Joseph Kinsey handed in his resignation as Sheriff of Craven county yesterday to the County Commissioners and it was accepted.

The Commissioners proceeded to the election of a successor and three names were put in nomination, M. W. Garmon, J. W. Lane and J. W. Biddle. On the first ballot Garmon received 2 votes, Lane 1, and Biddle 2. The name of J. W. Lane was then withdrawn and on the second ballot Carman received 2 and Biddle 3. J. W. Biddle was thereupon declared elected Sheriff. Mr. Biddle is assistant cashier of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of New Bern and stands very high in the community. The Commissioners elected J. W. Weeks bridge keeper of Trent river bridge.

The Sum of \$6,000 Secured to the Masonic Opera House.

The Oldest Railway Employee in the South.

There passed away at 9 o'clock yesterday morning in Wilmington the most notable man in his calling and walk of life, in the State.—It was James Knight, known far and near as Jimmy Knight who was the oldest railway employee in the South, if not in the country.

Mr. Knight ran an engine on the Raleigh and Gaston road in 1835, and had for more than sixty years been constantly employed in railway service.

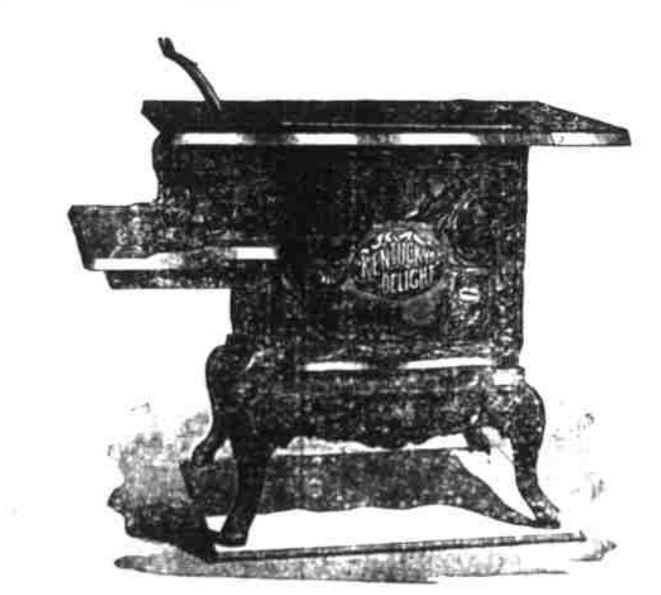
