BILL TO FIX RATES.

Flat at Three Cents a Mile. Predicted Will Not Pass.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, February 20.—The house committee on railroads last evening considered the bill to abolish first and second class rates on railroads and establish a flat rate of 3 cents per mile. This is desired by railroads. The committee decided to report it without prejudice.

It is predicted now that this bill which fixes a uniform rate of passenger fares at 3 cents per mile, doing away with the present rates of 3 1/2 first class and 2 1/2 second class will not pass.

Amendment to Pension Bill.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 20.—Senator London today introduced an amendment to the pension bill providing that if the tax of 4c on property and 13c on the poll did not raise \$300,000 for pensions then the amount necessary to reach that sum should be directly appropriated.

RALEIGH.

Dr. Kirby's Funeral Will be at Goldsboro. Wood Working at High Point. Bills in Legislature.

RALEIGH, February 20.—Profound regret and sympathy are expressed here at the death of Dr. George L. Kirby, for 9 years he superintendent of the insane asylum here. His management of that institution was in all respects the ablest during its history. His funeral will be at Goldsboro, and an escort of State officers, Confederate Veterans and physicians will accompany the remains there.

Dr. Kirby died from pneumonia and was 66 years of age. He was born in Duplin county, this state. He graduated at Philadelphia and took a special course in medicine in Paris, France. He was surgeon of a North Carolina regiment in the confederate service, then practiced medicine at Goldsboro until 1892, when he took charge of the hospital here.

There are now 35 wood working factories at High Point. It is the centre of the furniture industries in the South. Most of the wood comes from near Lenoir and Asheville, but large contracts for oak have this week been made in Arkansas.

The sale of fertilizer tax tags by the agricultural department is reported to be normal. It is the general belief that sales will be very heavy this season.

The corporation commission calls for a statement by banks up to the close of business February 20.

The joint subcommittee on judicial districts, composed of Justice, Woodard, Morrison, Allen, Spaulding and Shannahan has held its first meeting and simply organized and mapped out a system of work. Its session will be private.

Mr. Stubbs' bill to amend the constitution so as to appropriate the taxes of education to the education of its own color was reported without prejudice and will not pass.

Hearing on Labor Bill.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 20.—This afternoon there was another hearing by committee of the whole to regulate hours of labor and children's employment in factories. A number of mill owners were present. It was the second hearing.

Salvage on the Maine.

WASHINGTON, February 19.—The salvage on the Maine is expected to be enormous. In its hold, according to the Government schedule, there are now \$500,000 worth of ammunition and 100 tons of copper and brass. A hundred engines are stored away in the bulk of the vessel while the armament and fittings are figured to be worth considerable money even if the vessel cannot be repaired.

But this is a contingency not anticipated by the contractors. The explosion on the Maine was amidships and in the bow, and only in that part of the vessel was it wrecked. The construction of a bulkhead will, the contractors believe, shut off the bow and the warship will float.

Filipinos Attend McArthur's Ball.

MANILA, February 19.—General MacArthur's reception at Malacanang exceeded anything in the Spanish regime. The place was beautifully decorated and brilliantly illuminated. The Filipino population was well represented. General Barry was master of ceremonies. General MacArthur and the ladies of the United States commission received the guests. The reception lasted until 11 o'clock. There was dancing afterwards. The affair was thoroughly enjoyable and the Filipinos were especially pleased at being accorded a privilege never before afforded them. General MacArthur's tact and courtesy were greatly appreciated.

MAY PAY THE SENATE.

Legislature Said to Have the Power to Make Appropriation as a Court.

RALEIGH, February 20.—The matter is as yet unsettled as to whether there shall or shall not be an extra session of the legislature. A very able lawyer says that the legislature can make an appropriation for the pay of the Senate as a high court of impeachment, so that after the regular session ends, March 9, the Senate can continue to sit as such a court if it has not by that date concluded the trial of judges Furches and Diggins.

