BEFORE THE SENATE.

Articles of Impeachment Adopted by the House Yesterday.

Managers Present the Articles to the Senate. Organize as Court Monday. The Judges Will ask for Time.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, February 23.—Articles of impeachment were presented by the board of managers to the House today at noon. The House went into a committee of the whole to consider the articles. All five sections were adopted by a vote of 50 to 22.

The House then voted upon the articles and adopted them by a vote of 56 to 33.

The House, proceeded by the board of managers went to the Senate Chamber when the articles of impeachment were read.

The Senate decided to organize Monday at noon as a High Court of Impeachment and be sworn in.

The Judges will be immediately notified and will appear before the Senate with their counsel and ask for time to prepare their defense.

The managers of the impeachment and their lawyers have done a great deal of work on the preparation of the articles of impeachment, notably a bill of indictment against the judges. It was thought the articles would be presented earlier than there were, but the progress made was not what was expected.

He gives ill health as necessitating his withdrawal from the bench.

For Collecting Revenue.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, February 23.—The revenue bill is reported. Most of the objectionable features are stricken out. There yet remain a few. One of them is the manner of collecting taxes on corporation loans. No doubt this will be modified.

Church Parlor Boxing.

Hoboken, N. J. Feb. 23.—The parlors of the West Hoboken First Baptist Church will shortly present a most unusual appearance.

Rev. R. H. Rollins the pastor, believes in healthy athletic sports, and in order that they may be encouraged and the young men kept in touch with the church he has organized an athletic and literary association and boxing bouts may be held in the church parlors.

The novel idea has struck a popular note with the young men of the church. The club is not exclusive. Young women may join if they wish to learn how to handle the "mittens."

Volunteers Coming Back.

Washington, D. C. Feb. 23.—Colonel Miller, quartermaster at Manila, has ordered the War Department that the transport Thomas will leave Manila March 15 with the Twenty-eighth and Thirty-fifth Regiments of volunteers and that the Grant will sail March 27 with the Twenty-ninth and Thirty-second Regiments. There will then remain about 15 regiments to be provided for, and the officials of the War Department anticipate no difficulty in transporting them to the United States by June 30.

Fast Railroad Time.

CLEVELAND, O. Feb. 21. Erie train No. 8, from New York to Chicago, yesterday made a record run, weather conditions considered, that is remarkable. The train left Salamanca, N. Y., one hour and sixteen minutes late, and got into Chicago on time. The train made the run between New York, O., and Huntington, Ind., a distance of 137 miles, in 127 minutes. This time, including five stops, was of eight minutes duration.

AUGUST ELECTIONS.

Necessity Has Passed and There Will be no More.

State Guard to Meet at Wrightsville. Governor and Staff Will go to Buffalo Expedition, Railroad Char-

ters. RALEIGH, February 23.—The sub-committee on election law has completed the draft of a bill for a new law. The August election is done away with. Last August State Chairman Simmons told your correspondent that there would be no more August elections. Of course the election last August was held in that month so as to entirely separate it from the national election, so there could be no federal interference with the constitutional amendment vote at the polls. The necessity for such elections has ended, of course.

The first real snow storm of the winter began this morning. The ground was very dry and ready to hold it.

It is quite probable that the State Guard will go into camp this year at Wrightsville, if the property on which the encampments from 1883 to 1891 inclusive were held can be secured. The Congressional district arrangement is a great puzzle. The caucus has settled that there shall be 10 districts, but now the task comes of so arranging as to make all certainly Democratic.

W. E. Gary was today appointed assistant quartermaster general of the State Guard.

It is now regarded as reasonably sure that the State will build a new arsenal and hall of records. A bill to that end was favorably reported today.

The Southport, Wilmington and Durham railway company is the one which has invested \$30,000 in terminal property at Southport. It will connect with the Norfolk and Western at Durham and give the latter road an outlet South, which it greatly desires.

The State charts the Burlington furniture company, capital \$18,000, with leave to increase to \$30,000.

Gov. Aycock will not attend the presidential inauguration. He and staff will go to the exposition at Buffalo.

New School Law Completed.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 23.—The sub-committee of the educational committee of the legislature today completed the new school law. There will certainly be four months schools all over the State.

Rev. W. G. Clements, the superintendent of public schools in this county says it can have 5 months schools. The trouble he finds is that parents insist on taking their children from the schools, to work. He declares strongly in favor of compulsory education, and says that while he sees no immediate hope of it yet it will be ordered sooner or later, as a necessity.

Tea in South Carolina.

CHARLESTON, S. C. Feb. 22.—The American Tea Co., chartered under the laws of South Carolina, has purchased 6,000 acres of land near this city, and the planting of the first year's crop of tea will begin this week. It is expected that next season 800,000 pounds of tea will be raised for the American market. The company is negotiating for other property.

Timber Sale Near Duluth.

DULUTH, MINN. Feb. 23.—Wisconsin lumbermen from Wausau and a Chicago firm are buying a tract of 300,000,000 feet of pine timber near this city at \$111,000. This is \$3.50 per 1,000 feet, and is the highest price ever paid, especially as the sale covers everything down to and including No. 4 stock. Lumber from such a purchase will have to bring \$20 for No. 2 and better to give any adequate return.

Reported Favorably but Will be Opposed. Bill to Regulate Labor Hours.

Special to Journal. RALEIGH, Feb. 23.—The bill for a reformatory for young criminals was today reported favorably. Great pressure will be brought to bear to secure the passage of the bill. Many legislators however, express opposition to it, this opposition being mainly from the east. There will be argument Tuesday in the very important bill to regulate hours of labor and the employment of children in textile mills. The agreement by the bill owners will then be presented.
