had an important conference with the President in reference to the policy of the Administration in making appointments under the Reorganization bill recently passed by Congress. The President's programme in regard to army appointments is that no apportionment will be observed with regard to States, sections or population. The President said that preference would be given in making these appointments to volunteers who are now serving in the Philippines, who want commissions, and who are qualified otherwise for the duties of lieutenant.

#### Troops At The Inauguration.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 14.—Lieutenant General Miles has completed arrangements for the participation of United States troops in the inaugural parade, and the necessary orders were issued today. All the available regulars in this vicinity, number 1000, will be in line. It is also proposed to have one battalion of Porto Rican native troops in the parade, provided it can be done without great expense. The cadets at West Point and Annapolis also will be here.

#### THE ELECTORAL VOTE.

#### The Ceremony of Counting It Officially Took Place At Washington.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—The ceremony of counting the electoral vote for President and Vice-President cast last fall took place in the House of Representatives today at a joint session of the Senate and House. The method of counting the vote is prescribed in great detail by the statute, and was followed literally today. Great crowds filled the galleries.

The regular rules of the House were suspended and two rows on the right were vacated for the Senators.

At one minute to one the members of the Senate were announced the members of the House rose to meet them while the page boys carrying the casket, in which the electoral returns were deposited took them to the clerk's desk.

Senator Frye, president pro tem, ascended the rostrum and took his seat beside Speaker Henderson, to preside over the joint session.

When Maryland's eight votes were announced for McKinley and Roosevelt there was a slight applause. Another ripple of applause followed the announcement of Nebraska's vote.

Senator Chandler announced the total number of votes as 447, of which William McKinley, of Ohio, received 287, William Jennings Bryan, 193, and of which Theodore Roosevelt received 999 and Adlai Stevenson 185 for Vice President.

Thereupon Senator Frye proclaimed the state of the vote as delivered to him.

### ONLY FUN.

#### There was no Reason For the Lynching Scare at Asheville.

#### Result of Compulsory Vaccination. Seaboard Officers May Move. Dispensary For Tarboro.

RALEIGH, February 14.—Senator Guder of Buncombe, speaking today about the threatened lynching of four men at Asheville, said: "There really was never anything serious about it, but the sheriff thought it serious. A lot of boys attempted to worry the sheriff."

Secretary Richard H. Lewis of the State Board of Health says compulsory vaccination in Caswell county has practically stamped out the small pox epidemic there, and that compulsory vaccination has been ordered in the section of Greene county in which there is an outbreak.

It was expected that this month the officers here of the Seaboard Air-Line would remove to Hamlet, but advices are that the movement is postponed.

The new arrangement for awarding the public printing, that is by a special board, appears to give general satisfaction. The legislature was anxious to be rid of the responsibility.

The committee reports favorably a bill giving Tarboro a dispensary. There is a great movement for a dispensary at Charlotte.

Representative Willard has introduced a bill making the tax on life insurance companies 2 1/2 instead of 2 per cent.

Thus far 300 acts and resolutions of the legislature have been ratified. Three-fourths of the business which the legislature take up could readily be done by the county clerks and the secretary of state; but the legislatures go on in the same old way, learning nothing by experience.

There are forty-two committees in the house. The committee work is much harder than that at the regular sittings of the legislature.