The accused judges did not sit on the bench yesterday or today, nor will they do so until the case is decided. It is currently reported that ex-Attorney General Frank L. Osborne will be the chief counsel for the impeached judges.

OLD DAN'S LAST FIRE.

The Faithful Horse Pulled Steamer to Blaze, Then Dropped Dead.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 19.—Old Dan, for 18 years a faithful fire horse and the pride of Engine Company No. 18, went to his last fire yesterday. The firemen were making a dash to a blaze that had broken out in a clothing store on Vine street. Old Dan and his mate, Jim, pulled the big engine faster than ever it seemed, and their destination had been nearly reached, when driver Harry Escher noticed that Dan was staggering.

Jim, however, only worked the harder and as the clang of bells increased as other fire companies approached, Old Dan sprang forward with renewed vigor and dashed on swifter and swifter.

Finally the scene of the fire was reached, and Old Dan, panting and trembling, fell to the pavement—dead. Firemen and policemen bent over the old, brave animal, but the heart beats had stopped. A blanket was thrown over Dan and the firemen of his company, who had known and loved the old fellow so long, brushed their tears away and dashed in to the store to fight the flames.

GOT THEIR IRISH UP.

Members from the Emerald Isle Want to Speak in Native Language. LONDON, Feb. 19.—Mr. Thomas O'Donnell, Nationalist member for West Kerry, today began to address the House in the Irish language and the Speaker called him to order, reminding him that in the history of the House of Commons there was no precedent for a member to speak in anything but the English language.

Mr. O'Donnell continued to speak in the Irish language, greatly to the delight of the Nationalists around him. The Speaker severely requested him to desist. Mr. O'Donnell refused to speak in English and asserted his right, as the representative of an Irish constituency, and a member of a nation still possessing a language of its own, to address the House in his native language. At this point the Speaker stopped him person-orly.

Several other Irish members denounced the limitation to English imposed by the Speaker.

MURDER IN KANSAS.

Attack on a Joint Results in Killing Bartender's Wife.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Feb. 10.—Mrs. Rose Hudson, wife of John Hudson a "joint" keeper at Milwood fourteen miles north of this city, was shot and instantly killed last night during a raid upon her husband's saloon. One of the raiders was slightly wounded.

Hudson had been warned to close his place but refused. About 10 o'clock three men entered and called for drinks. When served they rapped on the counter, evidently to give a signal. Hudson jumped from behind the bar and grappled with one of the men. In the scuffle, a shot-gun, which one of the men carried, was discharged.

The contents entered the wall. Mrs. Hudson attracted by the noise, ran screaming into the room while a mob of men, most of whom were masked, entered in answer to the signal.

In the melee that followed another charge was fired from the shot-gun. It struck Mrs. Hudson tearing off the top of her head. William Webb, one of the raiders, was struck in the shoulder by a revolver bullet. Nearly a hundred shots were fired. Hudson carried his dying wife into an adjoining room, and the mob retired without wrecking the "joint."

Sheriff Everhardt, who went to Milwood, has secured four prisoners, two of whom are John and Henry Wilson young farmers. There were no women in the mob, which was composed of farmers in disguise. There is much excitement today and further trouble is anticipated.

No Cigarettes in Tennessee.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 19.—In a few days the cigarette will be a thing of the past in Tennessee. Some three years ago the General Assembly passed an anti-cigarette bill, but this was attacked by the American Tobacco Co., controlling the sale. It spent several thousand dollars in a fight as to the constitutionality of the act, alleging it was in direct violation of the interstate commerce laws, but the Tennessee act was sustained after a period.

A second fight was waged by the combine, its representatives having discovered an irregularity in passing the law through the Legislature, and on their showing it was declared illegal by a Knoxville court. The United States Supreme Court having passed upon the general legality of the act, the General Assembly decided to re-enact the old law. The bill went through the Legislature the other day. The combine yesterday wired its representatives to resign all goods on hand to the factory or to other States. The law will be rigorously enforced.
