RALEIGH.

Prediction That the Cotton Acreage Will be Immense.

Water Filter in Order. The Penitentiary Problem. A City Farm Experiment. Light Court Docket.

RALEIGH, April 11.—One large farmer here says he fears the farmers will, as he puts it, "plant the world in cotton." He dreads a great acreage. The tendency on the part of many farmers, if not most of them, is to plant more than they can gather.
 It is the current comment on the Marx-Andrews wedding here last night that it was the handsomest function of the kind Raleigh has ever seen.
 The new filter plant of the water works here is in complete operation. The plant is ample for five times the quantity of water used. The reservoir capacity is two million gallons, the filtering capacity 24 millions, the pumping capacity 24 millions.
 The penitentiary directors were again in session today. They admit that they have a great problem before them.
 This city is making the experiment of a garbage farm on a large scale. The farm is about half a mile South of the city. It contains 175 acres. Street garbage during March 1900 wagon loads and of night soil 100 barrels a day, on the odorless system. The land is being put in high condition. Plowing is nearly complete. The past house is near the farm. There are large barns for the storage of crops, which will be used in feeding animals. There are 13 horses and mules on the farm, all used by the sanitary department.
 The dock is in the Supreme Court this week is light. Next week the 11th district will be called. As a rule it has the heaviest docket of all.
 The March bulletin of the agricultural department has appeared. It is devoted to fertilizer analysis.
 The March bulletin of the State board of health says there was small pox in 23 counties. In Greene 178 cases were reported.
