HOUSE MANAGERS.

Named to Conduct the Impeachment Trial in the Senate.

Also Committee to Present Impeachment at Bar of Senate Today. Announced in Senate. Questions Involved in Case.

RALEIGH, Feb. 19.—In the House of Representatives today, nine managers of the impeachment of Judges Furches and Douglas before the Senate were elected as follows:

Allen, of Wayne; Craig, of Buncombe; Graham, of Granville; Hayes, of Chatham; Spainhour, of Burke; Rountree, of New Hanover; Nicholson, of Beaufort; Shannonsburg, of Mecklenburg; and Sewell, of Moore.

Each of these received 67 votes, only the Democratic members voting. The managers of impeachment are given the power to conduct the impeachment, employ counsel and send for persons and papers.

Speaker Moore appointed the following committee to present impeachment resolutions at the bar of the Senate tomorrow: Winston, Andrew, Blount, Zschay and Carlton.

The President of the Senate, W. D. Turner, announced in the Senate that articles of impeachment would be presented at noon tomorrow.

At 10 o'clock, President of the Senate, said this morning that he could find nothing in the constitution about suspending the judges. He says they will not be suspended until the court of impeachment (the Senate) is duly organized.

Then notice to them will be signed by him as the presiding officer and served by the sergeant at arms. The Senate as a court will fix the day when the judges can come before it and make answer.

Then they are suspended until the case is disposed of. They have 10 days time for preparation. In the impeachment trial of Gov. Holden, as soon as the court organized and was sworn in Lt. Gov. Ed. Well went down and took the oath to the Governor.

Naval Apprentices Run Away.

Newport, R. I., Feb. 19.—Ten of the new apprentice boys who recently reached the training station from the West, ran away today. Near the hospital they found some ice that stretched from the island to the shore and crossed on it.

Mrs. Adams was 80 years old and was wrapped up in her cats, to the annoyance of which neighbors were always adding, but she welcomed them all. They were so well fed that deaths from good living were frequent. Special favorites had their resting places marked by tombstones.

Transvaal Stole Secret Papers.

Hotels Feb. 18.—Dr. Leyds, the Transvaal diplomatic agent, has returned here from The Hague. His baggage was placed for a moment in the vestibule of his residence and shortly afterward it was ascertained that there had entered the house by false keys and stolen a valise containing diplomatic papers.

Teeth Leaves for Manila.

Newport News, Va., Feb. 17.—A train of eighteen cars carrying the First Division of the United States Infantry has left here over the Chesapeake & Ohio for San Francisco, where the troops will board a transport for the Philippines. This detachment of the Tenth has been stationed at Santiago for two years.

THE IMPEACHMENT COUNSEL.

Guthrie to Conduct. Volunteers For Defense. Aspirants to Succession. Special to Journal.

RALEIGH, February 19.—It is learned that William A. Guthrie of Durham is to be chief counsel for the impeachment of Judges Furches and Douglas. Judge Douglas said today that at least 25 lawyers had volunteered their services for the defense, and that it would be a day or two before selections were made from these.

There is all sorts of talk about what the Senate will do. One man will say that the Senate will surely convict, that it ought to. Another, that now the matter is started it simply can't stop; that to stop it would be child's play. Yet another, that the Senate is sure not to convict.

People are thus early beginning to talk about aspirants for the chief justiceship. Three are chiefly named in this connection; one who has filled the position, another who is on the bench, a third who is a legislator.

The St. Louis Exposition.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The bill to authorize the holding of the international exposition in celebration of the centennial anniversary of the Louisiana Purchase, at St. Louis, in 1903, and appropriating \$3,000,000 therefor, was passed in the House today, under suspension of the rules by the vote of 191 to 41. The opposition was hopelessly in the minority and the struggle over the bill was brief.

RALEIGH, N. C., Feb. 19.—If this legislature will make a \$25,000 appropriation and if then two years hence will supplement this, North Carolina can through the agricultural department, make a notably fine exhibit at the St. Louis exposition. It will do nothing else at the Exposition or Charleston exposition.

