THE TRIAL.

Two Speeches Heard Yesterday for the Judges Defense.

Predictions on the Vote. The Public Does Not Expect Conviction. Senators Will All Be Present. Street Talk.

Raleigh, March 25.—In the impeachment trial today F. H. Basbee concluded his argument in two hours on behalf of the defense. He said that the impeachment managers were attempting to impose on the lay members of the Senate on account of their ignorance of the law.

He was succeeded by B. F. Long who made a superb argument for the defense, speaking four and a half hours. His argument was to show that it was impossible to convict the judges under the articles of impeachment.

It is now agreed by both sides that the impeachment trial will probably end Wednesday. The impeachment side say the vote will be very close but that the judges will be convicted. They say the judges will not be convicted for opinions but for "breaking into the treasury." The general public has not the least belief that there will be conviction. The clergy, the lawyers, the business men oppose impeachment, and say so. It is something with which the public has no sympathy and expressions to that effect are plain. The counsel for prosecution know well that the trial has no backing.

It is said all 50 senators will be here and ready to vote. A senator says there will be no long executive session, after arguments end, but that all will be ready to vote promptly. The judges are confident of a acquittal. They have entire confidence in the integrity of the Senate.

A gentleman widely known in the State said to me: "I hear all sorts of rumors and believe none of them. For example, a man said to me today that the Dukes are spending large sums of money to secure acquittal. With whom are they spending it? queried my informant, for you know it could be spent only with Senators and you know that is untrue. Then the man said he had heard a man say so. He went on to name two Senators who were approached. My informant said this was clearly a lie in the face of it; that one of the men named did not even have friendly relations with the Dukes."

An official said, that his impression was that the judges would not be convicted, but that they would be censured for a merely technical violation of the law. He said it was obviously impossible to prove willfulness and that sort of thing; and that the evidence certainly did not show it or prove it.

The accused judges themselves appear to be entirely confident of acquittal. They have entire confidence in the integrity of the Senate.


