SOCIAL EVENT.

The Marks-Andrews Wedding Celebrated at Raleigh.

They are Widely Known. The Webb-Hoke Wedding Next Wednesday. An Easter German. Pinehurst Season Closed.

Raleigh, April 10.—The chief social event of the season was the marriage here this evening, at the Church of the Good Shepherd, of Miss Jane Andrews, daughter of Vice-President Alexander B. Andrews, to Mr. W. M. Marks, one of the leading citizens of Montgomery, Alabama. The high social position of both families in their respective States made the marriage of much more than ordinary interest.

The church was beautifully decorated, and there was an innovation, in that there was no reserved seats. The bride was given away by her father. She was gowned in ivory white satin, with point lace which her mother wore at her own wedding, wore pearls and carried a bouquet of bridal roses and lilies of the valley. Miss Ethel Marks, of Montgomery, the groom's sister, was maid of honor and wore a gown of white over pink and a picture hat, and her bouquet was of bridesmaids roses. Mr. W. A. Gayle of Montgomery was best man. The ushers were the four brothers of the bride, Messrs. W. J., Alex B., John H., and Graham Andrews, and his cousin, Mr. Watkins Roberts. Rev. Dr. I. McK. Pettigrew, the rector, officiated, and Bishop Chesire gave his blessing.

A reception from 9:30 to 11 o'clock at the home of Col. and Mrs. Andrews, followed. This was attended by a number of people from other parts of this State, and other States. The gifts to the bride came from all the country between New York and New Orleans and were the most beautiful ever seen here. The bride is one of the most popular young women Raleigh has ever known. Mr. Marks family has for three quarters of a century been a leader in the social and business life of Montgomery. At midnight he and his charming young bride left for the North. She wore a going-away gown of white.

LAW ON CHARTERS.

It Reminds That of New Jersey, Some of the Requirements.

Raleigh, April 10.—The new law regarding the granting of charters to private corporations follows almost entirely the New Jersey law. It is an admirable one. All charters now originate in the office of the Secretary of State. He and the clerks of court get the same fees as formerly. All the taxes and fees are paid to the Secretary of State and by him to the treasury. If now costs twice as much to get a charter from the legislature as from the Secretary of State. The tax on charters is \$50 on the \$1,000 of authorized capital stock, and for increase or decrease of capital stock \$20 as the minimum fee. All existing corporations are required to send in lists of their officers, principal places of business, authorized and actual capital stock, etc. Penalty for failure is severe.

The directors expect to submit a report tomorrow showing an inventory of all the property and also their opinion of the financial status of the institution. It will take the management of a high class of business men to make the penitentiary pay its own expenses this year. This much is shown to be quite clear.

CASE IN BANKRUPTCY.

Important Finding by Judge Parnell—The Election case.

Raleigh, April 10.—Judge Parnell in a bankruptcy case involving the question of partnership, decided today: 1st, that referee in bankruptcy is paid a fee to make findings of facts and state conclusions of law; and he must do his duty; 2nd, that the individual estate and firm estate constitutes two legal entities; 3rd, that it must appear that the individual members of a partnership have no individual personal property exempted before they can be allowed their personal property.

The attorney general and auditor are going over the new revenue act together. The act is in great request.

The attorney general today prepared a statement regarding the case against state election of officers in which by order of Judge James E. Boyd, a nolle prosequi was entered yesterday at Greensboro.