The Fayetteville dispensary is talked of as a good deal among the legislature. A gentleman from that place said today that it is claimed that the dispensary advocates objected to the holding of a primary to settle the question as to whether the dispensary should remain or be abolished because they feared a combination of republicans and populists with the anti-dispensary forces.

FOR MORE PENSIONS.

Tax Rate to be Raised to Five Cents on Hundred Dollars. Special to Journal.

RALEIGH, February 19.—The legislative joint committee on pensions met today and decided to let the present \$10,000 appropriation to the Soldiers Home stand without increase.

Chairman Reinhardt of the committee was interviewed and said: "So far only 80 pension bills have been introduced. We will put all these names on one bill next week. We want to get a rate of 5c on the \$100 for pension tax. It is 4 cents in the new revenue bill. It is claimed that 4c. will raise \$2,000,000. Auditor Dixon says it will not raise over \$150,000. It is not enough then, and we must fix it at 7c. and raise \$2,800,000 at least. The pension bill we have prepared is the best the State has ever had. It enlarges the power of the county boards giving them power to examine pension applicants, and to put on the rolls all those who need pensions, no matter whether they were wounded in the war. Then to the boards can purge their lists, as there are a number of those who have no business there. A number of them have property. We want to get the pensions increased to \$72 for 1st class, \$50 for 2d, \$48 for 3rd, and \$30 for 4th class and widows."

Auditor Dixon was then interviewed and said he felt sure the 4c. tax would not raise over \$150,000, while at least \$2,000,000 was needed. He said he felt sure that with the increased power and scope given the county boards the number of pensions would be increased to \$10,000. There are now something over 6000, and \$119,000 was last year paid to them.

MRS. NATION IN JAIL.

Judge's Scathing Address. Bellows Mrs. Nation is Insane.

Topeka, Kas., Feb. 18.—Mrs. Nation is now in the county jail as a result of her trial on a peace warrant left by Judge Hasen today. The warrant was sworn to by the Missouri Cold Storage Company whose plant Mrs. Nation entered yesterday morning.

Mrs. Nation acted as her own attorney in the trial. Judge Hasen placed her under \$250 bond to keep the peace and ordered her to appear before him at the next term of court.

Mrs. Nation refused to give the bond, and said she would go to jail. She is now detained in the hospital room of the county jail, where she will probably remain for some time.

In the City Court arguments were given in the case brought against Mrs. Nation by the proprietors of the wrecked "Sunset" saloon. Judge McCole said he would take the matter under advisement until Thursday morning. Mrs. Nation declares that she will resume her smacking immediately upon her release. Judge Hasen will make her release conditional upon the promise that she be sent to her home at Medicine Lodge.

Judge Hasen tonight placed Cal McDonald, Mrs. Ross Crisp, and Miss Medicine Fordward under peace bonds. McDonald's bond is \$1,000, the others are \$750 each.

The judge delivered a scathing address to the three fellow Messengers. He expressed the opinion that Mrs. Nation is insane, and said that those persons who encourage her methods of reform ought to be ashamed of themselves.

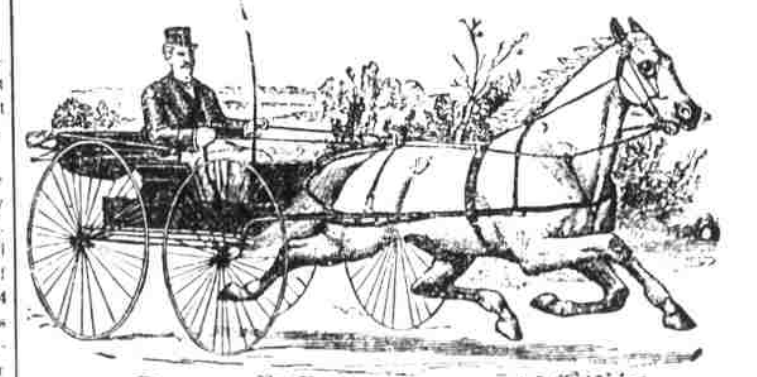
