NOT AND HEAVY.

Cook Strong for Defense. Busbee Logical for Prosecution.

Will Last Until Next Wednesday. No Similar Trial Ever Occurred in This Country. Will be no "Jury Charge."

RALPHIGH, March 22.—In the impeachment trial today Charles M. Cooke, one of the counsel for the Judges, spoke for the defense. It was the liveliest speech yet made in the progress of the trial. He raked the managers and counsel for impeachment fore and aft.

Cooke made a special onset against Judge Clark and also went for the firm of Simmons, Poul and Ward. He declared that the judges were not trying to dodge behind clerk Kennan but that they assumed all responsibility for their own acts. He ridiculed Major Guthrie of the prosecution counsel as being a Populist leader four years ago and now denouncing men he elected to office.

Charles M. Busbee spoke for the prosecution. He made the most cogent and logical argument yet made. It was strictly legal in all respects. Busbee said that if the action of the judges was endorsed the county and state treasurers would be open to writs of mandamus on any agreed case.

The current impression now seems to be that the impeachment trial can not end before next Wednesday night. The events of the day were that Guthrie concluded his speech for the prosecution. Cook spoke for the defense and C. M. Busbee for the prosecution. Tomorrow Patterson will speak for the defense and Poul for the prosecution. The speeches are expected to average three hours each.

Opinions still differ widely as to the result. Some observant people declare that the failure of the defence to cross-examine Judge Clark yesterday and to introduce any thing that had against him was a bad error and a distinct loss.

The trial is so unique that it is no wonder it attracts all the people the Senate chamber will contain. It is the first impeachment of judges in this State. It is the first time in the history of the United States that judges have been impeached for alleged violation of the constitution.

In these impeachment trials there is no "charge to the jury" and no rehearsal of evidence. As soon as the argument is ended the Senate takes the case. Of course this saves time.

Some sympathy is manifested for Colonel Harrison, as he is practically moneyless, having lost his position in the army and having no business connection since his Terre Haute street railway failure.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 21.—A second love romance has grown out of the siege at Pekin, the first being that of Miss Mary Condit Smith, a Washington society belle, and Lieutenant R. S. Hooker.

The heroine of the second romance is Miss Mary Condit Pierce, niece of Minister Conger, and the successful sailor is First Lieutenant Harold Hammond, of the Ninth Infantry, which was the first body of Uncle Sam's soldiers to reach the ill-fated city with relief.

The young couple met in the midst of war and disaster. The courage displayed by Miss Pierce and the witchery of her lovely face completely captivated the brave Lieutenant.
