**\$4,000 DEFAULTER.**

W. H. Martin Clerk in State Treasurer's Office The Man.

Causes Sensation in Raleigh. Money Secured by Raising Penitentiary Warrants. Thought Martin Contemplates Suicide. Is Under Large Surety Bond.

RALEIGH, March 14.—A sensation was created in the Legislature, and also throughout this city, this afternoon, by Governor Aycock's announcement that William H. Martin, who for four years, up to March first, last, was clerk in the State Treasurer's office, had defaulted for at least \$4,000 and had confessed his theft.

The money was stolen from the Penitentiary fund by raising warrants.

The crime had been going on at least a year.

Martin was arrested immediately, and is in jail in default of a \$4,000 bond.

Martin during the Civil war was Major in a New York regiment. He was for sixteen years chief clerk in the Revenue office here. His age is about sixty years.

It is believed that Martin contemplates suicide, as he says he will never go to the penitentiary.

He is under bond in a Surety Company for \$20,000.

### FRAUDULENT USE OF MAIL.

Important Arrests in North Carolina Many Victims.

WILMINGTON, N. C., March 13.—Post-office Inspector Jere Connolly arrived here this afternoon from Laurensburg, N. C., a small town on the Seaboard Air Line, 63 miles from Wilmington, where he caused the arrest of H. T. Allen, alias Dr. Allen and M. Allen, a middle-aged man employed as a printer on the local newspaper. The charge against him is fraudulent use of the mails in that he advertised extensively the sale of certain recipes and offered as a prize with each order five small bills to the amount of \$15, which he said were printed on genuine "B. N." paper and could not be told from the genuine article.

The bills in reality were Confederate notes and Allen numbered his victims from Maine to Mexico, several orders having been received from New York State. He was given a preliminary examination and committed to jail for the United States District Court in default of bond in the sum of \$500.

**LOSS TO AGUINALDO.**

Six Members of His Cabinet Captured by Major Taggart.

MANILA, March 13.—Major Elmore F. Taggart, of the Twenty-eighth Infantry has captured, about 25 miles south of Cagayan, the following members of the revolutionary Cabinet:

This capture is considered extremely important.

More than 20,000 Hlocans took the oath of allegiance to the United States last week.

News has been received here to the effect that Paymaster Pickett, with \$73,000 in gold, and an escort of ten mounted men from Company D, Sixteenth Infantry, was attacked recently by a party of 30 Filipinos on the road between Bayombong and Echague, in the Province of Nueva Vizcaya. A hard fight ensued, and the Filipinos were routed. The money was saved. Corporal Hooker was killed and a private was wounded.

The Philippine Commissioners left Luzon this morning and rode seven miles through coconut groves to Taybas. They were escorted by a hundred natives and a detachment of the First Cavalry. Tomorrow the Commissioners will go to Mariquitog Island, and thence to Bombon Island on Saturday. They will organize seven of the smaller adjacent islands into a new province, after which civil government will be established on the island of Masbate. The commission will arrive at Iloilo, Panay Island March 30.

### TERMS FOR THE BOERS.

British Cabinet Formulates Instructions For Kitchener.

LONDON, March 13.—The British Cabinet at a meeting today considered the negotiations proceeding between Generals Kitchener and Botha and formulated instructions for General Kitchener which defined on broad lines the terms on which a peace settlement might be made.

A Pretoria dispatch says: "Pending the arrival of General De Wet a general armistice has been declared. General Botha has been in conference with Lord Kitchener and Sir Alfred Milner for several days, and all three desire to consult De Wet. De Wet is hurrying north through the Orange State in obedience to Botha's summons. On his arrival a conference will be held near Pretoria."

### CLEVELAND ON HARRISON.

NORFOLK, Va., March 12.—Fresh from a week of the sport he loves, Grover Cleveland arrived here today, ruddy health in his cheeks and on his lips kindly words for his once successful, once defeated opponent for the nation's highest office.

Alm at the first question of the former President after his return to civilization was concerning the condition of Benjamin Harrison. He appeared sincerely grieved at the information that he was not expected to live.

"He was a good man," he said. "A noble character, a patriot, the like of which we need. Mr. Harrison's presence and example will be missed. His party needs him."

### RALEIGH.

House Democrats Caucus Late And Secretly.

Members of Legislature Getting Away. Efforts Made to Prevent Departures. Graduating Exercises at Shaw University. The Farmers.

RALEIGH, March 14.—The House Democrats caucused last night after 1 o'clock A. M. present were pledged to absolute secrecy and not allowed to say a word to any outsider.

The speaker of the House last night determined to stop the departure of members and to keep a quorum here. He issued orders to the sergeant at arms to permit no member to leave Raleigh. Men were on duty at the railway station to prevent departures. The public business was in a critical state yesterday and today. Members are serving without pay. Up to yesterday afternoon all the Republican and Populist members save 3 had gone and so had 20 Democrats. All the Senators are here. They are on pay as a court of impeachment.

The appropriation for new building at the Western hospital for the insane is fixed at \$110,000 and for maintenance \$100,000. This will stand.

At Shaw University (colored) here the graduating exercises of the classes in medicine, law and pharmacy were held. Gov. Aycock made an address and presented the diplomas to the 17 graduates in medicine, 9 in law and 1 in medicine. The annual address was by Dr. Shaler Matthews of the University of Chicago. There are over 400 students at Shaw.

Last year there was a notably large falling off in the number of crop liens and mortgages. This year there is a still further decrease. This is a sure sign of prosperity among the farmers. The latter hold considerable cotton and are in easier circumstances generally than in 25 years past.


