### SEVEN HOURS TALK.

House Spends Its Session On Impeachment Matter.

Large Number of Spectators. All Legislation Gives Way to Impeachment Attraction. Connor's Substitute. Has Supporters.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 15.—The attendance in the lower House today at the impeachment proceedings was again very large. Ladies were present in great numbers. The debate on the resolutions regarding the impeachment of Judges Furches and Douglas occupied seven hours time in the House today.

Rountree of New Hanover, and Winston of Bertie, made strong speeches in support of the impeachment.

Hoey, of Cleveland, Zuehary of Transylvania, Smith of Gates and Hayes of Chatham, also argued along the same line, while Duis, of Mecklenburg ably opposed the impeachment, and supported Judge Connor's substitute for the impeachment resolution, the substitute being merely a condemnation for the Judges action.

McLean, of Scotland, Sims of Wake Richardson of Johnson, also favored Connor's resolution.

Duis, in the course of his speech said he was violating no secret when he stated that the sub-committee's report, on which the impeachment resolution is based, was not adopted by the judiciary committee.

The debate will be resumed tomorrow at ten o'clock, and Allen, of Wayne, chairman of the judiciary committee announces that a vote is expected by one o'clock.

It is regarded as practically certain that the House will adopt the resolution.

### MULES IN DEMAND.

Wanted in the Cotton Sections. Signs of a Big Crop Planted.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 14.—If the demand for cotton mules may be taken as indicative of the amount of cotton to be planted in the Southern States during the current year, the acreage will be the largest on record.

The leading sale stables of the city report the largest January business that they have ever experienced in their history, the sales for the latter days of the month reaching the record breaking total of nearly 1,000 head per day, and it is a notable fact that nearly the entire volume of business has been in cotton mules for use on the farms and plantations.

The dealers, in fact, complain of a marked dullness in the big mules for logging, levee and draying purposes, as well as the small mules for the mining pits of this section of the country, while the demand for the distinctly cotton mule is very large, showing, as it does, after the active trade of the month just past, no sign of let up.

Large buyers from Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Arkansas, Tennessee Louisiana and the two Carolinas have been on the market and have taken back to the heart of the cotton belt the choicest lots of cotton mules ever handled on this market.

### THE DIVORCE BILL.

Occupied the Senate's Attention. Bills Introduced.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 15.—The divorce bill occupied most of the day in the Senate, but did not attract any crowd, as impeachment contest caught the crowd.

Henderson, Ex-Congressman, said more divorces are granted annually in North Carolina, than in Great Britain and Ireland. No vote on the bill was reached.

### RALEIGH.

Liquor Question a Great Issue. Aspirants For Superintendency of Penitentiary.

RALEIGH, February 15.—The opinion appears to prevail that Tarboro will be given the dispensary it appears to desire. One of the notable hearings before the legislative committee will be that as to the continuance of the Fayetteville dispensary. The liquor question cuts much of a figure at this session of the legislature. Some entire counties, as for example Duplin and Sampson, want prohibition and are apt to get it.

Y. E. McBee, general manager of the Seaboard Air Line was here today. He speaks with great pride of the rapid development of the system and the great future before it.

W. H. Day retires as penitentiary superintendent March 5th. A bill will be introduced by Senator Travis abolishing that office but retaining the office of manager, with an increased salary.

Travis, Arentall, Laughinghouse of Pitt, Mann of Hyde and J. C. Parker, are aspirants for the place.

The bill as to private corporations, which will remove the mass of work as to charters from the Legislature to the Secretary of State, is warmly commended. Almost a fourth of the entire time of legislatures has been consumed by this petty business.

G. F. Lamb of Wilson today filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy in the Federal Court here.

The audience at "Robin Hood," as presented at the Academy of Music this evening by the Bostonians was a record breaker.

### Milk wouldn't run it.

CORTEL, N. Y., Feb. 14.—The Erie & Cent of New York Railway, extending from Cortland to Glendonston, has a water tank at Glendonston which is supplied with water by a pump in a creamery adjoining.

An employe made a wrong connection yesterday and filled the tank with sour milk from a vat. The milk was taken aboard by an engine which started for Cortland.

The engineer could not keep up steam, as the sour milk would not feed into the boiler, and an inspection showed that the connecting pipes were filled with hard from milk. There was barely enough steam to get the engine to Cortland, where it required a great deal of work to clear the pipes.

RODMOND, Va., February 15.—The Southern Manufacturing Company of this city has just shipped over the Seaboard Air Line a train of one hundred and five (105) solid car loads of "Good Luck" Baking Powder, containing three million, eighteen thousand, one hundred and fifty-five (3,018,155) pounds of this product, as shown by the railway records and bills-of-lading.

### To Form Another Province.

DARAGUAN PROVINCE OF PANAMA, LUZON, Feb. 14.—The Philippine Commission arrived here this afternoon and will organize a provincial government tomorrow.

The Commissioners were received by a crowd of people and bands of music and were conducted to the army headquarters. Welcoming speeches were delivered on the way through Pangasinan.

General MacArthur has notified the commission that the province of Tpyabas is sufficiently pacified for provincial government, also that the pacification of the other southern provinces, Bantagas Laguna de Bay and Cavite, will be hastened if provincial government is begun. The commission will organize Tapyabas on its way south.

### Need 33,000 Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—According to the present plans of the War Department the army is to be recruited to its full authorized strength of 100,000 men. The regular army now consists of about 67,000 men, including the troops in the Philippines, so that the new enlistments are limited to about 33,000 men.

It is realized by the officials that it will take a long time to secure so many men, but the full machinery of the army is being started in that direction with gratifying results. Over 400 recruits were obtained last week, and it is expected that much better progress will be made when all the recruiting agencies are in full operation.
