POLITICAL REVOLUTION AT-TEMPTED ALONG ECONOMIC

The appointment of John G. Capera, as United States District Attorney in South Carolina, has created a political excitement beyond the borders of that State, and the matter has become of national importance, politically.

That this appointment is more than a

In this appointment is more than a local political incident, cannot be doubted, for it appears to be another link in the chain of politics, pointing to the attempt to build up a new Republican party in the South, along lines entirely different from previous methods employed, and upon a basis which ap-peals to economic questions, for business reasons and the commercial interests of

Senator McLaurin's public stand on the Ship Subsidy question, gave him prominence, and has provoked hostile newspaper criticism from Democratic papers, which imputed to the Senator a departure from the strict Democratic

Further uneasiness has been created among South Carolina Democrata, by the appointment noted above of Capt. Capers, also at Alken, S. C. of a white man as postmaster, instead of a negr , as attempted by South Carolina Reput-

Both of these appointers are said to be Gold Democrats, which is regarded as significant by those watching the trend of politics in the South.

The State of Columbia, B. C. speaks of the appointments as an attempt '-to split the solid South with the wedge of office."

"Contrary to the anticipation of some people, the job of developing a white Republican party in South Carolina will not be made the saster by associating a change of political allegiance with a cash consideration in the sampe of official salary. With the hribe openly dis-played, it will be used for the bribes to talk about the workings of his con-science. The venal may be attracted by the spoils, but their very venality will be a warning, and men who have respect for themselves, and therefore influence with the people, will be slow to chal-lenge the suspicion of improper motives by joining the organization.

RUSSIA'S WILL IN CHINA

lains Her Case.

WHAT THE CZAR'S POLICY IS.

sini, was recently interviewed concerning the reiterated reports as to Russia's designs on Manchuria. Count Cassini said he was not authorized to make my official declaration on the part of any official declaration on the work of the con-sistent reports he consented to state his individual views, based on his long service is China and his familiarity

with the general policy Russia has consistently maintained toward China. The embassador first called attention to the Chinese invasion of Russian territory last summer. There is a great stretch of border between the two em-pires, about 8,000 kilometers in length, and over the Manchurian border the Chinese forces, he said, poured, committing depredations and threatening Russian interests. This invasion was of such a character, the embas said, that Russia would have been justified then and there in declaring was against China and taking Manchuria, Such a course would have been justi-fied by every principle of international law, and the right of Russia in this re-

spect could not have been doubted by any other nation. Count Cassini add ed that if Russia had been dispos exercise this undoubted right she had the military force on the ground today to execute it. But Russia did not at that time take Manchuria in, and in that very fact, the embassador said, was the best answer to the present re ports of Russia's purpose to absorb Manchuria. If she had not chosen to take Manchuria when the opportunity was open and clear, why should there e any step in that direction now?

The embassador said that frequen reference was being made in for publications and in this country to th resence of Russian troops in Manchu ria, and writers expressed some sur-prise at their presence there. "Why are he Russian troops in Manchuria?" was frequently asked. In reply the embas sador asked, "Why are German troops British troops, American troops and other troops in Peking?" There seem ed to be no surprise about this latter condition, and yet it was exactly paral lel to the presence of Russian troops in

In each case depredations were being committed, foreign interests were in eopardy, and each nation sent its troops to give due protection to the lives and property of its people and to preven the recurrence of disorder.
In Manchuria the Russian civil en-

gineers at one time had been driven away from work along the Transsibe rian railway, with its spurs southward to Port Arthur and eastward to Vladi rostok. It was necessary to give adequate protection to these engineer and to the rallway as well. Cassini pointed out the extent of this great enterprise, with its benefits of traffic not only to Russia, but to the world at large, and the prospect of its completion within the next 14 months. He said that there was not the elight st question as to the right of Russi to construct the line across Chinese to ritory, and with this authority came the necessity of protecting the line and

the interests connected with it. Inquiry was made of Count Cassi as to the specific report that an agree ment containing a number of articles was about to be concluded between Russid and China.

The embassador suggested that such reports must be taken with a great deal of allowance, particularly if they emanated from Shanghal, which, ac cording to his own experience, he said. was a point whence fabrications were sent out. He was not advised on such agreement, and in the absence of such advice he did not, be said, feel at lib erty to discuss the subject. But on general principles he polated out that any agreement or understanding which Russia might make with China would involve two essential features—name involve two essential features—nameiy, first, adequate protection for Russian interests in Manchuria in order
that there might be no repetition of disorder and danger to life and property,
and, second, the maintenance of China's territorial integrity.

As far back as Aug. 25 Count Cassial
pointed out that the Russian minister

announced clearly and distinctly the

pointed out that the Russian minister of foreign affairs in a formal note had announced clearly and distinctly the policy of Russia in regard to Manchoria. In accordance with that declaration it could not be doubted that when order had been established in Manchoria and measures taken for the protection of railway construction Russia would recall her troops from Manchoria, provided the action of other powers did not place in obtacle in the way of such a measure. The embansador, remarked that there was really no occasion for remarked attention to this note of Aug. 15 any more than there was need of reitersting the declaration of other notes exchanged at that time. But, in the view of the embanation, that note made it clear that whatever might be the understanding as to Manchoria that territory would emania a part of Chima, the Russian troops being withdrawn as soon as this mode be done with assurance that order sould be maintained, unless new conditions are brought about by the action of other powers.



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
