The question is often asked rich men why they continue to work, when they have accumulated enough wealth to more than last them during their life time.

It is this early training, this placing youth in a line of application, he in study, manual labor or work of any character, that is the true impetus which makes men and women of reputation and character in all walks of H'e.

Application need not be made irksome to the young, but it can be made systematic, until the young cease to recognize the fact that their work is really a routine, since variations can be given which shall relieve the monotony.

The love of work is reached when the person finds an occupation that suits the trend of his or her mind, then what sp pears to an outsider work or labor, is to the person engaged, a pleasurable occupation.

It is enjoyment for the vigorous man to continue at his work, even after forty or fifty years, and even if he has acquired a full competence in this world's goods. He may be entitled to a rest, but there is no demand that he shall retire, and

Another mistaken idea is that vigorous old men block the trades and progressions against young men entering them. Let the young man present himself who has the equipment to thoroughly fill the place, and he will find hearty and asiistance from these very old fellows, who are supposed to be obstacles in the path of youth's progress. Never have there been so many profitable fields for young men and women as there are today, and never has there been such requirements demanded that those seeking occupations shall be thoroughly equipped for every position sought.

A Dead Face In the Window.

Crockford, the proprietor of a well known London gambling house, was made to play a queer role after he was dead. When one of Crockford's horses was poisoned just before the Derby, the misfortune brought on an attack of apoplexy, which proved fatal within 48 hours. Now, many of Crockfords thiends had staked large sums on mapping of the gambler's horses, interest a favorite for the Oaks and which was disqualified by the death of the owner. Only the people in the gambling house knew of Crockford's death, and it was resolved to keep it a secret until after the race.

The servants were bribed and sworn to secrecy, and the conspirators on the day after the night upon which Crockford died had the body placed in a chair at a window, so that people returning from the track could see the gambler sitting there. He was fixed up to look as lifelike as possible and through the window and partially concealed from view by the curtains look ed so natural that no one of the great crowd which came cheering by the house when on their return from sceing Crockford's horse win the Oak suspected the trick.
