### NEW ROSTER.

North Carolina Troops to be Correctly Listed.

Deserters to be Marked Down. Small Fox Case. Governor Aycock at Seven Springs. The Prize Drill.

RALPH, April 29.--State Auditor Dixon, with a view to making a new roster of North Carolina troops in the Confederate service, has asked the register of deeds of each county to give him the names of three intelligent and reliable veterans. These names are in hand and the auditor is rapidly receiving reports from these veterans. He says: "In two years time we will have all the data so that an entirely correct roster can be made. In this the names of all deserters will be given also. Opposite each deserter's name will appear that fact. Here is a letter from Capt. Swift Gallows showing the need of such a roster. Here is another from Mr. F. Dilling of Cleveland county, commending our plan of running down deserters, not a few of whom have been receiving pensions." When asked if the number of pensions would increase this year, the auditor said yes, and that the entire \$200,000 for pensions under the new law would not doubt be called for.

The nights continue cold. The wind blows from northward almost constantly this month, this is phenomenal. The small cases of small pox in the past house near here; all save one negroes. The disease is in 5 or 6 townships and from these the cases were brought. The April bulletin of the State board of health says small pox is in 18 counties; with a total of 281 cases. United States district attorney Beard says the dockets of the spring terms of all the federal courts are lighter than usual.

Governor Aycock left yesterday for Seven Springs to be gone about two or three days. The Gattis-Kilgo argument is given considerable space in the local papers. The attorneys in the case made things lively. One said a verdict against Kilgo was one against Trinity College, and by consequence, against the North Carolina conference.

The prize drill here May 10 is now assured, as twelve companies have entered two men each.

It is whispered that Raleigh is to have quite a number of June weddings. The name of a leading attorney here is pleasantly mentioned in this connection.

NEW ORLEANS, April 28.--Over forty bishops and distinguished preachers attending the great missionary conference occupied the Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian pulpits to-day.

The day's feature of the conference was a Sunday school missionary meeting, which was also made the anniversary of the local Sunday school work in Japan. At night Bishop Galloway of Mississippi, preached a brilliant discourse upon lessons from master missionaries.

The night session closed with great enthusiasm, the raising of a collection of \$50,150 marking one of the most remarkable scenes in Methodist history. Mrs. W. W. Carr and sons, of this city, headed the list with \$5,000. The principal part of the fund goes to South China.
